THE JEWISH ATTITUDE TOWARD THE CHILD

Jewish Even in ancient davs. the school differed from that of its neighbors. The Spartans were dedicated to the submission of the child's will to that of the corporate state, while Jewish education had for its goal the recognition of the individual's moral responsibility. The Spartan school was a military barracks, but the Jewish school was a house of study and prayer. The Jewish child was consecrated to the Torah. Even Plato, in his "Republic," argues for the complete submergence of the individual to the community. In Jewish life the emphasis was placed upon the individual, who in turn formed the community; but in other states, the individual was lost in the advancement of the abstract idea of the state.

This liberal attitude extended to the home and the Synagogue. Although the father was legally master of the household, he would be expected to join his children at their games, particularly on the Sabbath and holidays. The Talmud relates instances of great scholars indulging in play with their children.

Many symbols were added to our ritual in order to attract the young to the Synagogue. The Passover Seder ceremony was planned to attract and instruct the child in the lesson of freedom. Lag B'Omer became the picnic day for Jewish children. Thus the child was encouraged to participate actively in the religious life of his people.

The Jewish attitude toward the child has ever been one of interest in and devotion to his development, morally and spiritually. The Religious School of today is carrying on the tradition of training the individual toward the full expression of his character so that he may be fitted to take his place in and help shape the destiny of American democracy. —Lewis Satlow.

HENRY BERGSON, AN APPRE-CIATION

News comes from France that Henri Louis Bergson, 81, outstanding French philosopher of his time and winner of the Nobel prize for literature in 1927, died in Paris, Saturday, January 4th.

Bergson, whose impact upon philosophy was as great perhaps as that of any man since Kant, was a Jew. As a young man, he was a disciple of the materialist Spencer. As Bergson's own thought developed, he rebelled at the solely materialistic philosophy held by most thinkers of the latter part of the 19th century and searched psychology to find an intuitive basis for man's life.

Bergson's most influential work, "Cre ative Evolution," appeared in 1907. It offered a new hope to religionists, romanticists and idealists who had hitherto been unable to find in latter-day philosophy any basis for idealism.

He was a great Frenchman. He tended the French vineyard with all his might, with all his soul and with all his strength. He neglected his wn people. Then came the French debacle and with it, the termination of the ideology of the French Revolution. The Jews were no longer to be equal citizens with the right to equal opportunity. They were to become second-class citizens.

A bit of shame must have been left in the ruling clique. The French Government offered Bergson exemption from the regulations requiring the resignation of Jewish employees from state positions. A Laval facing a Bergson!

Something hidden, long buried under heaps of strange cultures and strange visions stirred in the now old, sick Henri Bergson. He reacted with matchless pride in his persecuted, downtrodden and tortured people. Perhaps he found "meaning" in their suffering ...

He refused to accept the offer of the Vichy Government, exempting "him" from the regulations imposed upon other French Jews after Vichy's subtle "understanding" with Nazism.

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INSURANCE FOR DEMOCRACY

In upholding the constitutionality of the state of New Jersey's law against race hatred Common Pleas Judge John C. Losey has made one more step toward keeping democracy strong. In his decision John Losey said:

"A speech which in any way incites, consoles, promotes or advocates hatred, abuse, violence, or hostility against persons by reason of race does not appear to be fair, just, right or reasonable, and naturally tends to provoke or incite others to break the peace . .." the court said. "It does not appear arbitrary or unreasonable for the Legislature to make it an offense. It appears to be a reasonable, preventive measure.

"In the exercise of police powers the State has wide discretion in determining its own public policy and what measures are necessary for its own protection and properly to promote safety, peace and good order of its people . . . the Legislature is primarily the judge of the necessity of a law."

Free speech he concluded, was "never intended to constitute an absolute license to speak or publish anything one pleases."

WISDOM FROM THE TALMUD

Rabbi Abbahu and Rabbi Chivva happened to meet in a certain place. Rabbi Abbahu lectured on Agada (legends). Rabbi Chiyya lectured concerning Halacha (traditions). The consequence was that the audience deserted Rabbi Chiyya's lecture, and flocked to hear Rabbi Abbahu's talk on legends. This caused the former to feel slighted. Whereupon, Rabbi Abbahu said to the audience: "I shall narrate a parable. It may be likened unto two men who entered a town. One sold precious stones and pearls. while the other was selling junk. Who was the busiest? Surely the junk man had more customers."

The Rabbis said: "Four reasons cause the property of the rich to be depleted: For failing to pay on time the wages of labor; for not paying living wages; for placing one's own obligations upon others; for arrogance."—From Baltimore Hebrew Cong. Bulletin.

HE IS AN AMERICAN!

He is an American.

He hears an airplane overhead, and if he looks up at all, does so in curiosity, neither in fear nor in the hope of seeing a protector.

His wife goes marketing, and her purchases are limited by her needs, her taste, her budget, but not by decree.

He comes home of an evening through streets which are well-lighted, not dimly in blue.

He reads his newspaper and knows that what it says is not concocted by a bureau but an honest, untrammeled effort to present the truth.

He has never had a gas mask on.

He has never been in a bombproof shelter.

His military training, an R. O. T. C. course in college, he took because it excused him from the gym course, and it was not compulsory.

He belongs to such fraternal organizations and clubs as he wishes.

He adheres to a political party to the extent that he desires—the dominant one if that be his choice, but with the distinct reservation that he may criticize any of its policies with all the vigor which to him seems proper—any others as his convictions dictate, even if it be one which holds that the theory of government of the country is wrong and should be scrapped.

He does not believe, if his party is out of power, that the only way in which it can come into power is through a bloody revolution.

He converses with friends, even with chance acquaintances, expressing freely his opinion on any subject without fear.

He does not expect his mail to be opened between posting and receipt nor his telephone to be tapped.

He changes his place of dwelling and does not report so doing to the police.

He has not registered with the police.

He carries an identification card only in case he should be the victim of a traffic accident.

He thinks of his neighbors across in-

ternational borders—of those to the north as though they were across a state line rather than foreigners—of those to the south more as strangers, since they speak a different language from his, and with the knowledge that there are now matters of difference between his government and theirs, but of neither with an expectancy of war.

He worships God in the fashion of his choice.

His children are with him in his home, neither removed to a place of greater safety, if young, nor, if older, ordered ready to serve the state with sacrifice of limb or life.

He has his problems, his troubles, his uncertainties, but all others are not overshadowed by the imminence of battle and sudden death.

He is a forunate man.

He is an American.
