Capt. Eugene S. Kaplan M. C., (Porto
Rico):

It has recently been my good fortune to meet a very prominent Rabbi who apparently is a good friend of yours, namely Dr. Barnett R. Brickner. He is now touring all the foreign posts of the Army and Navy for the purpose of visiting the Jewish servicemen and investigating their religious status, in much the same way that Archbishop Spellman has recently done . . . I found out that he is a Reformed Rabbi and naturally asked whether he knows you. From his response, it is apparent that you are rather friendly.

Porto Rico was his first stop on his very long trip to come. He attempted to visit all the small posts here in the very short time allotted him. His visit here was of some interest to me for several reasons. His presence here demonstrated the active interest the nation-wide Jewish congregation took in the religious conditions of the servicemen. He also mentioned the fact that Orthodox, Conservative and Reformed Judaism have been able to cooperate for the first time because of the world crisis . . .

AMENDMENTS TO SISTERHOOD BY-LAWS

The following amendments to the By-Laws will be considered at the Annual Meeting of the Sisterhood:

1. That Article 4, Section 1—(re officers) be amended by adding the words "Assistant Treasurer" after the word "Treasurer."

2. That Article 4, Section 2—(re duties of officers) be amended by inserting as letter "g" the following: "The Assistant Treasurer shall relieve the Treasurer of such duties as she shall designate. The Assistant Treasurer shall be bonded."

3. That Article 4, Section 2, letter "h" be further amended by inserting the words "Assistant Treasurer" after "Treasurer" and by striking out the word "both" and inserting "all" before the word "audit."

4. That Article 4, Section 2—be further amended by adding as letter "i" the following: "a professional audit shall be made annually prior to the annual meeting."

5. That Article 5, Section 3—be amended to read that "The fiscal year shall extend from April 1st to March 31st."

EXCERPTS OF LETTERS FROM OUR BOYS OVERSEAS

"I've often felt sorry for you folks back home for being so far away from all this. Of course, as far as your safety is concerned and your happiness and well being, I thank the Lord for your being so far away. But, you can still gain a lot from some of the things we've seen and been through.

"From the dampness of Ireland and the heat of Africa, you would learn to appreciate and realize the advantages of the geographical resources of the States; from the comparative absence of natural resources in Italy and England, you would the greater appreciate the benefit of our wealth; from the eighteenth century mode of living of Sicily, you would learn the value of our creative and inventive skills and ingenuity; from the suffering, privation, diseases, filth and dirt, heartbreaks and agony, of some of the people we've seen, you would realize how truly lucky the people of the States really are. Yes, it would do all the folks at home good to see some of these things."

"Feel awfully swell tonight. Just returned from services. There's a chaplain in this part of India and he visits us every other Tuesday. Name is Sands, from Detroit. We had Purim Services tonight. It was really fine—talked about the meaning of Purim, "Shalach Mones" and so forth. We also had refreshments: tea, chopped liver (wonderful) and Hamentaschen. All made by one of the men who is a mess-sgt. at the hospital. Am so full, it hurts. After services, we sat around and sang Purim songs. Can't tell you what a kick I got out of it. Talked about having a Seder for Passover. Certainly would be fine. Am quite surprised to find myself taking an interest in religious activities. But it seems as though that's the case with men of all denominations—at least way out here.

I even prayed for Ruth at services tonight. Seem to be even closer to God over here. Hope my prayers don't go unanswered. Oh, yes! the chaplain gave all the men a "Luach" (calendar) and a "Mezuzah" (which I now carry on my key chain)...

JEWISH PROGRAM FOR NATIONAL FAMILY WEEK

MAY 7-14, 1944

Together with the Protestant and Catholic religious denominations, the Synagogue Council is cooperating in the observance of National Family Week from May 7-14, 1944.

The Protestant and Catholic clergy of every community has received from their headquarters communications to this effect, so that there is a background for community-wide sponsorship of National Family Week.

National Family Week emphasizes the spiritual foundations and resources of the family. Religion has always been a basic force in establishing and maintaining the home and in guiding and empowering the family to fulfill its highest functions. Especially now, when so many families meet the disturbances and dislocations, the anxieties and privations, the separations and bereavements of wartime, are the stabilizing influences of religious faith and practices needed. Children can best be armed against the destructive force of wartime excitements, fears, and hates by a home environment surcharged with religious faith and good-will. Competent citizenship for tomorrow will best be produced by homes in which religious values are paramount. National Family Week focuses attention upon these needs and these responsibilities of the home.

The family, we must remember, is something more than a legal entity or even a social institution. It is the cradle into which the new democratic social order is being fashioned. The family is related to the future through social responsibility and social trust. The family in this sense is a covenant with posterity.

The Jewish family moreover has a special function. The Jewish people owe their survival in large part to three institutions: the school, the synagogue, the family. Of the three the family is the most important. At the present time in Europe the schools are being disbanded, the synagogues are being destroyed, but through some miracle the family continues to persist in spite of all destruction and devastation. The Jewish family becomes through the cultivation of its own genius a sacred circle in which the members are bound together in a spirit of common understanding, mutual sympathy, and unrelenting sacrifice.
