### A PLAIN DEALER EDITORIAL

Monday, January 14th

Religious tolerance is desirable, nay, essential to any community which calls itself enlightened. But there is something more desirable than mere tolerance, which is a somewhat negative virtue. That is a sympathetic mutual understanding. To achieve this high ideal is the purpose of the Institute of Judaism to be held tomorrow at the Euclid Avenue Temple, under its sponsorship and with the cooperation of the Cleveland Ministers Union.

Under the leadership of Dr. Barnett R. Brickner, Rabbi of the Euclid Avenue Temple, this is the second such institute. The one last year was attended by some 250 Christian ministers, as well as outstanding Jewish leaders. On this year's program, beside Rabbi Brickner are Dr. Stephen S. Wise of New York and Dr. Nelson Glueck of the Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati.

Cleveland, where tolerance and its better brother, cordial understanding, has been the rule rather than the exception in the relations between Jew and gentile, is glad to welcome this institute with its aim of building for good will through mutual confidence.

## Palestine Day to be Universally Celebrated

Sunday, January 20th has been proclaimed as Palestine Day. It will be characterized by numerous celebrations all over the country, chief among which will be the All-Jewish Conference in Washington, D. C. Invited to this Conference are representatives of all Jewish national organization and communities. The Conference is to be the symbol and index of the uniting of American Jewry in the support of the Jewish National Home.

Radio programs, mass gatherings and school celebrations have been announced. Special articles will appear in newspapers and magazines.

### THE PROCLAMATION OF PALESTINE DAY, JANUARY 20th, 1935

"In my capacity as President of the Zionist Organization of America, I designate and set aside January 20th, 1935, as Palestine Day and call upon all committees to mark this occasion in a manner worthy of the great traditions and the magnificent achievements of present-day Palestine.

"Palestine Day, which we hope to observe annually in the future, is intended to symbolize the hopes of the Jewish people for a rebuilt center in their ancestral homeland and to memorialize the great service rendered to that aim by Christian statesmen and public opinion in the United States and other lands.

"American Palestine Day will commemorate the heroic zeal and spirit of idealism that motivated the thousands of men and women who went to Palestine to lay the foundation for the renaissance of the Jewish people in Palestine. It will commemorate the age long dream and yearning of Jews, to whom Palestine opened a new life.

"For the Jews of the United States, Palestine Day will be the signal for a renewed effort in behalf of the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home. For Americans interested in the rebuilding of Palestine it will symbolize the sacrifice, heroism, perseverance and courage of the modern pioneers in Palestine comparable to that of the early American pioneers.

"American Palestine Day will emphasize the necessity for increased moral support of the Jewish National home. It will point to Palestine as the one country now offering to large numbers of Jews political, religious and economic freedom and opportunity.

American Palestine Day will aim to demonstrate the strivings of Jewry to establish in Palestine not merely a refuge from persecution but a home for the Jewish spirit, where may be renewed the ancient Jewish contributions to world culture and world social justice."

### STATEMENT ON PALESTINE DAY

by Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York

"The recreation of Palestine enables Jews in areas of persecution to move into a proud homeland of their own. It enables Jews in America to derive the deep spiritual satisfaction that comes from helping their kinsmen in other lands during the hour of darkest need. It affords all mankind an opportunity to encourage the further flowering of a culture and a learning of superb richness and depth, that have provided an ethical beacon to the world since the first days of recorded time.

"The first Palestine Day in America should occasion an outpouring of good will from Jew and Gentile alike that may be canalized so as to effectuate the ideals of love and justice that all good people hold in common."
