To this evening—Wednesday, March sixteenth—I invite all the families of our congregation. We want it to exceed in attendance even the Megillah Night of last year.

Also associated with the festival of Purim is the tradition of MISHLOACH MONOS—THE EXCHANGING OF GIFTS AND OF REMEMBERING THE POOR.

Several years ago, I started the practice of sending Purim baskets to a number of families who formerly were comfortably situated but who are now dependent upon relief. Last year we sent 46 baskets and the letters which I received in return touched me deeply.

Should you wish to help these families, I will be pleased to receive your gift.


