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HEBREW IN NEW YORK HIGH SCHOOLS

Seven public High Schools in New York now include the Hebrew language as one of the foreign tongues taught. Begun on an experimental basis in 1930, Hebrew classes now comprise two thousand students. At the end of three years' work in the language, the students are able to read selections from the whole range of Hebrew. literature-from the Bible to modern Hebrew stories. One period each week is devoted to cultural materials that lend background and understanding to the language and its literature; history, Palestinian geography, songs and festivals. At Thomas Jefferson High School, where the first class was introduced, six hundred students now attend nineteen classes and gather in an annual Hebrew Assembly which presents modern Hebrew melodies and dances.

The New York Board of Education has decided to introduce Hebrew into any High School where seventy students apply for it. Those with a good Hebrew background are admitted into advanced classes and receive credit for the period that they have skipped. Most American colleges now credit Hebrew for college entrance. All these factors, as well as the enthusiasm which the students have manifested in the study portend a growing future for Hebrew in New York public schools.

THIS IS THE LAND

Do we suffer because the gentile is wicked or because this or that social system exists? We suffer because we lack what other nations possess-a land. a home of our own. Without much doubt a new social order can put an end to anti-semitism, but that does not necessarily put an end to the Jewish problem. Under a new system the Jewish problem may lose its political implication but it will retain its economic and social aspects. Were this not so, then why was it necessary for the Soviet Union after the Revolution to make a serious effort to find a special territory for the Jews-first in the Crimea and then in Biro-Bidian?

If there must be a special territory for the Jewish people, why not Palestine? Why is every land on the globe considered suitable, Palestine alone excluded?

Because of the Arab population? But where can you find a region that is entirely unpopulated?

Or is it because Palestine absorbs thousands rather than millions? And yet what other land absorbs more Jews today?

Is an injury done to the Arab people? Since when is radicalism identified with a concept of justice that decrees to an Arab population of some 13,000,000 a territory larger than half the continent of Europe, while to a population of 16,000,000 Jews not even a territory less than one twenty-fifth of that area?

Is it because Jewish immigration to that area may eventually outnumber the Arabs and convert them into a minority? Quite possible. But since when has radical thought considered it just that one group shall not be a minority in any country and another group shall be that everywhere?

When all is said and done, we have not swooped down upon a people to rob it of its land. Here is where we became a nation. Here we began our history. This is the spot on the globe where we maintained our national independence. We did not cast off the land because we no longer desired it. It was taken from us by brutal force which, in terms of our own day, we shall call "imperialistic conquest." Two thousand years of history has not obliterated those facts from our memory.

VALUES

A few years ago Justice Cordozo, then Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals of the State of New York, speaking at a commencement, raised the question as to the choice which young people should make of the "values." He cited as an illustration the choice made of Tycho Brahe, the astronomer "whose name has re-echoed through the corridors of time." But he urged his young hearers not to make the blunder of supposing that to live in communion with the ineffable values of the spirit, to spend one's self utterly in sacrifice and devotion, is a lot reserved for a chosen few, for an aristocracy of genius, for those who will be ranked in history among the mighty or the great. "I have seen it in my own life," he says:

Along the common ways I have walked with men and women—you would not know them from the crowd—II have walked with men and women who had made the choice of Tycho Brahe. They had made it in humbler forms, by love, by gentleness, by sweetness, by devotion, by sacrifice of self within the narrow circle of the home; but, be it said to their undying glory, they had made it, none the less.

Looking upon those who have made such choices, he adds that life may seem simple while it lasts, that we may not always be conscious of its beauty, but that when the end comes, "behold it is illuminated with the white and piercing light of the divinity within it." To the glory of our humanity, the lowly equally with the mighty "may be partakers of this bliss." This is the word he is still saying out of his great wisdom, especially to young Americans to whom such values are still offered.

JOBS FOR JEWS

The admirable and indispensable work done by the American Jewish Congress in many fields culminates for the moment in the investigation concerning Jewish non-employment completed by Rabbi J. X. Cohen and briefly recorded by him together with the methods of the Congress for ameliorating existing conditions in a pamphlet entitled "Jews, Jobs and Discrimination."

In the light of the facts, our difficulty in getting into those "free" professions that alone are left us is all the more tragic. And how relentlessly we have pushed into the "free" professions is illustrated by the most terrible and most shameful sentence in Rabbi Cohen's report which reads as follows: "A survey of private educational institutions by a Christian investigator revealed that in schools that are practically controlled by Jews and largely attended by Jews, the teaching staff is usually Gentile."

Excellent and admirable is Rabbi Cohen's section on a program for meeting discrimination, and from his modest and sober account it is easy to see how wise and helpful is the activity of the American Jewish Congress in this respect. But I would suggest that while continuing this activity with all possible energy, the Congress should not neglect Jews afflicted with self-hatred. How can we expect Christian schools to admit Jews to their faculties when Jewish schools do not do so? An eminent merchant in the far West-to his shame and my sorrow-gave me the same silly reasons for limiting the Jews in his employ that any vulgar anti-Semite might give.

I do not wish to minimize the dangers and misfortunes of our situation. But I am sure that it is one of our sternest duties by all means in our power to discipline those ashamed and shameful Jews who by the evil example that they set in school, in shop, in store, in laboratory, on examination boards, deepen and intensify the sufferings of our Jewish youth and jeopardize its future in this land.
