IS GERMANY ARMING

**Armament Firm Far Ahead of Rest of
German Industry, Report by Company
Shows.**

Berlin, Jan. 25.—The greatest of pre-war armament works, the Krupp Company of Essen, today issued a report on the business year closing last Sept. 30 that shows an average advance in German business.

Total production increased 56 per cent. Pig iron production rose 80 per cent, raw steel production, 50 per cent; rolling mill production, 63 per cent. The company reports its total number of employes back to normal and many departments are working at full capacity. The number of employes has risen from 56,000 to 79,000.

As a result of this sudden boom, the Krupp family, sole holders of the firm's stock, realized a profit approximately that of the prosperity years 1928 and 1929. They put 6,700,000 marks (about \$2,680,000) back into the business in accord with an old family tradition. The previous year closed with a loss of 4,000,000 marks.

The Essen works and associated undertakings in various parts of the Reich produced 1,190,000 tons of pig iron, compared with 670,000 tons the preceding year; 1,310,000 tons of raw steel, compared with 840,000, and 940,000 tons of rolling mill products, compared with 580,000.

The astonishing increase in activity appears to have come very suddenly on the basis of some particular series of contracts.

ANTIDOTE FOR ANTI-SEMITISM

Those nations of our cultural realm that are self-confident are the least anti-Semitic. Anti-Semitism begins where people have not been accustomed to success for a very long period of time, and where they feel their own position in the world to be still a problem. It is aggravated wherever a people is enslaved. It persists in a more or less vicious form in accordance with national or political ambitions which are carried out externally but which, internally, have not yet been attained.

The German anti-Semite, or rather the "nationally" labelled human type (the human type characterized as "national"), a type representing most of the anti-Semites, was a Francophobe until the intervention of a German victory over France mollified him in this regard. He then had recourse to hatred for England, until the World War did him the kindness of reducing his opinion of the value of all Europe, including England.

Victors who are themselves not so well off generally gnaw less at their self assurance when it grows shaky than just before defeat. On the other hand the German anti-Semite cannot rid himself by means of violence of the torment which his hatred of the Jews causes him. This would result in self-destruction, for he has everything in common with his Jews: Fatherland, economic situation, mode of living and of thinking, his attitude to foreigners, his conduct in the face of universal tasks and, finally, even the goodness of his self-consciousness.

TEMPLE FLASHES

Six hundred fathers and sons packed our Recreation Hall to capacity Sunday evening for the Men's Club Annual Father-Son Banquet. Stars from the sport world reminisced before the delighted youngsters. The list of guests sounds like a Who's Who in the field of sports—Roger Peckinpough, Lew Fonseca, Mel Harder, Steve O'Neill, Lefty Weisman, Walter MacNichols, Jack Graney, Steve Sundra, Gordon Cobbledick of the P. D., Stuart Bell of the Press, with Tom "Red" Manning as M. C. . . . Entertainment furnished by Uncle Harry and Jackie of WGAR, the Oleanders of WTAM, Doc Whipple and Rose and Lurie. Rabbi Brickner spoke. Special automatic pencils as souvenirs and 30 valuable prizes completed a perfect evening. The youngsters trooped home tired but happy. A vote of thanks and appreciation to Irving S. "Nig" Rose. . . . The night before this the Alumni attracted 400 young people to its Winter Frolic. Skillful hands converted the Recreation Hall into an attractively decorated Ballroom. An excellent program of entertainment and a midnight supper contributed to a delightful evening . . . On the whole a crowded and fruitful week-end . . . In two days, Saturday and Sunday, more than 3000 people used the facilities of the Temple. This includes the school and services . . . In response to the Friday evening broadcasts in January, Rabbi Brickner heard from about forty states. Over 700 letters and telegrams were received. The following from John S. Alfriend, Jr., editor of two small weekly newspapers in Charleston, W. Va., is typical: "I have just this minute finished listening to your masterful address—certainly I want a copy of it. May I even be so greedy as to ask that I be put on the mailing list for each of your addresses. For your kindness, I thank you, sir. For the excellence of your address, I heartily congratulate you. More of such sermons would make of the nation a better country in which to live." . . .

NEWS FLASHES

The first volume of an all Hebrew Encyclopedia has just come off the press in Tel Aviv. It is written entirely in Hebrew and covers all the subjects included in such publications as the Encyclopedia Britannica. The editor is Dr. Joseph Klausner, Professor of Hebrew Literature at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem . . . 5,500,000 boxes of Citrus fruits were produced last year in Palestine, an increase of 1,000,000 over the previous year . . . Preparations are in progress for a nation wide celebration of the eight hundredth anniversary of the birthday of Maimonides. The Men's Clubs of the Cleveland Temples are co-operating in a gigantic local celebration . . . 131,000 trees were planted in Palestine the year ending September, 1934, which is about 12,000 more than the previous year. Trees were planted primarily in land which is not suitable for agriculture. The children of the Euclid Avenue Temple Religious School contributed \$90.00 for 60 trees this month. . . . Heavy taxation in Poland is hitting Jews hardest. Many of these taxes are discriminatory. Hundreds of houses of Warsaw and other cities of Poland are being offered for sale by Jews for small sums. The picture of middle class Jews offering their household goods for sale to Polish peasants in exchange for bread and flour is indeed a tragic one. . . . William Dudley Pelley, leader of the Anti-Semitic Silver Shirts, who was convicted last month of violating the North Carolina "Blue Sky" law, will not retreat a single inch in his feud with Jewry . . . Jews in Poland pay a large portion of the taxes but receive practically nothing to support their schools Palestine presents a bright spot in the Jewish horizon. Revenues of the Palestine government for the fiscal year for 1935-36 are estimated by government officials to be \$27,500,000 with a possible expenditure of \$17,500,000, leaving a surplus of \$10,000,000 to be added to the present surplus of approximately \$20,000,000 Three world famous medical specialists, the brothers Professors Bernard, Samuel and Herman Zondek, who recently reached Palestine, have now permanently settled there and will head new medical departments established by the Hadassah Medical Organization.

NO EFFORT TOO GREAT FOR ROLL CALL

If the National Conference for Palestine is to achieve its aims fully, that stirring demonstration of sentiment for the Homeland must be converted in concrete form. There is no more effective way of crystallizing the sympathy which hundreds of thousands of Jews showed for Palestine through the delegates they sent to Washington than through registration in the Zionist Roll Call. At no time in the past has American Jewry been so completely prepared to express its support for Palestine in great numbers as it is today. It is a primary obligation for all Zionists to devote themselves to the Roll Call, for now is the most propitious time to create not only a large body of Jewish public opinion for Palestine, but also a greatly increased constituency of voters in the elections for delegates to the next Zionist Congress. The privilege of a vote in these elections, which goes with registration in the Roll Call, will serve to extend the influence of American Jewry in the deliberations of the next Zionist Congress. The service which a successful Roll Call will render to Palestine and to the Zionist cause demands the immediate action of all persons interested in the future of the Homeland.
