RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

A NEW CHORAL GROUP, under the leadership of Harriet Korach Kohn, was organized last Sunday morning. It meets weekly, on Sundays, at 9:00 a. m., in the Chapel. Membership in this group is open to Confirmants of High School age, even though they do not attend the High School Department.

THE JUNIOR CHOIR directed by Lilly Berkowitz, now boasts a membership of 35. They replace the adult choir at Children's Services, they give several concerts for the school during the course of the year and in May they give a special concert arranged exclusively for parents of the Junior Choir. Membership is limited to pupils of the Intermediate and Junior High Departments of our Religious School.

AN AMAZING ATTENDANCE RECORD has been achieved by the Special Hebrew classes which meet three days a week, on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. For the first twelve weeks the average attendance was 93.1%, with an enrollment of 136.

THE CLUB DEPRTMENT has an enrollment of 238 with an average attendance thus far of 81.2%.

THE TOTAL ENROLLMENT of the Religious School is 854, with an average attendance of 91.1% in the Elementary Department, and 87.8% in the High School Department.

BRITAIN CRITICIZED ON PALESTINE ISSUE

Christian Group Here Calls on Government to Assist Jewish Settlement.

SEES PROMISES REVOKED

Resolution Adopted by 200 of Varied Faiths—Aid Asked in Fight on Persecution.

The Pro-Palestine Federation of America, a Christian organization, sharply criticized British policy there in a resolution adopted at a luncheon conference on "the Jewish problem" at the Hotel Astor.

More than 200 persons, including leaders in many denominations and several representatives of interested Jewish organizations, voted for the resolution submitted by Charles Edward Russell, organizer and head of the federation.

Mr. Russell read the text of the Balfour Declaration before offering the resolution and declared that after nineteen years the mandatory power had shown it did not believe in the "sanctity of covenants."

The resolution protested generally against persecution of Jews abroad and asserted "their natural place of refuge is Palestine." It continued:

"We, therefore, call upon the British Government to fulfill its covenanted pledges to the Jewish people and the world. We feel that it should cease to obstruct the Jewish settlement of Palestine and begin to further that settlement in accordance with its promises when it assumed the Palestine mandate.

"We believe that we speak the profound conviction of Christian America when we urge the British Government to rescind its illegal, unjust and indefensible partition of Palestine; that Transjordania shall be restored to its proper place as part of the Palestine territory; that Transjordania shall be thrown open to Jewish settlement and that there shall be removed all restrictions upon Jewish immigration to all parts of Palestine, except such as may be necessary to prevent the incursion of criminal or other undesirable persons.

"We believe the problem of the Jews could be the problem of the civilized world and we call upon our Christian brothers everywhere to assist us in bringing to an end the persecution of and terrible injustice toward the Jews that belie the very heart of the teachings of the founder of our faith."

Reference to Windsor

A variety of approaches to the problem under consideration was presented during a speech program of almost three hours. Mr. Russell, pointed to the plight of impoverished Polish Jews seeking haven in Palestine, pointed out that "the most distinguished exile that England ever had has found refuge in the bosom of a Jew. Can you beat that for irony?"

The reference to the Duke of Windsor, in seclusion at the Enzesfeld estate of Baron Eugene de Rothschild, was clear, although the speaker mentioned no names.

Bishop Francis J. McConnell, declared that "no race on earth had succeeded like the Jews under such heavy handicaps."

"Why not take away those handicaps and see what the Jews can do?"

Other speakers were Norman Hap-good, Dr. Frederick B. Robinson, president of City College; the Rev. Dr. Christian F. Reisner, pastor of the Broadway Temple; Professor Franklyn Hudgings, secretary of the sponsoring group; Pierre Van Paassen, journalist; the Rev. Dr. Henry Smith Leiper of the Universal Christian Council and the Rev. Walter M. Howlett of the Interfaith Committee.
