TEMPLE ESTABLISHES JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

To meet the need of young people, both single and married, with moderate in comes who wish to affiliate with a Temple, our Temple at a special congregational meeting held recently amended its constitution and created a new classification with reference to such membership.

It is now possible for a married couple up to the age of thirty, who have no children or whose children are below religious school age, to join the Temple with full privileges of regular membership, seats for the High Holy Days and cemetery privileges, for a minimum of twenty-five dollars a year. The same privileges are open to single people up to the age of thirty for fifteen dollars year. The constitution was also amended to enable unmarried persons at any age to join for a minimum of twenty-five dollars per year, provided they are not able to pay more.

The Temple invites all young people, who are unaffiliated, to consider such membership, especially now before the High Holy Days. Those young people, who are confirmants of the Temple, are especially urged to retain their affiliation with the Temple through this new opportunity, which is now available to them.

ASSOCIATE RABBI FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Rabbi Jacob Marcus, Professor of Jewish History at the Hebrew Union College will once again be associated with Rabbi Brickner in conducting the Ligh Holy Day Services this year. He is the author of "The Rise and Destiny of the German Jew." We look forward, with pleasure, to the privilege of again hearing Rabbi Marcus, who left a most favorable impression when he was with us in previous years.

SISTERHOOD OFFERS CULTURAL COURSES

Four courses, each consisting of three lectures are offered by the Sisterhood for their Friday morning Cultural Activities, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Henry H. Emsheimer. The courses are:

"Current Plays of Importance" by Noel Leslie of the Play House.

"World Leaders of Today" by Jacob Meyers of Western Reserve University.

"Trends in Modern Music" interpreted and illustrated by Denoe Leedy, Music Critic of the Cleveland Press.

"This Changing World" by Henry Miller Busch of Cleveland College.

Tickets for the entire series of four courses are \$1.00 each for Sisterhood members and \$2.00 for non-members. Admission to individual lectures is 35c.

WE NEED PRIDE

"Yours is a friendship I value, although neither you nor I asked for it; neither you nor I were given any choice in the matter. My destiny is yours and yours mine. Life has one answer for us all; for my sins you must suffer; for your mistakes I must pay. There is hardly one of you whose veins do not carry some distant blood of my ownblood-kinship which goes back perhaps two hundred years, perhaps two thousand. For you and for me today the same clouds gather in the sky, in our eyes is the same lightning, in our ears the same thunder; before our feet the old remembered road, the road of the past, the road of ages.

"What are we to do to stand against our enemies? Of what are we accused? Of being strangers in every land, though we ourselves may have helped to build the cities of that land. We are accused by some of greed, by others of idealism; by some of making war, by others of making peace; of being too rich, of being too poor. We are accused of being radicals; and we are accused of being conservative; we are accused of internationalism and nationalism, in the same breath. And those who accuse us. do not lie. For we are a diverse people, with many and opposite aims. It was Jerusalem that stoned the prophets and built the Temple, it was the Jews who banned Spinoza, and gave the world a Mendelssohn; it was the Jews who defied Rome, and who at the fall of Jerusalem fought so bitterly among themselves that there were no swords left to face the Romans.

"And so I say to you, look well to yourselves, my distant cousins. Look well to your faults; but look no less well at your virtues. It is easy to be rich, and to be proud. To be poor and to be proud is less easy, for poverty is hard to bear, But whether rich or poor, to be disliked as the Jew is disliked, and yet to be proud, that is hardest of all. And we need pride, as we need the air

that we breathe.

"Set your hearts on what is best among you-on love, on kindness, on courage, on understanding; those are the virtues for a Jew to take pride in. They alone add stature to the exile whose house must be the home of the spirit, whose fields and pastures must be the meadow of the soul. His wealth can be taken from him, but not his courage; they may take his comfort, they cannot rob him of his kindness. Those things are his own. Let the word Jew stand in this world not for a beaten race, not for a people whose hearts turn like the willow leaves at every wind, but for a people whose hearts are strong and steadfast, whose hearts are loyal to their own, and to that grace and wisdom which was theirs, when God first chose them from among the nations to be a witness to the divine spirit."-Robert Nathan, author of "Road of Ages."

ATTRACTIVE COURSE OFFERED FOR NEW SEASON

NAZIDOM AND THE OLYMPICS

Those who are horrified at what is taking place in Germany have at their disposal a striking medium for focusing world-wide disgust on the Nazi regime. That medium is to be found in the Olympic games, scheduled to be held in August, 1936. The German government is spending fabulous sums in making this event a colossal vehicle for Nazi propaganda. German business will cash in on the pageantry. Streicher and Hitler and Goebbels will summon the youth of the world and hold out false promises of brass buttons and play, provided the Jews are swept from the earth.

But just as the Olympic games may be the greatest feather in the Nazi cap—so might they also become the most telling blow to Hitler's prestige. For there is a chance that the Eleventh Olympiad may be transferred to another country. How good a chance will depend on how adroitly Jews, Catholics, liberals and workers take advantage of the bluster and blunder of Nazi officials.

The brave campaign for the boycott of the Olympics conducted by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi Federation, the Youth Division of the Amercan Jewish Congress, the League Against War and Fascism is now powerfully augumented by Catholic and Protestant leaders. The editors of the Catholic Commonweal and the Christian Century have written strong pleas for such a boycott. The Catholic paper calls on all Catholics to personally abstain from these games no matter what else happens.

Strong as these voices are, they are not strong enough. Certain officials in sportsdom have great financial stakes in holding the games in Germany. They have consistently ignored Jewish protests and even had the temerity to say that the Jews have shown poor sportsmanship in whining at Germany's regulations!

It is extremely important that Jewish leadership should not muff this chance as they did in the Dickstein investigation. The Olympic boycott must be a united-front campaign with non-Jews in prominent positions. The American Jewish

A. and the local branches of the National Conference of Jews and Christians. The heads of these organizations might then initiate petitions asking for the withdrawal of these games. The time is ripe for some such action. It can be done. It must be done not alone to rebuke a nation that is legitimatizing every form of barbarism but to save whatever shred of idealism still lurks in the world of From "The Jewish Frontier." sport.

SCHOOL EXTENDS REGISTRATION

Parents with children who are of age for admission into the first grade are strongly urged to enter them into the religious school immediately in order to give them the privilege of participating in the Consecration Ceremony. Our Temple was among the very first to introduce this new and very impressive ceremony of inducting the child into the religious school life. Today we receive numerous requests from every part of the county for a description of our procedure.

The Consecration Ceremony which has taken its place alongside of Confirmation undoubtedly leaves an indelible impression upon the young mind. No child ought to be deprived of the privilege of participation in this meaningful ceremony.

To permit those who have not yet enrolled to participate in the Consecration Ceremony and because of the fact that the holidays come late this year the Religious School Committee has decided to extend the period of registration.

New children will therefore be enrolled in all grades on Sunday, October 6th.

Other men suffer their small pains ... the pain of disappointment and disillusion, the pain of defeat and of their sorrows, the pain of loss and the pain of faithless friends. And in the agony of this they cry, "Why do I suffer? What has been my offense?"

The Jew suffers these pains and his own exclusive pain besides; for being a Jew he suffers for being faithful, and, if he has an understanding mind, he cries out: "Happier am I than those who do not know why they suffer! Fortunate am I to have a worthy cause for suffering in that I am a Jew and have been faithful. Better is my pain than the pain of those who suffer with no understanding of their affliction!"—From the "B'nai B'rith" Magazine.
