COMMONS OPPOSES PALESTINE SCHEME

Plan for Legislative Council Assailed as Unfair to Jews—Land Program Decried.

SHIRKING OF DUTY IS SEEN

But Thomas Insists the Proposal Does Not Affect Mandate—Blow to Immigration Feared.

LONDON, March 24.—The House of Commons displayed deep hostility today toward the form of the legislative council it is proposed to establish in Palestine and also toward a proposal to forbid existing cultivators to sell all their land. There was no vote because the debate was technically on the consolidated fund bill, but if there had been a vote the government would have had an awkward moment.

Chaim Weizmann, Zionist leader, arrived in London a fortnight ago for the specific purpose of fighting the proposed council and he has done considerable lobbying. The success of his work was apparent in today's speeches.

Josiah Wedgwood, an independent member, who raised the question, declared the proposals, which involved a permanent Arab majority, were totally unfair to the Jews. It is particularly necessary, he said, to be fair to the Jews at a time when 500,000 of them are under persecution in Germany, with ten times as many being oppressed in Central and Eastern Europe. The proposed legislative council, he held, would involve a disgraceful surrender of Britain's mandatory responsibility.

Assails Land Scheme

"The proposed land legislation has already failed when tried in Egypt," he went on, "and can only succeed in raising the price of land. Why should efforts be abandoned which have conferred enormous benefits on the Arabs in the shape of economic improvement by placing power in the hands of those who don't want the Jews in Palestine at all?"

COMMONS OPPOSES PALESTINE SCHEME

A. C. Crossley, a Conservative, contended that Jewish cantons should be formed covering areas now occupied by Jews and that the rest of Palestine should be combined with Transjordania into Arab cantons.

Sir Archibald Sinclair, leader of the Liberal Opposition, pointed out that the Palestine Government had in hand a surplus of £6,000,000, which, he said, should be used to help the country. He voiced suspicions that Jewish immigration into Palestine was to be made more difficult and he declared that the Jews did not get a fair share of benefit from government expenditures.

Thomas Defends Scheme

J. H. Thomas, Secretary for Colonies, replying for the government, had a bad reception. His contention was that every government had favored the legislative council in principle since 1922 and that the government of 1932 had at Geneva reaffirmed its intention of forming one.

Sir Austen Chamberlain interrupted to affirm that the 1932 pledge was for a council "after an experiment in municipal government."

Mr. Thomas retorted that the Council proposed in 1932 had been accepted by the Jews though its membership would have been much less favorable to them than the present plan.

"The Council now proposed can't touch the mandate nor the work of the Jewish Agency, which would continue to settle conditions of immigration with the High Commission," Mr. Thomas went on. "Nor will the council be a platform for sedition because the Speaker of the Council would have power to prohibit printing seditious speeches and the membership would fairly reflect the numbers in different communities."

Winston Churchill said the proposal, if adopted, would likely "block the only way of escape for Jews in Germany, who are victims of vile tyranny."

JEWISH WELFARE FUND TO MAKE EXTRAORDINARY APPEAL

More than 1500 persons will start out Monday morning, May 11, to obtain the \$235,000 goal which the Jewish Welfare Fund is seeking in an extraordinary appeal to the Jewish community. The drive will open officially with a dinner meeting Sunday evening at the Carter Hotel, to be attended by contributors and the campaign organization. Senator William H. King of Utah, outspoken critic of Nazi persecution, will be the guest speaker.

The number of solicitors is the largest in the history of the city for such a campaign, and reflects in part the emergency nature of the drive. With the deepening tragedy in Germany, and the spread of physical pogroms and mass poverty in other countries of Europe, the Fund will seek to raise much more than was obtained last year. The response already obtained by the special gifts committee has assured campaign leaders that this sum can be secured.

The campaign will include the program of German Jewish emigration stimulated by the recent visit of the three English leaders to this country. There will be no other drive in Cleveland for this purpose.

In all, twenty-eight agencies will share in the Fund. In addition to European relief and resettlement, the Fund makes possible the treatment of indigent tubercular patients in national hospitals, the protection of Jewish rights and the combatting of anti-Semitism, and the development of constructive educational and cultural institutions.

Rabbi A. H. Silver and Rabbi B. R. Brickner, leaders of the successful campaign last year, are again general chairman and co-chairman, respectively. Joseph M. Berne heads the men's divisions, Mrs. Siegmund Perzog the women's division, and Jerome N. Curtis the young adult division. A large number of the congregation, sisterhood, men's club, and alumni association, are serving actively as officers and members of the campaign organization.
