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## MT. SINAI HOSPITAL EXPANSION AND IMPROVEMENT FUND

After twenty-five years of faithful and efficient service to the community, during which the demands upon its varied departments have increased from three to thirty times over, Mount Sinai is faced with the immediate necessity of building additions and improvements to meet the pressing demands upon its services.

Normal demands require the additions and expansion; national defense needs make immediate action for the rehabilitation of the Hospital imperative at this time.

The Board of Trustees, after long and careful study, proposes to make sixteen major alterations and additions in line with the recognized needs and the most rigid economy.

Plans prepared by the architects include the addition of 61 adult beds and 15 babies beds. double the research and laboratory facilities, almost triple the surgery space, new admitting rooms for private, ward and emergency patients, an entirely new delivery suite and nursery to more than double present capacity, new consultation rooms, a central supply department and needed alterations to a dozen departments. The cost will be \$588,000.

An immediate appeal for contributions, payable over three years at the rate of \$196,000 a year, has been enthusiastically endorsed by the Jewish Welfare Federation.

Before the end of the year, a member of the committee and team organization supporting this appeal will call upon members of the community for contributions to the hospital.

In the spirit of patriotism and with profound gratitude for the blessings we have received, let us all contribute generously.

Let us make this an outstanding contribution of the Jewish people of Cleveland to their city—a contribution of note to Mt. Sinai Hospital which serves every creed and class and which has met every emergency with heroic service.

## STARS IN THEIR COURSES

It is hardly news that if one goes out of doors and away from the bright lights during these Fall evenings he will be able to assure himself that the stars are still in their courses. Yet the fact is important. The Autumn constellations are coming up. If one is patient he may even see the Pleiades, the Hyades and Orion. The Big Dipper, the North Star and the Milky Way remain faithfully at their posts. With long-enough watching the revolution of the Big Dipper and its majestic companions around the North Star may be observed. And these are nights for watching, before the cold shuts in and the glories of the Winter sky have a competitor in the hearth fire.

The Psalmist considered the heavens long ago, and asked, What was man that their Maker should be mindful of him? Victorious man must indeed be humbled when he turns his eyes upon that eternal parade. But when mankind is tormented by anxiety, when the forces of evil arrogantly walk the earth, when the singing dies away and there is no more dancing, there may be comfort in this vast spectacle of the cosmic order and rhythm. Far universes throb in billion-year pulsations, but though the heart of eternity is vast beyond human calculation, it may be there and it may be warm.

Our little systems shrink under these night skies. It is the easier to believe in a mightier System that quivers when the sparrow falls, is one with human love and human valor, and moves with mathematical precision toward peace and justice.

### OVER GHETTO WALLS

Word has come through that on Rosh Ha-shono, Poles demonstrated their sympathy with the Jews of Warsaw by throwing flowers and baskets of fruit over the ghetto walls. The fruit, especially, was more than a gesture, for Warsaw Jews have been prohibited from buying fruit or vegetables for many months. The Danish reporter who revealed this information has been deprived of his right to send news out of Berlin for the next six months. Besides, declared the Ministry of Propaganda, the acts of sympathy were committed by "irresponsible elements." Polish newspapers, however, gave the case away when they attacked Poles who continue to be friendly to Jews, threatening to confiscate their property and drive them into the ghetto with their "friends."

### HUMANITY ON TRIAL

In the past we were persecuted despite the fact that we were the people of the Bible; today, however, it is just because we are the people of the Book that we are persecuted. The aim is to exterminate not only ourselves but to destroy, together with us, that spirit expressed in the Bible and in Christianity which made possible the rise of civilization in Central and Northern Europe.

If this aim is achieved, Europe will become a barren waste. For human community life cannot long endure on a basis of crude force, brutality, terror, and hate.

The power of resistance which has enabled the Jewish people to survive for thousands of years is a direct outgrowth of Jewish adherence to the Biblical doctrines on the relationships among men. In these years of affliction our readiness to help one another is being put to an especially severe test.

Each of us must personally face this test, that we may stand it as well as our fathers did before us. We have no other means of self-defense than our solidarity and our knowledge that the cause for which we are suffering is a momentous and sacred cause—Albert Einstein.

### AMBULANCES AND KITCHENS FOR BRITAIN

At least fifteen ambulances now in service with British or Allied forces have been donated by Jewish organizations or individuals, according to William Ruxton, president of the British-American Ambulance Corps. Among the donors, he listed the Daniel Guggenheim Foundation, Hadassah, New York's Harmonie Club, and B'nai B'rith lodges. Swelling the number of mobile canteens given by Jewry to besieged Britain, Lady Reading has announced the presentation of seven such units by the Jewish community of Mexico, together with a check for the maintenance of six of them for a year.
