"FOR THE PRESTIGE OF CLEVELAND JEWRY"

The Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign will get under way Sunday evening, May 5th at the Cleveland Hotel with the "Rosenwald Dinner and Rally." William Rosenwald, co-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, and son of the late Julius Rosenwald, will address several hundred workers and explain the conditions which make the \$130,000 goal the very minimum which must be obtained.

Twenty-five different national and international welfare causes will receive support from the seven-day campaign. Chief among these is the relief and reconstruction of German, Polish, and other European Jews, whose condition has become increasingly desperate in the past year.

The drive will also be marked by the element of Cleveland Jewry's own prestige as a Jewish community in bearing its share of the national philanthropic responsibilities. Fund leaders have issued comparative figures which show Cleveland far below other cities with smaller Jewish populations.

Cincinnati, with one-fourth Cleveland's Jewish population, raised 40% more; Detroit, also with a smaller Jewish population, contributed 50% more; and San Francisco, with half as many Jews, raised more than twice as much as Cleveland. The campaign has therefore adopted as its slogan, "For The Prestige Of Cleveland Jewry," and is emphasizing the need to restore to Cleveland the reputation it once enjoyed as a national leader in philanthropy.

Another element being stressed is the effect which a victory for the anti-Semitic forces in Europe would have upon Jews throughout the world. The degradation of the Jews to the place of a second-rate and inferior people in Germany and other countries would undoubtedly have its effect in England and the United States, and the Jews of these two countries are being urged to lead the battle against these subversive forces.

"HOW THE UNION OPERATES"

(Part two)

Any attempt to convey even a remote idea of how the Union of American Hebrew Congregations operates must necessarily take into consideration the large number of professional and business men who donate their services on the various Boards, Committees and Commissions, which, co-ordinated with the paid staff, comprises the efficient organization which, re-quoting Mr. Mack, "made possible the wide range of activities in which we engage."

The paid staff is nominally very limited in number, but not so in capacity. Years of experience and a faithful devotion to the work, has developed their capacity and thus enables them to handle a prodigious amount of detail in both Office and Field, at a cost to the Union, relatively so low, as to be a constant embarrassment to those who supervise it. But the Union, confronted by inadequate funds, has been compelled to choose between accepting this sacrifice on the part of its paid staff or sacrificing some essential function which, if even temporarily suspended might retard progress.

The field staff comes under the Department of Synagogue and Extension. One has but to consult a typical report from the Regional Rabbis to wonder how, on their meagre stipend these field Representatives of the Union accomplish so much. They travel from city to city through the Religiously unorganized sectors of our country, holding innumerable meetings and rendering various and essential service to these Communities. The positive developments which inevitably follow these visitations, clearly demonstrate the value and indispensability of this Service. It is equally obvious that if more funds could be devoted to it, the results would be incomparably better. In connection with both the Office and Field staff literally hundreds of letters pour into the Union office in Cincinnati seeking counsel upon religious matters, enlisting the experience and facilities of all of the departments of the Union.

Supplementing the paid staff of the Union, is the group referred to in the first paragraph, comprising as it does, members of the Executive Board and of its related divisions. The members of the Executive Board nominally meet twice each year at the time and place agreed upon, but are at all times subject to the call of the Chairman. The expenses of traveling to and from and at such meetings are defrayed by the members themselves. Between meetings these members function in their respective localities, in accordance with duties assigned. What applies to members of the Executive Board is likewise true of the Chairman of Committees and Commissions and the various Boards and the members thereof. The Boards, Departments, Commissions and Committees are as follows:

- (2) Board of Governors, Hebrew Union College
- (3) Department of Synagogue and Extension
 - (a) Board of Managers
 - (b) Commission on Jewish Education
 - (c) Commission on Synagogue Activities

- (5) North West Religious Union
- (6) South East Religious Union

- (7) Nat'l. Federation of Temple Sisterhoods
- (8) Nat'l Federation of Temple Brotherhoods
- (9) Committee on World Union for Progressive Judaism
- (10) Committee on Synagogue Council of America
- (11) Committee on Good Will Between Christians and Jews
- (12) Committee on Social Justice
- (13) Committee on Union Budget
- (14) Committee on Endowment and Trust Funds
- (15) Committee on Rabbinical Relief

Thus we have the framework of creative and constructive organization—the superstructure built upon the sound foundation of the Union objective—to unite congregations in rendering wide and effective service for the preservation of Liberal Judaism; for thoughtful, intelligent and planned effort to accomplish this aim; and to achieve Social justice in human relationships.

SISTERHOOD SABBATH SATURDAY MORNING, MAY 18TH 11 O'CLOCK

The Sisterhood will participate in a celebration of a World Peace Day, or Good Will Day, as it has come to be called, in honor of the first Hague Conference which opened on May 18th. 1899. The plan was at once taken up by the International Council of Women. In 1906 its observance was recommended by The United States Commissioner of Education. The American School Citizenship League and the American Peace Society actively encouraged it during the years before the World War. The Federation of Education Associations founded in 1923 by the teachers of America. Europe and the Orient has made the observance of the day one of its chief plans for the promotion of international friendship and understanding. A special service is being prepared and Rabbi Brickner will give a Peace Day Talk.

NEW LIGHT IS THROWN ON BIBLICAL EPISODE

Jerusalem, March 21 (AP).—One of the most dramatic episodes in biblical history was believed thrown open for new study as a result of the recent discovery at ancient Lachish of a seal from the reign of Gedalia, last of the Kings of Judah, who was murdered by a pretender to the throne, it was revealed today by a member of the archaeological expedition working there.

It is believed that this is the same Gedalia whose memory Jews still honor by observing the feast of Gedalia.

Gedalia, who ruled for a few years after 586 B. C., was appointed to his post by Nebuchadnezzar with Mispah instead of Jerusalem as his capital. He was believed to have had the role of High Commissioner rather than king.

The discovery of the seal at Lachish, now known as Tel Ad-Duweir, is believed to indicate that Gedalia's rule was actually extended beyond the city of Mizpah. The seal was the token left by the ancient assayers to show that a jar or other receptacle was of correct weight or size.
