The rabbi who dispatched the message in the name of Egyptian Jewry, declared that the Pope has vindicated himself in the eyes of the world as "the highest authority of lasting morality and of human conscience which the most outspoken blasphemies cannot silence."

BOOKS

THE FISHMANS by H. W. Katz, translated by Maurice Samuels.

This first novel of Mr. Katz, a German refugee now living in France was written so well that it earned for him the Heinrich Heine Prize, awarded by a group of well-known German writers in France.

Mr. Katz was born in Galicia and driven from there when the world war began. He lived for some time in Germany, from which country he was once more exiled. His novel is largely the story of his own life and of the memories of his family. The details of Jewish life which are touched upon in every scene express the humble and bewildered spirit of a people in travail. Pity is the dominating emotion of the book, but not self-pity. The author sees his people as one of the oppressed races of the earth, but as only one.
