JEWISH CULTURAL INSTITUTE PRESENTS DR. HENRY SLOP

"AND NOW-MUSSOLINI"

"Whatever the world, including Jews, may feel with regard to the great wrong which Mussolini has been moved to commit against the Jewish people, I feel that it is of the utmost importance to make the following clear.

American Jews have no quarrel with Italian Americans. It would be utterly unjust to hold Italian citizens in America responsible for a wrong done by the Iatlian government to Jews in Italy. We have no quarrel with any group of fellow-Americans, least of all with the Italians, great numbers of whom I have been led to believe deeply regret the recent course of Mussolini. We shall not import into the American democracy any quarrels over injustice and wrong done our brother-Jews in another land. But American Jews may find it necessary, as a matter of self-respect and honorable self-defense to declare that, in view of the racist doctrine of Mussolini and its consequences, no decently self-respecting Jew can touch Italian wares or set foot upon Italian soil.

"... We are resolved as Americans to permit no break in the happy relations that have long obtained between American Jews and Americans of Italian birth or descent. Whether or not American Italians join American Jews in sorrow over this latest manifestation of the unwisdom and evil of Fascist rule in Italy. we stand together as Americans, renewing our common devotion to the American ideal of understanding and friendship between the different peoples and races and faiths in America. Mussolini and his racial doctrine shall not be suffered to divide us from our neighbors and friends of Italian blood and descent."

TO THE AMERICAN JEW

It is folly to imagine that a few Hebrew lessons and a few special festivals will produce a morally Semitic personality in face of the perpetual insidiously-destructive wash of the waves of alien life round this would-be island. He reads books but they are not Jewish books, sees pictures but they do not express the Jewish vision of life, hears music but it touches no chord of national feeling. The old Rabbis were shrewder who built dykes and barriers.

THREE NOVELS by Sholem Asch

Three separate stories written in different years, depict three phases of American Jewish life.

"Uncle Moses" is the first and earliest of these novels written in 1916. It is a study of Jewish immigrant life in Brooklyn during that period when whole Polish villages came over here to become sweatshop labor. Uncle Moses is the shrewd Jew whose treatment of his fellow villagers and employees is paternal but profitable. Encouraging in employees in their Jewish ways, he refuses them human dignity; pays them next to nothing.

"Chaim Lederer", the second novel is a study of the poor Jew who becomes wealthy and retires only to realize that he cannot separate himself from the laborers whom he has exploited.

"Judge Not", written in 1923, is the last of the three novels. As dramatic fiction it is the best. It is the story of a wealthy Jewish banker. A symbol of that type of Jewish success which capitalism has fostered and which the novelist condemns.

Mr. Asch's knowledge of his race and his humorus attitude toward their weakness is well portrayed. He yearns for the simple life that haunts so many of his characters and places greater emphasis on the forces within a society which condition human life and that is the most progressive quality of his pen.

MAY FLAVIN by Myron Brining

The story of an Irish girl brought up in the Chicago of the 90's. May Flavin is a humorous, quick-spoken, impetuous girl, her lifelong love for Mike Flavin and her family make it a deeply moving and poetic novel.
