JEWISH ODDITIES

In the Middle Ages governments did not have regular post-office systems. A letter or a message was a rare occasion. When the necessity for transmission of a message occurred, it was normally carried by a special messenger, or by a traveler or trader who, in the course of his journey from one locale to another destination, would do the letter-writer the favor of delivering his missive.

The ideal behind the U. S. Post Office's motto of "Neither rain, nor wind, nor the gloom of night shall keep these messengers from their appointed rounds" was foreign to that era.

The only people to have regular mailcarriers were Jews, who employed their fellow-religionists to carry letters to other towns or countries. In some communities there were official Jewish lettercarriers under state control. Both men and women served as letter-carriers. Jews were employed because the addresses were written in Hebrew, which, of course, gentiles were unable to read. —From the Institutional, New York.

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WHAT WILL THE NEW YEAR BRING

I

How Long Will This War Last?

This war will last not less than two years and possibly four or even five years. We must not make the mistake again of underestimating German strength. Hitler may now be reorganizing for an "air blitz" over England in the spring, or a push through Turkey to attack Russia from the rear in order to secure oil in Baku and Persia. Oil for his war machine is Hitler's greatest need today.

This war cannot end in a year because our arms production will not be at its peak by the end of 1942, nor will we have built sufficient ships to transport our war materials, nor will we have the five million trained and equipped men necessary to carry on an offensive war, the only kind that can win.

It is folly to expect a victory by internal collapse in Germany until at least three things have happened:

1. The food of the German people gives out; 2. The Germans are defeated on the battlefield and pushed back behind their own frontiers; 3. Hitler is killed or dies.

Therefore I predict.

1. Hitler is now building an enormous fleet to carry the war into the North Atlantic this summer.

2. Our boys will be in Dakar in six months and all over the world in a year.

3. Within a year, women will be brought in to the war in America as they have been in England, not only in factories but in the armed service, in flying target planes, in signalling and in radio communication.

A long war, since it is inevitable, will not be without its benefits. It will take a long war to burn out all the cancer cells and to purge the social organism from the deadly germs which have covered it like a plague. Two world wars in twenty years are symptomatic of a cancer that has been eating at the hearts of humanity. Only when the social organism has been cleansed in fire, can we hope the body politic to be restored to health and sanity.

How Much Will we Have to Tighten Our Belts to Win the War?

There will be no shortage of basic foodstuffs in 1942. In 1940 and 1941 great stocks of consumer goods, including farm products, were produced. There will be restriction of sales of many types of consumer's goods, especially luxury items.

I look for no further labor legislation to control strikes because labor and management have agreed to arbitrate their differences. Labor will do its share, though I expect the closed shop to become even more general. I also look for the CIO and AFL to get together, since labor cannot be responsible unless it is united. Floors and ceilings on wholesale prices may be expected, so that inflation and a precipitous rise in the cost of living may be averted. If this is done it will automatically freeze wages. Weekly work hours will be not raised much above 48 because the English experience after Dunkirk has proved that fatigue resulting from overwork decreased production rather than increased it.

Our national debt will increase tremendously but economists now tell us that our nation could support an annual national debt of four thousand billion inside of fifty years based on the scale of productivity not much greater than that of the past half century.

III

What Leadership is Religion Capable of Giving Us in Time of Stress?

1. It can counteract the defeatism and pessimism which will come from early defeats and generate confidence in our ultimate victory.

2. It can keep pointing out that this is a war for the preservation of the opportunity for liberty and pursuit of happiness.

3. It can forstall the breeding of hate as such. God seeks to destroy sin and not the sinner. We must not allow the thing we want to kill to get into our own blood.

4. It can show people how character is purified in the crucible of suffering, so that we emerge better people individually and collectively.

5. It can see that we not only win the war but win the peace. We must keep before America the hope for a better world order so that it will not be frustrated as it was after the last war. That is the duty of every preacher and every church in America.
