CAMPS ABROAD MARK YOM KIPPUR

Service men of Jewish faith attended day-long services conducted by Jewish chaplains and rabbis at hundreds of community synagogues here and overseas.

Lists of the Jewish casualties were sent by the Jewish Welfare Board to hundreds of communities throughout the United States so that prayers conducted in memory of local Jewish youth who have been killed in service may include reference to all Jewish men who have given their lives for America in this war.

At the end of the day of Yom Kippur, Jewish service men and women attended fast-breaking dinners arranged for them by the 500 Army and Navy service committees of the Jewish Welfare Board operating in towns near Army and Navy camps and bases.

Far from home, service men observed the holiday in the war zones. In Sicily, the first public Yom Kippur service since the expulsion of the Jews in 1942, were conducted by Chaplains Earl Stone, Samuel Teitelbaum and Irving Tepper. United States Army.

In North Africa, the liberated Jewish communities in Tunis, Bizerte, Casablanca, Algiers, Oran, Kairouan, Bone, Sousse, Bougie and Phillippeville, acted as hosts to the soldiers who fought for their liberation.

In 100 communities in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, American Jewish soldiers, sailors, marines, nurses and members of the Women's Auxiliary Corps, joined British co-religionists in religious services.

In London, a central military service was held at Conway Hall, under the sponsorship of the United Synagogue of Great Britain.

TO A SOLDIER FROM SHOLEM ASCH

Private John J. Asch, taking his basic training at Keesler Field, Miss., received a beautiful letter from his father in Stamford, Conn., last week—and no wonder, for his father is none other than the distinguished Jewish novelist, Sholem Asch.

In the letter the writer described his feelings about America to his 33-year-old son John, who came back to this country late last year after living in France and Palestine for many years.

"Of course mother and I were heart-broken when you returned from New Haven," Sholem Asch wrote, "declaring with happy, shining eyes that you had been accepted in the army. Still, at the same time, I am very happy and very proud that now I have two boys in the service of the U. S. And I cannot explain the reason why this has prompted a recollection of your first entering this country as a child of five. I remember taking you by the hand when I came to meet you on board the ship. Your dark little eyes were shining so bright as you looked in fear and wonder at the skyscrapers and the Statue of Liberty. I recall your asking me if other countries also had statues of Liberty, to which I replied that perhaps they had, but for us this was the only Statue of Liberty.

"America has made you a legal heir of her rich estate. She has given you history and ancestors, sages and saints. Your love of justice, your eagerness for righteousness, your understanding of other people, your love for beauty, your

devotion to nature—all that you have, she has bestowed on you.

"In this war, we Jews are engaged not only because of our hatred for the enemy which has risen to annihilate our existence, but for the love of our America and for everything for which she stands. That is why I want you, when you are learning to kill, to remember to love; in your hatred of the enemy, love humaneness, and love your brother soldier regardless of his race or religion.

"Ever since I came to America I have been looking for an opportunity to express my gratitude and affection for what I see in America. It hasn't been my privilege to pay debt in physical service. I believe that I have tried to make my contribution towards the American ideal by trying to bring a better understanding between Jew and Christian through their common religious inheritance. I believe I serve America by serving humanity. Still I regret that this opportunity to fight physically for America has been denied me. I consider myself serving America through you and your efforts. But you, my boy, are not alone in the service, for your parents who love you are with you. All your ancestors are with you, not only those of old, from your biblical forefathers down, but those ancestors whom you have accepted with this country—these new patriarchs, Washington, Jefferson and Lincoln and the ancestors who endured the suffering of Valley Forge and those resting in the fields of Gettysburg and in the Forest of Argonne. Be of good cheer and be happy you serve America."
