HOW WE CELEBRATE CHANUKAH

We should make the most of Chanukah in our homes, for it represents a great victory over tyranny and for religious liberty. Families are urged to light candles on each night of Chanukah. (For the ceremonial, see page 3.) Gifts should be exchanged among the family and friends. This should be done the first night of Chanukah, and if possible, every subsequent evening of the festival even though the gifts be inexpensive.

In answer to your Chanukah gift problem, take advantage of the Chanukah gift shop in the lobby of the Temple operated by the Religious School and the Sisterhood. Menorahs, games, books and other gifts are avaiable.

A SPECIAL CHANUKAH SERVICE ON FRIDAY EVENING, DECEMBER 24TH, WILL BE DEVOTED TO THE PAGEANTRY OF OUR REDEDICATION TO THE IDEALS OF OUR FAITH. OFFICERS OF THE TEMPLE AND ITS AFFILIATED ORGANIZATIONS, THE CHOIR, AND THE PUPILS OF THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL WILL PARTICIPATE. RABBI JAMES G. HELLER OF CINCINNATI WILL BE OUR GUEST PREACHER FOR THE CHANUKAH REDEDICATION SERVICE.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL PRESENTS JEWISH BOOK WEEK PROGRAMS

Book Week programs were presented by the Intermediate, Confirmation and High School departments at their respective assemblies.

The Senior Class prepared the program for the High School Department. Mr. Belkin delivered a talk on the importance of reading for the Confirmation Department assembly. In the Intermediate Department, Miss Ruth Gal prepared a novel program in which she used specially prepared slides and then gave each child a letter to take home requesting the parents to make one of the Chanukah gifts a Jewish book.

During the entire month of December, a gift shop, in the charge of Mrs. Harriet Friedman, offers a variety of books on Jewish subjects as well as Menorahs, games and other items. Books may also be ordered through the school office.

THE MENORAH

Deep in his soul he began to feel the need of being a Jew. His circumstances were not unsatisfactory; he enjoyed an ample income and a profession that permitted him to do whatever his heart desired. For he was an artist. His Jewish origin and the faith of his fathers had long since ceased to trouble him, when suddenly the old hatred came to the surface again in a new mob-cry. With many others he believed that this flood would shortly subside. But there was no change for the better; and every blow, even though not aimed directly at him, struck him with fresh pain, till little by little his soul became one bleeding wound. These sorrows, buried deep in his heart and silenced there, evoked thoughts of their origin and of his Judaism; and now he did something he could not perhaps have done in the old days—he began to love his Judaism with an intense fervor. Although in his own eyes he could not, at first, clearly justify this new yearning, it became so powerful at length that it crystallized from vague emotions into a definite idea which he must needs express. It was the conviction that there was only one solution for this moral misery-the return to Judaism.

Hitherto he had permitted to pass by unobserved the holiday which the wonderful apparition of the Maccabees had illumined for thousands of years with the glow of miniature lights. Now, however, he made this holiday an opportunity to prepare something beautiful which should be forever commemorated in the minds of his children. In their young souls should be implanted early a steadfast devotion to their ancient people.

He bought a Menorah, and when he held this nine-branched candlestick in his hands for the first time, a strange mood came over him. In his father's house also the lights had once burned in his youth, now far away, and the recollection gave him a sad and tender feeling for home. The tradition was neither cold nor dead—thus it had passed through the ages, one light kindling another. The mere sound of the name, which he now pronounced every evening to his children, gave him great pleasure. There was a lovable ring to the word when it came from the lips of little children.

On the first night the candle was lit and the origin of the holiday explained. The wonderful incident of the lights that strangely remained burning so long, the story of the return from the Babylonian exile, the second Temple, the Maccabees—our friend told his children all he knew. It was not very much, to be sure; but it served. When the second candle was lit, they repeated what he had told them; and though it had all been learned from him, it seemed to him quite new and beautiful. In the days that followed, he waited keenly for the evenings which became ever brighter.

Then came the eighth day, when the whole row burns, even the faithful ninth, the servant, which on other nights is used only for the lighting of others. A great splendor streamed glistened. But for our friend all this from the Menorah. The children's eyes all is still dark, and the solitary light looks melancholy. Soon it finds one companion, then another, and another. The darkness must retreat. The light comes first to the young and the poor—then others join who love Justice, Truth, Liberty, Progress, Humanity and Beauty. When all the candles burn, then we must all stand and rejoice over the achievement. And no office can be more blessed than that of a Servant of the Light.

WELCOME TO GUEST PREACHER

THEODOR HERZL.

Dr. Julian Morgenstern, President of the Hebrew Union College, will occupy the pulpit this Friday at the invitation of Rabbi Brickner. Dr. Morgenstern is considered one of the most distinguished Biblical scholars in the world. He has written numerous works on problems of Biblical criticism, and his interpretation of the Book of Amos, is considered to be the most outstanding and complete study of the subject. Born in United States, Dr. Morgenstern graduated from the Hebrew Union College and then studied in Germany, where he received his doctorate. Upon his return to America, he occupied a pulpit until he was called to the faculty of the Hebrew Union College. After the death of Dr. Kaufman Kohler he was appointed to the Presidency, a position which he has held since 1925.

The subject of Dr. Morgenstern's sermon will be: "I Walk With God."

Having officiated at the High Holyday Services in the Euclid Avenue Temple, several years back, Dr. Morgenstern is well known to most of the congregation.
