SCANNING THE NEWS

Rabbi Maurice N. Eisendrath of Toronto, Canada, has been appointed director of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations with headquarters at New York and Cincinnati, Ohio.

Two liberty ships are going to be named shortly after Judah P. Benjamin, Secretary of War to Jefferson Davis, and Haym Solomon, patriot of the Revolution.

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Nazi military authorities in Tunisia have imposed a fine of approximately \$400,000 on the Jewish population "to provide a bombing distress fund."

Serg. Harry Wertheim, a Dutch Jew, was awarded the Kruis van Verdienste (equal to D. S. C.) by Queen Wilhelmina, for gathering valuable information and performing acts of sabotage against the Nazis in Holland.

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Out of the 75,000 pre-war Jewish population of Lwow, capital of Eastern Galicia, only 5,000 are left now.

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Bolivia has instructed its consulates in Europe to grant visas to 100 Jewish refugee children.

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Every attempt will be made for observant Jewish members of the U. S. armed forces to have Kosher food for Passover. The servicemen who wish to make arrangement for Passover food should contact the nearest Jewish Chaplain and JWB representative.

PALESTINE: AN ARSENAL OF DEMOCRACY

The heartland of the Middle East, straddling the great junction of Europe, Asia and Africa, is Palestine. Germany's geopolitical experts rank Palestine as the keystone of the whole Middle East. While the Promised Land contains no important petroleum wells of its own, it is the outlet of the vast Iraq oil lands. Moreover, Palestine is the hub of the great transcontinental air routes between Europe and the Far East and Africa, a system which ultimately links the old continent with our own by way of the South Atlantic Narrows. Palestine is also guardian of the great coastal road to the Suez Canal, and she occupies an important position on the road to the Dardanelles, another one of the vital international waterways.

Palestine is the Promised Land to the United Nations, too. She is the only great industrial region in the entire Middle East, so that it may be truly asserted about her that she is the Arsenal of Democracy in the Middle East. It may also be truly said that nowhere in this part of the world is a large section of the population so wholeheartedly dedicated to the cause of democracy as in Palestine.

It is not in square miles or dry figures of vital statistics that Palestine's importance should be measured in this warlike world. She is only about the size of Vermont—10,000 square miles—and she has the population of Nebraska—a million and a half. It is her factory chimneys and the yield of her soil that indicate Palestine's new significance. From that point of view she is the Land of Fulfillment, no longer merely the Land of Promise.

Palestine is an industrial oasis in the great Middle Eastern desert. Nowhere is the contrast between the past and present as great as the shores of her Dead Sea. Even that sea itself has come to life, and is proving a veritable godsend to the embattled United Nations. The Dead Sea contains a rich deposit of potash, essential for gun powder and fertilizers, drugs and chemicals, soap and glass. That sea alone could supply the entire world with this vital war material for fully 5,000 years at the present rate of consumption. The Dead Sea is also tremendously rich in bromide, indispensable in medicine.
