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YOM KIPPUR

The chanting of the Kol Nidre, the traditional prayer of repentance for the Jewish people, will usher in Yom Kippur, the Jewish Day of Atonement, known also as the "Sabbath of Sabbaths." With the setting of the sun on Sunday, October 6th, Jews throughout the world will begin a day of prayer, of self-scrutiny and repentance. Worldly thoughts will be replaced by a searching analysis of one's conduct by each individual. Through prayer and repentance for his sins, will he make his peace with God and man, and renew his effort for a life of righteousness.

Yom Kippur is the culmination of a ten-day period of penitence which begins with the religious New Year. Traditionally God is regarded as the righteous Judge who inscribes each individual in the "Book of Life" on the New Year, and seals the decree upon Yom Kippur. Penitence, prayer, and charity serve as man's intermediaries at this time. Essential to any real atonement are not only true repentance and prayer for forgiveness, but also a change of heart, ennobling the will and resulting in an effort to do better. Each human being should stand before his Maker seeking in honesty to make his record clean.

This necessitates not only repentance, and the resolve to tread the path of righteousness, but retribution for what-

A LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

One recent day in Palestine, in the midst of joyous and blessed weeks, was fraught with sadness. It brought news of the revival of ruthlessness and barbarism in the Nazi land. That afternoon at Government House the High Commissioner had received the Jewish colonists and farmers throughout Palestine who at one time or another had been his hosts, and a few specially invited guests. At the close of the exercises the hills of Judea echoed the strains of Hatikvah. I saw young Jewish men and women marching in Judea once again, not for gain, not for ease, not for shelter, but in order to build once again a Jewish life of and for the Jewish people in the Jewish land. Over the Hills of Judea, east and west, to the blue waters of the Mediterranean, and across the golden hills of Moab, there swept the song of Jewish souls. Our hope is not destroyed, the ancient hope, the hope of returning to the Land of Israel and making it at last the seat of a new, just way of life for Israel and for all mankind.

The day has a most wholesome, spiritualizing influence. Its appeal does not rest upon any historical incident. It is not commemoration, but a direct appeal to the human heart and conscience, an emphasis upon the duty of personal communion with God, the source of all righteousness, in the effort to make our human life as godlike as possible. The promise of pardon for genuine penitence is ever present in the ritual of the day, and divine forgiveness is assured to those whose repentance is honest, and whose desire to return to a good life is genuine.

RABBI IN NATIONAL BROADCAST

Dr. Barnett R. Brickner, will start a series of nation-wide broadcasts (Station WGAR in Cleveland) on Saturday evening, October 5th, from 7:30 to 8 p. m. in connection with "The Message of Israel" program.

Rabbi Brickner will begin the series with an address on the Kol Nidre in connection with the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) and will be assisted by a choir broadcasting appropriate music from New York. He will continue throughout the month at the same time on Saturday evenings, October 12th, 19th and 26th.

"The Message of Israel" Program seeks to bring the message of the Jew as reflected in his Synagogue worship and the sermons of the Rabbis, both to the Jewish and non-Jewish world. It is sponsored by a group of Jewish laymen in New York of which Felix Warburg is the chairman and Rabbi Jonah Wise is the director.

MUSICAL CONTRIBUTION

Kol Nidre: Arranged by Mrs. Leah Jaffa Newman, Privately Published—50c

A new arrangement of the Kol Nidre written for violin and piano by Mrs. Leah Jaffa Newman has just been published by her father, Rabbi Philip W. Jaffa, former Regional Rabbi for the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. This most recent contribution to our Synagogal Musical library differs from all the previous arrangements of the Kol Nidre, according to Rabbi Jaffa, in that it is completely traditional—the violin solo incorporating the best from this ancient melody. The piano accompaniment is both simple and beautiful.

Mrs. Newman, teacher in the religious school of the Euclid Avenue Temple, is an accomplished pianist and musician, having received her musical education at the Cleveland Institute of Music of the Western Reserve University.

NEWS NOTES

Boston—Harvard College will not send representatives to the Olympics in Berlin next year if the German government attempts to bar Jews from the games. In addition Harvard will not make its usual contribution of \$1,000.00 to the general Olympic Fund if persecution of Jews and minorities persist.

Moscow—The entire Soviet press is running special articles to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the publication of Professor Albert Einstein's theory of relativity.

Tel Aviv—The Ethiopian government has ordered \$40,000 worth of lemon juices from the Assis factory.

Italy is negotiating with a Jewish leather factory in Tel Aviv for the purchase of \$100,000 worth of cartridge belts.

New York City — Eleven Yiddish theaters reopened for the season.

Jerusalem — Thousands of Palestine Jews visited the tomb of Rachael "Mother of Israel" as part of the penitential pilgrimage which is customary during the month of Ellul, prior to the opening of the Jewish New Year. The pilgrims included a large number of oriental Jews.

Pittsburgh—A donation of \$500,000 by Mrs. Sol Rosenblum of this city will make possible the addition of new buildings to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Mrs. Rosenblum has previously given the same amount which now makes the total of her gift \$1,000,000.

Jerusalem — The government broadcasting station will begin to function in December. Broadcasts in all three official languages, Hebrew, Arab and English will be made.
