PASSOVER AND EASTER

The relationship between the two great Spring Festivals of Judaism and Christianity is an intimate one. The Eastertide, although different in meaning, grew directly out of the Passover season. The Last Supper was a Passover Supper. And the bread and the wine, which were established as the sacraments of the Eucharist (the Communion at that time, and which have come to be so significant in the Communion of the Church, were in origin the matso and the wine of the Seder table. The reference to Jesus as the "Pascal Lamb", sacrificed on this occasion, completes the picture. Indeed, the early Christian service of worship as a whole, follows the order and even some of the expressions of the Passover ritual.

With rare exceptions, Easter occurs during the Passover week. Originally, the Church merely accepted the Jewish calculation of the 14th of Nisan as fixing their season, too. The Crucifixion was observed on the first day of Passover, if it fell on Friday, or on the Friday of that week. Two days later, of course, Easter was observed. In the third century, however, the Christians desired to be independent of the Jews and drew up a cycle of calendation for themselves, setting Easter on the first Sunday fol-

lowing the first full moon after the vernal equinox. Passover has been recognized since ancient times as falling on that very moon. Therefore, although the calculations are independent, the periods still usually coincide. It is only rarely, as this year, a Jewish leap year, that they occur a month apart.

## THE GREAT SABBATH AND OTHERS

Certain Sabbaths, such as the one just before Passover, have special characters and names of their own, under the influence of the nearby festivals, whose satellities they have become. Thus the Sabbath falling on April 20th this year is known as "Shabos Ha-godol" or "The Great Sabbath" and is devoted to a spiritual preparation for the Pesach festival. Traditionally, it was one of the two times in the year when the Rabbi would preach (on other Sabbaths the travelling "Magid" would sermonize). The other occasion for a Rabbinical address was likewise a special Sabbath: "Shabos Shuvo" or the "Sabbath of Return," which occurs between New Year's Day and the Day of Atonement and derives its name from the portion from the book of Hosea read on that day. pleading for Israel's repentance.

Inasmuch as the first day of the eleventh month (Ador) was the time for every man to pay his tax of a half a shekel to the Temple, the preceding Sabbath was made a day of reminder. It is called "Shabos Shekolim" and the law of the Shekel in Exodus is read on this occasion. The Sabbath just before Purim is known as "Shabos Zochor," referring to the section, "Remember Amalek" (and what he did to Israel) in Deuteronomy, which is read; the wicked Haman of the Purim story is identified with Amalek. Tisho B'Ov, which marks the day of the destruction of both the first and second Temples, has gathered Continued on Page 6

It is preceded by "Shabbos Chazon," the "Sabbath of the Vision" of the first chapter of Isaiah, which foretells the destruction of Jerusalem and gives the reasons for it. And it is followed by "Shabos Nachamu," referring to the phrase "Comfort ye," with which Isaiah (in chapter 40) consoles his people with the thought that their time for suffering has been completed and that they can take courage and rebuild their lives.
