Her work is in great demand by Hebrew braille readers.

A letter received from the boy's parents indicates the deep joy which the occasion brought to the family and also the continuing interest in the study of Hebrew which has been inspired in the lad.

4-2 cups 1st Samuel, xxx, 12.

5-2 cups Nahum, iii, 12.

6-1 cup Numbers, xvii, 8.

7-2 tablespoons 1st Samuel, xiv, 25.

8-6 articles of Jeremiah, xvii, 11.

9-A pinch of Leviticus, ii, 12.

10-A teaspoon of Amos, iv, 5.

11-Season to taste with 2nd Chronicles, ix, 9.

12—Add citron and follow Solomon's advice for making a good boy.

Proverbs, xxiii, 14, and you will have a good cake.

For the benefit of readers whose knowledge of the Bible is limited, the following definitions of the key numbers are given:

1, flour; 2, butter; 3, sugar; 4, raisins; 5, figs; 6, almonds; 7, honey; 8, eggs; 9, salt; 10, baking soda; 11, spices; 12, beat well.

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#### PURIM AMONG ORIENTAL JEWS

I must confess that a curious sense of solemnity filled me when, on my way from Jerusalem via Bagdad into the interior of Persia, I found myself in Shushan Habirah, at the graves of Mordecai and Esther. First came the impressive road from the Tigris plain to the high Persian plateau, a stair-like rising pass, on which for thousands of years the armies of all kings, merchants and pilgrims of all nations have traveled, that ancient caravan road to China which is a natural passage connecting East and West. Here the most ancient history of human-kind has left its traces. High up in the mountains stands the historically important Behistan Inscription of Darius, hewn into the rock, its reliefs and old, time-worn incisions still clear today.

Then there is Hamadan itself, one of the most ancient of cities, standing on the ruins of old Achmetha, the summer residence of the kings of the Medes.

But there was another reason why I felt that in this city I stood on holy ground: I recalled the Megillah Esther, the characters of which come to life as one stands beside the tomb of its heroes. One can fairly see the procession of mourning, fasting Jews. Mordecai in sack-cloth and ashes, beautiful, graceful Esther, hate-filled Haman, the vacillating king—and then the messengers who bear the tidings of salvation to all Jewish communities of the great Persian empire, the festive rejoicing of the Jews.

No wonder that at Purim everybody wants to make a pilgrimage to the graves of these heroes of the Megillah. Dark and narrow though the tomb is, everybody wants to perform the special mitzvah of hearing the reading of the Megillah at the historic site of the actual events.

Special forms of celebrating Purim have developed or have long been carefully preserved in Persia.

The coming of Purim is anticipated for weeks. In addition to long preparations for the holiday, such as the learning of the Megillah and of the "Tikkun Purim," there is the "preparation of Haman." For it is an ancient custom **a**mong the Oriental Jews, and among the Jews of Shushan Habirah in particular, to symbolize the fall and end of Haman at Purim by hanging an effigy of Haman on the gallows and then burning it. Even very old Hebrew and Arabic sources describe this custom.

A life-sized figure of Haman is con-



structed out of old rags and mats, sewed up in the proper shape, with arms, legs, head, and trunk, stuffed with straw. Haman's face is then painted in, and the figure is put on the roof or in the corner of the courtyard, to await events.

When Purim approaches the great event comes for the children. They take down the Haman they have made, build a pyre in the courtyard or in some other open space., and in the middle of the pyre construct the gallows. Then the signal is given, Haman is hanged on the gallows, and the pyre is lighted.

As oil or benzine heats the bonfire all the children dance around it, and their delighted shrieks consign "Haman Harasha" to his doom. To destroy him even more quickly, stones are thrown at the painted face of the Haman effigy until its features become unrecognizable —in accordance with the verse "the memory of Amalek shall be blotted out." —Dr. Walter Fischel.
