CAMP WISE CREW

The Camp Wise Crew, the organization of volunteer counsellors of Camp Wise, is conducting a Spring Training Course, designed to prepare young men and women for leadership in a Jewish community camp. The course will consist of six meetings to be held at the Jewish Center, East 105th street at Grantwood, beginning with Monday evening, March 4th, at 8 p. m., and continuing on alternate Monday evenings thereafter. Those who take this course will be preferred in the selection of leaders for Camp Wise next summer.

OIL FROM THE WELLS OF IRAQ

A great event in which many of the leading countries of the world are directly interested took place recently in the town of Kirkuk in Iraq.

Here in the presence of many government officials King Ghazi opened the great Iraq trans-desert oil pipe line. American, French, British and Dutch Oil companies are deeply interested in this pipe line which covers a distance of 1,150 miles from Iraq to the Mediterranean Sea. King Ghazi pressed a button and a great stream of petroleum started its long journey to the Sea.

Designed and largely built by Americans, this pipe line connects the Mediterranean ports of Haifa and Tripoli with the rich oil fields east of the Tigris and will carry about four million tons of oil annually to the world's markets.

In the early biblical days Iraq was known as Mesopotamia. This country has been connected with the Jewish people from the beginning of its history. Here the patriarch Abraham was born and here the Jews lived in large numbers and had important schools. About 110,000 Jews live in Iraq, and in Bagdad (the capital) there are close to 70,000 Jews. Mosul, containing these rich oil fields, has a Jewish population of 7,000 and 5,000 Jews live in Basra.

All the inhabitants of the Near East look forward to the completion of this oil line because it means so much to all of them.

DAVID LLOYD GEORGE ON ANTI-SEMITISM

"Of all the bigotries that savage the human temper there is none so stupid as the anti-Semitic. It has no basis in reason; it is not rooted in faith; it aspires to no ideal; it is just one of those dank and unwholesome weeds that grow in the morass of racial hatred. How utterly devoid of reason it is may be gathered from the fact that it is almost entirely confined to nations who worship Jewish prophets and apostles, revere the national literature of the Hebrews as the only inspired message delivered by the deity to mankind, and whose only hope of salvation rests on the precepts and promises of the great teachers of Judah. Yet in the sight of these fanatics the Jews of today can do nothing right. If they are rich they are birds of prey. If they are poor they are vermin. If they are in favor of a war it is because they want to exploit the bloody feuds of the gentiles to their own profit. If they are anxious for peace they are either instinctive cowards or traitors. If they give generously-and there are no more liberal givers than the Jews-they are doing it for some selfish purpose of their own. If they do not give-then what could one expect of a Jew but avarice? If labor is oppressed by great capital, the greed of the Jew is held responsible. If labor revolts against capital—as it did in Russia—the Jew is blamed for that also. If he lives in a strange land he must be persecuted and pogrommed out of it. If he wants to go back to his own he must be prevented No good has ever come of nations that crucified the Jew. It is poor and pusillanimous sport, lacking all the true qualities of manliness, and those who indulge in it would be the first to run away were there any element of danger in it."?

THE MODERN SPIRIT AMONG THE PROPHETS

Their spirit is to be found in the modern soul. It matters little that they spoke in the name of a God, Jehovah. and that the modern age speaks in the name of human thought. For their Jehovah was nothing more than the apotheosis of the human soul, the projection of their own conscience against the backround of heaven. They loved everything that we love, and their ideal was reared at the expense neither of reason nor of conscience. They unveiled in heaven a God who seeks neither altars nor holocausts nor psalms, "but let righteousness run down like water and justice like a mighty stream." They turned right into a power, and from the idea they fashioned a fact before which all facts were shaken; by sheer belief in justice, they made justice a factor in the march of history. They uttered the cry of pity for the unhappy, the cry of vengeance against the oppressor, the cry of peace and unity among the peoples. They did not say to man: "This world is not worth while." They said: "The world is good: be thou good also, be just, be pure." They said to the rich: "Thou shalt punish without humiliating." To the sage: "Thou art responsible for the soul of thy people." And they taught more than one how to live and how to die for righteousness and without the hope of Elysian Fields. They taught the peoples that, without an ideal, "The future is nothingness," that the ideal alone gives life, that this ideal is neither the glory of conquest, nor riches, nor power, but the lifting up, like a light in the midst of nations, of the example of better laws and a higher soul.-James Darmesteter.
