**RABBI BRICKNER'S VISIT**  
**IN LONDON**

At the West London Synagogue on February 9, the Rev. Dr. Barnett R. Brickner, Rabbi of the Euclid Avenue Temple, Cleveland, Ohio, addressed an assembly of the Jewish officers and men of the United States Army at present located in the neighborhood. Dr. Brickner was sent by the President of the United States to visit the Jewish personnel of the various American theatres of military activity.

After an extensive journey which carried him through South America, Africa, India, Burma, the Near East, Sicily and Italy, Dr. Brickner spent a short time in Britain, inspecting many centres.

In the course of his address at the Synagogue, after a graceful acknowledgment of the West London Synagogue's hospitality on this occasion and its manifold services to American soldiers, Dr. Brickner said that after his extensive travels he was proud of the part that Jews were playing in all branches of the services. He also had discovered a revival of Jewish feeling and of belief in prayer. It must not be forgotten, said Dr. Brickner, that Hitler had aimed through the Jew at the heart of the world. The speaker said that although he had found considerable muddle in the minds of American troops generally as to what they were fighting for, it seemed to him that the Jews, because of their experiences, had a clearer understanding of the ideals of democracy and freedom for which the war was being waged. Dr. Brickner concluded with an expression of his deep sense of reassurance that the American forces would give a good account of themselves in the future, and that the blood being shed would lead to a new and better world.

Chaplain Judah Nadich introduced the speaker.

Said the lame to the blind, "Would I could walk! I could feast on the wonderful and enticing fruit which I see all round about me." "I," said the blind man, "am strong enough in my legs, but unfortunately have not the sense of sight, and cannot even feast my eyes on the choice fruit of which you tell me. Supposing," suggested he to his lame comrade, "you were to get on my back and pilot me to those wonderful trees which you see. I could with ease carry you there and you could pluck the coveted fruit for both of us." The suggestion was adopted, and the garden was quickly despoiled. When the owner visited his garden, he was shocked at the havoc committed on what to him was his most precious possession, and charged the two men with depredation.

### THE PRICE WAS NOT HIGH

Andorra is a tiny republic wedged in the Pyrenees between Spain and France. In recent years it has served as a stop-over for refugees escaping terror and deportation at the hands of Hitler's Gestapo in France. For Anna and Regina, two sisters, it was almost a final stop-over on their escape tour.

One sub-zero night last winter they were carried into an Andorran doctor's office, exhausted, numb from the knees down. Examination revealed that both were suffering from severe frostbite of the feet. That they are alive today, that they can walk today, is due to the effective machinery set in motion when the doctor telephoned the Joint Distribution Committee's representative in Barcelona. Within a few hours an ambulance was speeding Anna and Regina to a Spanish hospital in Barcelona.

The J. D. C. aide with the two sisters when the doctor informed them of the necessity to operate. Regina said nothing. Paling, she clenched the blanket tightly and turned her face to the wall. The tears came silently.

Anna, when told, was sitting up in bed. She continued to smooth imaginary wrinkles in the blanket with her hand. After a moment she asked, "Will we walk again?" The doctor assured her both she and her sister would be able to walk with the aid of artificial feet. "Then we are luckier than I thought we would be," she said quietly. "We escaped from Hitler without a scratch—a little worry, but that is soon forgotten. Those who remain in Hitler's world would gladly give their feet to see their sons or their husbands again. It is not such a high price to pay."

By the evening of the following day successful operations to prevent the spread of gangrene had been performed. Regina lost both her feet, while Anna lost the toes of her right foot. Today Anna and Regina are learning to walk again, slowly and carefully. Medical expenses, support during their long convalescence were paid by the J. D. C., for which these were but two more tragic cases among the thousands it has assisted in recent months.
