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FELIX WARBURG SAID: In January, 1932

"At a time when social ideals seem at a low ebb, when economic chaos and political confusion prevail, it is a source of constant inspiration to the Jewish people, as it should be to the world at large, to observe what high idealism and unselfish devotion can accomplish. Palestine, with its approximately two hundred thousand Jews, is today an impressive social laboratory, where faith in the future is the predominant characteristic of the people. Before our very eyes we witness the evolution of a new generation of men and women, who, proud of their Jewishness and eager to serve mankind, have the opportunity for the expression of the finest in the human soul. We might well regard what we are doing in Palestine as an investment in the social stability of the world as well as of the Jewish people."

In January, 1934

"It does not matter what divides Jewish opinion in times of tranquility, but when the roof of the Jewish house is crashing about our ears there is no room, no time for ideological discussion. We must bury our differences of opinion, however strongly we may feel them, and join hands in a strong effort to avert a calamity which, if it is not checked, may be a disaster not only for those directly involved, but all Jews, everywhere."

In July, 1934

(Continued from Page 2) other country is there where, for the disfranchised Jews, a hopeful future can be envisioned?

"What has been happening in Palestine has caused a revision of opinion in the minds of many American Jews. I only wish that all those who hold frozen prejudices against Palestine would actually visit that country. Their coldness to this Jewish phenomenon would melt in the face of the warmth and the color of men and women who are so lovably and nobly themselves. We need not occupy our minds now with the number of Jews that Palestine can eventually hold. They can become part of the economic life of the country and live on a basis of co-operation and mutual aid with the Arab people. It must, therefore, be a responsibility of all of us to assist in the development of Palestine so that we can transfer a maximum number of Jews from the misery and poverty in which they now live to a land that will enable

them to be self-respecting and self-sustaining."

In May, 1935

"The Keren Hayesod has performed an important function in creating a broad base of interest in Palestine. Its achievements in Palestine itself have been ever more important. Through its network of settlements the Keren Hayesod has demonstrated that a Jewish return to the soil is both possible and profitable."

In February, 1937

"Whatever may be done in many other fields of immigration, Palestine is bound for historic reasons to hold its important place in the heart and hope of the Jewish people. That a miracle of transformation has been wrought in Palestine for a generation and more, particularly since the British Government has become the Mandatory, is known to all men. Not less familiar to us are the devotion and sacrifice which have characterized the story of the rebuilding of Palestine by Jewish settlers.

THE SHEEP'S OFFENSE

When Rabbi Bunam was a young man, a friend borrowed a few dollars from the chest established for the repairing of damaged synagogue books in order to donate a gift to a poor man who was collecting funds for the marriage dowries of dowerless brides. This became known and the trustees summoned the borrower to a hearing. The defendant asked Rabbi Bunam to serve as his counsel.

Rabbi Bunam narrated the following well-known fable: "There was once an epidemic among the animals of the forest. The lion, the tiger, the wolf and the fox held a consultation, and the fox affirmed his belief that the epidemic was due to a great sin committed by some resident of the forest. He advised that all the animals assemble and confess their transgressions. The beasts of prey first confessed, and their excuses were accepted. Finally a sheep timidly approached and confessed that she had eaten a little hay from her owner's mattress.

"Aha," roared the lion, "you are the great sinner. You have abused your master's confidence." And the sheep was condemned to death.

Rabbi Bunam then turned to the judges, and said: "You, Reb, Leo. have been guilty of this and this; and you, Reb. Bear, have done so and so; you, Reb. Wolf, have acted wrongly in this and this instance. Yet you dare sit in judgment against a kind-hearted man because he has borrowed money for a highly worthy cause."

Everyone present felt ashamed and left without pronouncing judgment against the defendant.

SABBATH SPICE

The Rabbis used to say that he who observes the Sabbath finds an extra spice in his Sabbath food. Literally as well as figuratively, the Sabbath has added new flavors and new names to The famous Jewish gastronomics. "noodle schalet" and the various "cholents" originated because of the need to have warm food on Saturday, even though nothing could be cooked on that day.
