PEOPLE MUST WANT RELIGION

"People seem to want religion. They build and support synagogues. They maintain rabbis in pulpits. In most instances among the great middle class elements of our population—the bulwark of democracy—they send their children to religious school. The boys usually become Bar Mitzvah. Boy and girls together at the proper age are usually confirmed.

"Yes—people seem to want Judaism. They want to maintain it for themselves. They want to preserve it for their children.

"Yet they act, for the most part, in an utterly paradoxical manner. The very heart and essence of organized religion is public worship. Few indeed, even under most optimistic conditions, are the members of Reform Jewish congregations who attend public worship with any degree of regularity. Their rabbis are invited to address enormous communal gatherings. When they speak in various communities, crowds pour out to hear them. Yet in their own synagogues, where it is a matter of the essential life of religion, their own constituency are indifferent to attendance on public worship.

"We want our children confirmed in the faith of our fathers. Yet we never feel that we have the duty to give those children evidence of our own interest in and loyalty to that faith, by going along with them for a brief Friday evening or Sabbath morning worship.

"This is no local malady. It is almost universal. Vivid or sensational lecture subjects may momentarily fill the pews—but not with folks who come to pray. And it is on prayer and worship that religion rests.

"Unless we can recapture the spirit of Jewish worship and prayer, Judaism is doomed. The world today can ill afford to lose the historic Jewish public worship on Friday evening or Saturday morning."

TEMPLE FLASHES

Close to 700 people attended the 95th Annual Congregational meeting last Sunday night. . . A departure from previous years was the president's annual report. The brevity of Mr. James Miller's report not only did not mar its all-inclusiveness but gave it a clarity that appealed to everyone who heard it . . . In a heart warming message Rabbi Brickner urged that we stop getting hysterical over anti-Semitism. It is a disease, he said, which we Jews did not bring into the world and about which we can do little. Let us instead turn our energies to building up our characters and our idealism . . . Some quotes from the Rabbi's stirring message: "Back to religion, back to God, back to Judaism." "The Jewish people is known in history for its faith and for its spiritual contributions." "We have taken on the materialism of the people around us and have forgotten that for which we were created." "The time has come for our adult congregation to return to the study of our history, our Bible, and the precepts of our religion." . . . The formal part of the meeting was over at 9 p. m. and the social in Alumni Hall followed . . . Dancing to the music of an excellent band, refreshments served all evening, the mingling of a happy crowd, the presence of so many young people all contributed to a memorable evening that perfectly expressed the slogan of this year's meeting—"a congregational family get-together."

GERMAN-JEWISH REFUGEES IN THE U. S. A.

Jacob Lestchinsky in a feature article in the *Jewish Daily Forward* (October 14) comes to the conclusion that most of the German-Jewish refugees who immigrated to this country within the last eight years adjusted themselves economically and some of them are even successful in various business enterprises. He claims that a considerable number of refugees brought with them substantial funds. Although skeptical of the statement in the weekly *Financial World* which estimates that the refugees during the years 1939-1941 brought to the United States a sum between \$750,000,000 and \$1,000,000,000, he nevertheless believes that some of them came with considerable means. He also quotes two items which appeared in a recent number of the *Aufbau*, refugee publication. One to the effect that a real estate firm of Max Kanne, a refugee, had a turnover of more than \$2,000,000 in the first year of its existence and is making good progress. Another item announces the opening of eleven new refugee business enterprises in New York, among them several fur establishments. Similar items have been appearing in the *Aufbau* every week.

"Of course, most of the German-Jewish work hard and barely make a living, but there is no dire need among them . . . Recently, an investigation was made of 269 enterprises founded by refugees. These enterprises are scattered over 82 cities and 36 states. Of these, 125 are retail stores and 33 wholesale; 85 of these are factories . . ."

CLEVELAND ZIONIST GROUPS TO CELEBRATE BALFOUR DAY

On Sunday evening, November 2nd, the Jews of the United States will mark the 24th anniversary of the Balfour Declaration which was issued in the third year of the first World War, and which pledged Great Britain's support for the establishment of a Jewish Homeland in Palestine.

That declaration has not yet been fulfilled.

On that evening, therefore, the Jews in every American city will meet to restate their aims and aspirations in Palestine, to call upon Great Britain to fulfill her pledge, to crystallize American public opinion in support of our cause.

All Cleveland Zionist groups and parties are sponsoring a meeting at the Jewish Center. This meeting on Sunday, November 2, will commemorate the Balfour Declaration and will also pay tribute to the memory of the late Justice Louis D. Brandeis and Menahem Ussishkin, who died last month.

Participating in the program will be Rabbis Barnett R. Brickner, Israel Porath, Rudolph M. Rosenthal, and Abba Hillel Silver. Rabbi Armond E. Cohen will preside.

The meeting will begin at 8:30 p. m.

On Sunday afternoon, November 2nd, at 3 p. m. representatives of Cleveland Zionist youth groups will plant trees in memory of Brandeis and Ussishkin at the Hebrew Gardens.

Because their own misery needs a target.

Because they cannot face facts, and need a fiction to account for their plight. plight.

And the demagogues, the Hitlers, also need a fiction.

Let the sick be well again. Let the foreigners be American once more.

Remember the shining dream of a brotherhood of man on the earth of the new world.

Remember that men came from the south and north, the east and west, from near and far. Remember that their skins were black and white and that their tongues spoke strange and foreign words but that all spoke for democracy.
