LIBBIE L. BRAVERMAN WRITES "CHILDREN OF THE EMEK"

Dressed in a bright blue jacket and decorated with a lovely picture of the two chief characters, comes "**Children of the Emek**," a book for boys and girls written by Libbie L. Braverman. Tamar and David are a pair of nine-year-old twins. They live in Nahalal in Palestine.

The reader will be delighted to know the two twins and he does get to know them well. The story tells of their work at home, their school, the trips they take, the parties they attend, their friends, their food, and their land—the New Palestine.

Mrs. Braverman tells how she came to write the book:

"I had just returned from a thrilling trip to Palestine, seven full weeks of constant traveling from colony to colony, from city to city. I was moved by memories of the old Palestine and stirred by the youthful vigor of the new. I was inspired by sites that recalled important historical events and by places that conjured up dramatic scenes of the Bible.

"I was so excited over what I had just seen that my enthusiasm must have been contagious, for my friends began to ply me with endless questions. How do the people live? How do they dress? What do they do?

"Even the children had their share of puzzling questions. They wanted to know about the children of Palestine. How they live? Where do they play? Do they have to go to school too?

"Teachers of our Religious School invited me to tell their children about Palestine. I created a pair of twins. I called them Ben Ami and Bath Ami, "the son of my people" and "the daughter of my people." Around the twins I began to spin a thread of adventure in Palestine. On one occasion it was a trip to Haifa. Another time in answer to questions about old Palestine, I took the twins on a "tiyyul" to the old city.

"Before I knew it the twins that I had created in my imagination took on life. They acquired a father and a mother. They assumed human char-

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LOYD GEORGE LAUDS JEWISH ACHIEVEMENTS IN PALESTINE

David Lloyd George, war-time Prime Minister of Great Britain, convinced that the Jews have made a "remarkable economic regeneration of the Holy Land," believes it "inconceivable" that the British Government will relinquish her trusteeship of Palestine when the task is only "half done."

His statement was made public by Harold Jacobi, Chairman of "Night of Stars," huge benefit show to be given for the United Palestine Appeal at Madison Square Garden on November 17th. Lloyd George's message is to be included in the "Night of Stars" annual reviewing Jewish achievements in Palestine during the past twenty years since the issuance of the Balfour Declaration by the British Government on November 2, 1917.

The message of Mr. Lloyd George is as follows:

"It is twenty years since the announcement of the Balfour Declaration by the authority of the Government of which I was Premier. The Declaration was issued in a time of unparalleled stress and anxiety for the British people but it was a document which received the Cabinet's most careful and anxious consideration.

"It received the full assent of all the Allied Powers and America. I am proud to have been associated with the culmination of a policy representing an act of historic justice to an ancient people to which the world owes much.

"That policy has already borne fruit in a remarkable economic regeneration of the Holy Land. It is a policy whose full significance is still only dimly apprehended.

"Britain as the trustee of the civilized nations of the earth has set her hand to a great and noble undertaking in Palestine and it is inconceivable that she will relinquish her task half done.

"The Jews have shown that, given

Ben Ami ceased to be just the "son of my people" and became David, the happy, eager lad, the twin brother of Tamar.

"I told and retold these tales, in classroom, in assembly and to my many young friends. They were fascinated by the adventures of the twins. Eagerly they asked for more. New characters appeared upon the scene. Before long, Elsa Freund, the little refugee from Germany, shared the spotlight with Tamar and David.

"The requests for the stories became so numerous that I decided to put them in writing, and made enough copies for our children. The material began to grow. It assumed the proportions of a book.

"And this is how the 'twins' came to be."

In 1936 Mrs. Braverman made a second trip to Palestine. Much new material was added as a result.

The illustrations for the book are by Temima Nimitzowitz. Miss Nimitzowitz too, has been to Palestine twice. For eight months in 1936, she lived and worked as a colonist at Mishmar ha-Emek, a cooperative quite close to Nahalal.

We urge all our readers to get this book. Adults as well as children will enjoy reading it.
