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MEMORIAL SERVICE

SISTERHOOD

HELPING THE BLIND

Transcribing into Braille popular works and distributing them to the Blind is the work of the Sisterhood Braille Committee headed by Mrs. Theodore Steiner.

Last year the committee transcribed "Singerman" by Myron Brinig in eight Braille volumes, and this year the committee is working on a ten-volume Braille edition of "This Man Is My Brother," also by Myron Brinig.

After these books have been circulated among Cleveland's Jewish Blind, they are sent to the National Library for the Blind for country-wide circulation.

The important task of teaching Braille transcription is done by Mrs. J. S. Enver. The transcribers, who use every spare moment in their home, (Braille transcription is not work that can be done in a group) are, Mesdames S. F. Deutsch, Emery Klineman, H. Reines, Belle Ollender and Sam Medalie. Shellers of Braille volumes are Mesdames Harry Korach, A. Schweid and Max Caplan. A fine and constructive Sisterhood project, quietly and faithfully carried on throughout the year.

PURIM BASKETS BRING LETTER

In response to the Purim Baskets which were sent from the Mishloach Monos Collections, Miss Emelie Levin, Assistant Executive Director of the Jewish Social Service Bureau writes:

We thought that you would be interested in knowing about the types of families to whom the baskets were sent.

The "S" family have always maintained a high standard of living. They have kept up their interests in Jewish life and the Children have attended a Sunday School. A few years ago Mr. "S" developed tuberculosis.

At first the family lived on their earnings and Mr. "S" was taken care of by the finest physicians. They hoped he would soon recover. At about the same time their savings were depleted, the doctor recommended that Mr. "S" be hospitalized. Mrs. "S" secured full-time work in a department store and taught their children who were 8 and 10 to care for themselves during the day. Mrs. "S" limited the family's expenditures to her small income which meant deprivation on a number of scores and a very limited allowance for any recreation.

The worker delivered one of the Purim baskets to the home while Mrs. "S" was working. The next day she telephoned the worker and cried as she expressed her gratitude for the holiday remembrance and of the opportunity that her children had to enjoy the feast reminiscent of better days.

The "B" family have had to be financially dependent upon the Jewish Social Service Bureau for the last few years because of Mr. "B's" incapacitating illness. The family have retained their extreme pride and refused to have anyone know of their financial situation. With four children, Mrs. "B" who is an excellent housewife is not able to afford any special luxuries. At each holiday, however, she manages some simple specialty to remind the children of the holiday. When the worker delivered the

Purim basket, she expressed her keen pleasure at the added luxuries and expressed gratitude too for the manner in which it was delivered, as she knew that no one else knew of her dependency.

All of the families to whom the baskets were sent expressed their gratitude in a like manner. It gives us great pleasure that the families are remembered during the holidays in the true spirit of Jewish giving.
