BOOMERANG

As far as the people of Europe are concerned, if one may conclude from the daily mounting evidence, they are now profoundly disillusioned with anti-Semiitism. They are not only sick at heart over the cruelty and savagery it has let loose; they have also come to realize the danger of it all for themselves, and are turning away from it more than from any other aspect of Nazism. Anti-Semitism is now perhaps the most discredited movement in Europe. Nor is the sentiment against it merely negative in expression. Unprecedented friendship is now being extended by Christians to the Jews in Europe. At no time within living memory has Christian Europe shown a more sympathetic concern with the Jewish problem, and given more practical aid to the Jews. Despite the Nazi censorship, reports of this remarkable fact penetrate into the newspapers daily, providing ample proof that Europe is now in the midst of the strongest reaction against anti-Semitism that it has ever known.
