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BRITAIN MAY OPEN PALESTINE'S DOORS

London, Nov. 24—The British Government is considering making a large increase in immigration figures for Palestine in an effort to cope with the refugee problem, Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald told the House of Commons today.

This morning, said Mr. MacDonald, he had received from the Jewish Agency detailed proposals for speeding up the rate of immigration in the light of recent events in Germany.

"These proposals are receiving at once my most careful consideration," he assured the House, "and I am consulting about them with the High Commissioner in Jerusalem."

It is understood the Zionist organization has asked permission to take 7,500 trained young farm workers between 18 and 25 years of age, 2,500 boys and girls between 15 and 17 years who have begun their agricultural training in Germany and 10,000 children between the ages of 6 and 14 years. The contention of the Zionists is that all these could be absorbed immediately if the German authorities allowed them to leave.

Increase Early Next Year Seen

While Mr. MacDonald was careful not to commit himself today, there is good reason to believe the British Government will be willing to increase the immigration quota early next year and to allow large numbers of German children to be received into Palestine.

MRS. SIGMUND BRAVERMAN, director of Extension Activities was elected vice-president of the Ohio, Indiana, Michigan Jewish Religious Teacher's Association at its Convention in Akron during the Thanksgiving week-end. Mrs. Braverman also served as secretary several years ago.

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Earlier today the government announced that it had waived all visa formalities for German refugee children between 5 and 17 years whose maintenance and training in Great Britain could be guaranteed by private organizations.

During today's debate Commons members of all parties begged the government to admit large numbers of German refugees into Palestine.

"If in Palestine, of all places, we are going to be 'sticky' about Jewish immigration at this time, we shall morally be in the gravest difficulty in the eyes of the world," said Herbert Morrison speaking for the Labor Party.

"There has been investigation as to how far Jewish refugees could be settled in certain colonial territories. But these territories may not be ready for rapid immigration and Palestine is ready.

"The Jews there are ready, economically and in other ways, to accept responsibilities for immigrants. They are ready to receive 10,000 children in their own homes. Why do we want to stand in the way of that?

Calls Jews Good Colonizers

"I think some colonial areas may well be suitable for Jewish colonies, for the Jews have proved to be first-class colonizers of real good, old empire-building qualities. But the onus is also on us to permit a much greater number of Jews to go to Palestine."

Mr. Morrison added that 22,000 additional laborers were needed in Palestine for the next orange-picking season.

Sir Archibald Sinclair, leader of the liberal party, said that "great work may be done for the Jews in British Guiana but it will take a very long time and very great amount of capital."

"In Palestine," he said, "immigrants (Continued on Flap)

ployment, thus bringing the two peoples

into common interest.

"I would give the Arabs assurance that in ten years their position would be substantially what it is today and that they would be in a large majority in the country.

"I agree that Palestine cannot be expected to absorb the whole of the exodus of Jews from other countries, but the figures of immigration should be settled."

If the Arabs refused to accept such a "reasonable" scheme, Mr. Churchill concluded, Britain should consider her obligation to them discharged and should carry out her policy without them.

Occasional voices were raised on the government side of the house, warning the government not to disregard the rights of the Arabs.

The Commons generally agreed that there had been too much indecision in the past and that proposed round-table conference of Arabs and Jews would be a good thing if it did not drag out this indecision still further.

Mr. MacDonald, speaking for the government, expressed the hope that the round-table conference would meet early in January "at the very latest." If the conference did not produce results "within a reasonable period of time" he promised the government would make its own policy.

The Jews are in Palestine, not on sufferance, but by right," Mr. MacDonald declared, "and today, under the lash of persecution in Central Europe, their eagerness to return to their own homeland is multiplied a hundredfold.

Mr. MacDonald acknowledged that the phenomenal growth of the Arab population since 1918 had occurred because the

Jews had brought health service and other advantages to Palestine with them. Nevertheless, he said, the Arabs still feared Jewish dominance, and Britain was still bound not to prejudice the Arab rights and position.

The round-table conference, he told the House, represented a sincere attempt to fulfill British obligations to both sides.

"The House, in its long history, has had placed in its keeping many noble trusts," the Colonial Secretary concluded, "but it has never had a trust so sacred as that of restoring peace and good will in the Holy Land.

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can be absorbed rapidly. Of course you cannot take a million refugees from Europe into Palestine, but you can take scores of thousands. Where else can you do that quickly—within two or three years?

"Palestine can make not a complete, but a substantial and immediate contribution to the solution of this refugee problem."

Winston Churchill, whose intervention last year prevented the Commons from approving a partition plan for Palestine, today suggested a ten-year immigration plan which the British Government should enforce with the consent of both Arabs and Jews.

Asserting that the government was "suffering from decrepitude of will power" in handling Palestine affairs, Mr. Churchill proposed that Jewish immigration should be allowed to keep pace with the growth of the Arab population—a figure he estimated as between 30,000 and 35,000 a year.

Suggests Basis for Increase

"People are dying, meeting grisly deaths from day to day and from week to week," said Mr. Churchill bitterly, "while here all that is done is to have debates from time to time and pay compliments and above all run no risk of taking any decision.

"Having regard to our wartime pledges," he went on, "it would obviously be right for us to decide now that Jewish immigration into Palestine should not be less in any given period than the growth of the Arab population, arising very largely from the animating and fertilizing impulse of the Jews. That would give the Jewish Zionists an interest in stimulating an increase in Arab population and helping them in their em-
