JEWISH BOOK WEEK

The twelfth annual observance of Jewish Book Week will take place May 15 to 22nd. Synagogue and Public Libraries have called attention to this week with special exhibits of current and classic Jewish books, and rabbis and Jewish leaders have urged it as a time for Israel to reclaim its title as "The People of the Book."

For many years various organizations have encouraged the writing and reading of fine Jewish books in English. One is the Jewish Publication Society, which this year marks its Golden Anniversary,

SEEK AID FOR EUROPEAN JEWRY IN GREATEST JEWISH DRIVE

The most intensive Jewish drive ever conducted in Cleveland will be launched Sunday evening, May 8, when the Jewish Welfare Fund opens its drive for a minimum quota of \$328,000.

Chief purpose of the drive will be to aid the persecuted and poverty stricken Jews of Austria, Germany, Poland, Roumania and other European lands where they have had their life's work shattered by anti-Semitic barbarism.

Funds raised will provide food, clothing, shelter, free loans, retraining in industrial farm schools, and will enable many to emigrate. Resettlement in Palestine and other havens of refuge will be made possible through the fund.

Sixty agencies will share in the campaign, combining into one appeal sixty solicitations. Other beneficiaries will be agencies which are combatting anti-Semitism in this country, national Jewish hospitals for tuberculosis sufferers, and educational institutions dedicated to the sound development of Jewish youth.

Congressman Hamilton Fish of New York will be the guest speaker at the community dinner meeting which will open the drive Sunday at the Statler Hotel. Reservations may be made by calling Fund headquarters, Cherry 8176.

having published many classics of Jewish history, religion and fiction, since its inception in 1888. The Soncino Press in England has recently inaugurated a similar project in that country, of encouraging the reading of authoritative Jewish books through a membership organization. The Union of American Hebrew Congregations, besides publishing Jewish works written by competent authorities for educational purposes and adult reading, has compiled a "Jewish Library," comprising twenty-five of the best books on Judaism and Jewish life, to guide the book-lover. The whole "Library" can be bought as a unit from the Union.
