Purim is approaching, falling this year on Sunday, March 21st. SCANNING THE NEWS

Japanese military authorities have addressed a "stern warning" to all Jews living in the Philippine Islands accusing them of black market speculations and espionage, says the Nazi DNB.

Faced with King Christian's opposition to the contemplated anti-Jewish measures, the Nazi have abandoned their plan to introduce yellow badges for Danish Jews and to segregate the 5,000 Jews of Denmark in ghettos.

The authorities in Holland have discontinued subsidies to the Catholic church in the province of Limburg because of its resistance to the anti-Jewish laws. Catholic libraries in Holland have removed the signs "Entrance for Jews Is Forbidden," which had been posted on their doors by German occupational authorities.

The first Distinguished Conduct Medal to be granted under the new regulations (formerly confined to the army but now awarded to all the armed services) has been awarded to a Jewish flyer, Flight Sergeant David Nabarro, 21, of London.

As an expression of his protest against Nazi treatment of Europe's Jews, Jose Iturrat of Buenos Aires, a Catholic, has donated outright his farm of 50 acres for the care of Jewish orphans and aged people. In addition he pledged to give a monthly contribution of \$1,000.

1,500 women, representing 320 branches of the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations have subscribed \$200,000 for the purchase of a bombing plane that will bear the federation's name.

An 800-year old embroidered curtain, which hung on the Ark of the Law in one of Tripoli's synagogues was presented by the Jewish community there to Gen. Montgomery as an expression of thanks for his order to abolish the ghetto.

More than ten Hebrew periodicals are now being published by the various Jewish units of the British Army in the Middle East. These organs are part of the extensive cultural activities in progress among the Jewish troops.

The Greater Cleveland Chapter has been assigned a quota of \$1,780,000 of which \$1,330,000 will be expended by National Headquarters. In addition the local Chapter has budgeted \$346,000 for the national and international Red Cross effort leaving \$104,000 for Red Cross activities in Cuyahoga County.
