He also addressed recently the New York Metropolitan Section of the Jewish Welfare Board, delivered the principal address at the Central Atlantic States Regional Convention of the Council of Jewish Welfare Federations and Welfare Funds at Newark, N. J.; lectured before the Jewish Chaplains in training at the Army Chaplaincy School at Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass., and presided at the Conference of Jewish Naval Chaplains at Norfolk, Va. He also spoke at London, Ontario, and before Jewish Welfare Federation meetings in a number of cities, in addition to attending numerous meetings in New York and elsewhere as part of his work as Administrative Chairman of the Jewish Welfare Board Committee on Army and Navy Religious Activities.

JEWISH CHAPLAIN GIVES LIFE TO SAVE SAILOR

Chaplain Alexander Goode, reported by the War Department as missing in action in North Atlantic, is the first casualty among Jewish chaplains in this war, it was said recently by Rabbi Philip S. Bernstein, executive director of the National Jewish Welfare Board's Committee on Army and Navy Religious Activities.

Chaplain Goode, who was rabbi of Congregation Beth Israel in York, Pa., before his chaplaincy appointment last July, was aboard a cargo-transport sunk on the North Atlantic convoy route early in February. Born in Brooklyn in 1911, he was a graduate of Hebrew Union College and received his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Cincinnati and Johns Hopkins University, respectively.

Daniel O'Keefe, a 19-year-old merchant marine of 623 East 139th Street, Bronx, N. Y., who survived the sinking, was quoted recently as saying that four chaplains, two Protestants, the Rev. George L. Fox and the Rev. Clark V. Poling; one Catholic, the Rev. John P. Washington, and Chaplain Goode, sacrificed their lives that four other men might survive when their ship was torpedoed.

"Just before the ship went down," he said, "the chaplains gave their life preservers to members of the crew. They were standing on deck praying when our lifeboat drifted out of sight."

Rabbi Goode leaves a widow and a 3-year-old daughter, Rosalie, residing in Washington.

The German Ministry of Propaganda has utilized the Purim holiday for an anti-Jewish campaign through posters showing Mordecai and Esther riding on a horse led by Haman. The inscription reads: "The fate of Haman will befall the Aryans if Germany loses the war."

Australia agreed to admit 150 Jewish children from France.

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The Junior Hadassah of Montreal has a "Baby-Minding Bureau" which helps out in the present labor shortage and at the same time contributes to the war effort. The bureau sends members to homes to care for babies so that their parents can have the evening off, and the proceeds are devoted to the war effort program.

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Prisoners of war in Germany are being induced and even compelled to write anti-Semitic letters to their friends and families at home, according to reports emanating from International Red Cross sources.

120 Jewish Polish refugees arrived in Uganda, the country once offered to the Jews as a National Home.

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Sergeant Theodore L. Billen, 20, of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., has set a new record for awards received by American Jewish servicemen, having five decorations for "outstanding ability and devotion to duty" as an aerial engineer and gunner.

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The Hungarian Ministry of the Interior has ordered the confiscation of gold, silver and copper ornaments in all synagogues throughout the country.

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The Great Synagogue in Riga, Latvia, has been turned into a Nazi club named after Alfred Rosenberg, the notorious Nazi leader who was born in Riga.

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The Zionist Organization of America established a record in war bond sales for one month, having sold \$15,300,000 worth of bonds during February.

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"The Ten Commandments," a new anti-Semitic film, has been completed by the Tobis Co. of Berlin. It is based on material furnished by Streicher's "Stuerner" and the Stuttgart Institute for the study of anti-Semitism.

JEWISH SOLDIER FIRST U. S. LOSS IN PACIFIC

Lt. Milton Kazlow was the first American soldier killed in the heroic conquest of Guadalcanal, reported Rabbi Max Schenk, director of the American Jewish Welfare Board in Australia, upon his return to the United States. He reported that Lt. Kazlow was also the first Jew to receive military burial in Australia.

Many Jewish soldiers have distinguished themselves by their heroism and sacrifice, declared Rabbi Schenk. He told of a Jewish flyer shot down with his Christian co-pilot. Both men landed in a swamp, mortally wounded. Realizing that they might be swallowed in the swamp mud, the Jewish flyer dragged his dying companion to a dry spot with the last strength he possessed. When help came his companion was already dead. This last act of heroism to his dying comrade cost the Jewish flier his chances for recovery from his ordeal. He died the next morning.

Rabbi Schenk also reported that there is a strong resurgence of religious feeling among soldiers who have been in the Pacific battle. Australian Jews are frequent hosts of American Jewish soldiers and every Jewish community in Australia has established War Service Committees for the entertainment of American Jewish soldiers on leave. Rabbi Schenk also reported that quite a number of the Australian Jewish servicemen are refugees from the Hitler-occupied countries.
