THE NATION MOURNS LILLIAN D. WALD

Leaders in all walks of life paid tribute to the fruitful service of Lillian D. Wald, pioneer Jewish social worker and founder of the Henry Street Settlement, who died recently at the age of 73. Her decision to devote her life to bettering conditions in New York's East Side came after her duties as a nurse had made her acquainted with the desperate plight of that district. Setting up the first Settlement House there more than 40 years ago, she brought aid and encouragement to the sick, the needy and the friendless. Combining prophetic zeal with angelic mercy, she waged an incessant battle with word and pen to secure medical attention for the poor, recreation centers for East Side children, and the elimination of slums and sweatshops. She is credited with originating the idea of a Federal Children's Bureau which has brought great benefits to the entire nation.

Miss Wald received world-wide recognition, and was known and admired by presidents and kings. Upon the numerous occasions honoring her, she received such awards as the Distinguished Service Certificate of the City of New York, the Gold Medal of the National Institute of Social Sciences, the Better Times Medal, as well as recognition from the Rotary Club, International. America mourns the loss of a distinguished commander in the legion of mercy.—From "Jewish Scene".

TRUE TOLERANCE

We need a different emphasis on the word "tolerance". We speak of tolerance in the negative sense. We say: "I don't like that man, but I tolerate him," or, "I dislike such and such a situation, but I tolerate it."If the man is evil, or the situation unbearable, it should not be tolerated at all. Evil must never be tolerated. It must be eradicated, with every physical and spiritual means at our disposal. The religion of another man, unless it is a religion of evil, should not be tolerated, but should be respected and furthered. The Jewish faith is a noble and ancient one. It is entitled to respect, not tolerance.

The word "tolerate" is derived from the Latin tolero, tolerare, to lift, to bear up, to carry forward. It connotes a willingness to do something, not merely to accept something. I am tolerant because I want this country to be a united America, in which I, whose ancestors came from England a century and a half ago. can stand shoulder to shoulder with the man whose parents came here from Ireland or Germany, from Austria or Russia, a generation or less ago; or with the man whose forebears were brought here as slaves from Africa. This is the glory of America, that we are all free and all endowed with "certain unalienable rights." Not merely a few of us. not merely those whose forebears happened to come earlier, not only those who happen to live on the right side of the tracks. But all of us, every man of whatever race, creed, color, or economic status. Let us not be satisfied with tolerance in the negative sense of merely refraining from hate. Let us have the tolerance which is a creative force for a finer and nobler civilization than the world has ever yet produced.-Bruce Barton.

IKSGIVING EVE SUPPER DANCE

JEWISH VOCATIONAL SERVICE MAKES 1220 JOB PLACEMENTS IN FIRST YEAR

Celebrating its anniversary on Monday, October 14, 1940, with a board-staff dinner-program attended by representatives of all the major Jewish social agencies in Cleveland, the Jewish Vocational Service presented a detailed account of "Statistics," reits first year's work. ported Maurice Bernon, president of the Board of Trustees, "tell only part of the story, but they sketch the outlines for us. From October 15, 1939, to October 1, 1940, over 4500 applicants for employment, vocational guidance service, or both, came to us from the Cleveland Jewish community. Of these people, 994 were tested in our psychology department and 850 were given vocational counseling service. At the end of our first month, we had 347 active applicants receiving service from us; on September 30, 1940, we had 1676. During these 11½ months, we made 1220 job placements. Placements in our first month totaled 33; on September 30, 1940, they totaled 186."

Mr. Bernon presented a frank analysis of the achievements of the agency and of the work still to be done. He pointed out, for example, that as encouraging as the placement record of the agency has been, there are still many large employers in the community who have not used its services, and it is still difficult to find positions as apprentices or productions workers in factories for the many young people who come to the Jewish Vocational Service with interest in such work and aptitude for it. With regard to refugees also, he sketched a picture steady progress, but showed that an enormous increase of interest in the hiring of refugees by employers in the community must come about before the problem can reach any real solution.

Progress in the vocational counseling work of the Jewish Vocational Service was reported with the announcement of a recent grant from the Council of Jewish Women to make possible an experimental work training project.

Among those present at the meeting, in addition to the board and staff of the Jewish Vocational Service, were Messrs. J. Berne, Samuel Goldhamer, Philip Bernstein, Louis Selden, Marc J. Grossman, David Warshawsky, Dr. Benjamin Levine as well as Mrs. Marc Einstein.

JEWS LEAVING SPAIN. FEAR OF NEW INQUISITION.

The Falangist Party in Spain has launched an intensive campaign for the re-enactment of the anti-Jewish Inquisition laws, which were formally abolished during the Republican regime.

Owing to the fears of the Jews that Spain is making preparations to join the Axis Powers against Britain, many of them are leaving for Portugal.

Most of the Jews in Spain are concentrated in Barcelona, where they number 500, as against 1,000 at the end of 1938. Before the civil war they numbered 5,000. The 1,000 Jews who remained when Franco took Barcelona mainly traders and artisans, with little interest in political affairs, and mainly Stateless or of Polish nationality. They live in an atmosphere of hostility, for they have been discriminated against, and the Press and wireless have conducted a violent anti-Jewish campaign. But so far full-blooded racialism has not adopted. - From the been "Jewish Chronicle" Oct. 4, 1940.

CONGREGATION CELEBRATES 200th ANNIVERSARY

Congregation Mikveh Israel, Philadelphia, is two hundred years old. It came into existence in 1740 and will celebrate its bicentennial with a program of special events beginning Nov. 27th and continuing through December 1.

This Orthodox Spanish-Portuguese congregation, founded before this nation was born is rich in a patriotic tradition which links its history closely with America's early struggle for freedom. Among its rabbis, Gershom Mendes Seixas was one of the most celebrated supporters of the Revolutionary cause. In Civil War days, Sabato Morais was acclaimed nationally because of his antislavery sermons. Many members of that congregation were among those who served in the ranks and as officers during the Revolutionary War. Perhaps its most famous member of that period was Haym Solomon, the banker-patriot who raised funds to help Washington and his ragged Continental Army stave off starvation during the famous winter at Valley Forge.

Among the treasured records of Mikveh Israel are some interesting historical documents. On its books are acknowledgments of contributions by Benjamin Franklin and other notables toward the building of one of its early synagogues. Among its other records are ancient deeds and surveys, one of them signed by John Penn, son of William Penn, the Quaker founder of Philadelphia, and a letter from President Washington.

In addition to its contributions to the general American scene, this congregation has contributed to the American-Jewish Scene as well. Dropsic College for Hebrew and Cognate Learning and Gratz College are both named for members of this congregation who founded those institutions. The Jewish Theological

Seminary was the result of the efforts of Sabata Morais. In recent years, the esteemed Dr. Cyrus Adler was President of Mikveh Israel Congregation.

This bicentennial celebration is a truly great occasion.

Two hundred years of patriotic and religious service is an enviable record. To you, Mikveh Israel, our congratulations.
