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CHANUKAH

(THE FEAST OF LIGHTS)

Chanukah commemorates the victory of an ideal over brutality, spiritual independence over despotism, light over darkness. A handful of Jews, conscious of the high value of their spiritual culture, their religion, dared open fight against the overwhelming power of the Syrian King, Antiochus Epiphanes, who aimed to crush their faith in the one God, and to suppress the ritual and ceremonies created by the Jewish people to give voice to its beliefs.

In the year 162 B.C.E. King Antiochus Epiphanes ordered that a pagan altar be set up in the Temple in Jerusalem and that sacrifices be offered to the Greek idol Zeus Olympus. After hard struggle and bitter battles, in which many Jewish heroes lost their lives on the battlefield, the pious ones under the leadership of Judas the Hasmonean, or Maccabeus, achieved victory after victory, until they reconquered Jerusalem, drove out the Syrians and their Jewish sympathizers, and purified the Temple from the Zeus cult.

This purification occurred on the 25th of the Jewish month Kisley. The altar was sanctified and dedicated anew, lamps and torches kindled as a symbol of spiritual light and freedom, and a celebration of eight days ordained, during which the illumination continued amid sacrifices and songs. This feast was decreed by Judas Maccabeus and the elders of Israel to be celebrated annually, and was called Chanukah—"Feast of Dedication," also "Festival of Lights."

There is a Talmudic legend that all the oil in the Temple was polluted by the pagan worshippers, and that upon investigation only one cruse of consecrated oil was found by the Hasmoneans, untouched, sealed and hidden away. This cruse was used to illuminate the Temple. Its oil lasted, by miracle, for eight days. The story of Chanukah has been preserved in the first four chapters of the first book of the Maccabees (in the Aprocrypha).

In the evenings oil lamps or waxen candles are lit. The lights are lit in the Synagogue as well as in each private home. Starting with one light on the first evening, the number is increased by one each evening, until on the eighth night there are eight lights. This progression is a symbol of Judaism's belief in the gradual constant increase of intellectual light and of the slow but steady victory of spiritual enlightenment.

At the kindling of the lights special

benedictions are recited for the miracles which God showed to our forefathers at this season. Then the hymn "Mooz tzur" or "Rock of Ages," the English adaptation thereof, is sung, according to a melody popular among the German Jews since the 16th century. While the lights burn, no work is permitted. Jews are accustomed to indulge in games and in the eating of latkes (pancakes). Children play with a revolving top or die, called Dreidle or Trendle (from the German dreken). This die has on its four sides Hebrew letters: N, G, H, and SH which have a two fold meaning, the one in Hebrew: Nes Gadol Hayah Sham ("A great miracle happened there"), and the German one: nichts, ganz, halb, stell (nothing, all, half, put), indicating the gains and losses in the play. The children usually receive presents from their parrents, relatives and friends) "Chanukah Gelt" or "Chanukah Geshenk").

With the strengthening of Jewish selfconsciousness in the last few decades. Chanukah has assumed an importance in the Jewish calendar commensurate with its historical and religious significance. This festival buoys up the Jew's spirit that he may withstand the waves of assimilation; that his eyes may not be blinded by the gilded splendour of false gods; that, being a small minority in an overwhelming majority, he be not made timid, that he may not underestimate his own spiritual culture in the face of that vast culture surrounding and engulfing him. Inspirited by the message of this festival the Jew must champion the truth of his religion, that which made the Maccabees conquer Syrianized Hellenism and which, ever since, has kindled in the hearts of millions of the human race the eternal light of the human race the eternal light of the Jewish faith.

LORD MOYNE'S ASSASSINATION

There is a whole field of questions that haven't been answered by Prime Minister Churchill in his comments on the death of the Guinness Stout and Ale heir, Lord Moyne, British Resident Minister in the Middle East, who was slain by Jewish terrorists in Cairo recently.

The Prime Minister is quite properly shocked as are many others-Jews and non-Jews, Zionists and non-Zionists alike -at such sacrifice of a human life. The Prime Minister has been quite explicit on this, even to the extent of saying that he and other "constant architects" of the future of Jewry will feel compelled to reconsider their attitude if such wicked activities do not cease. Incidentally, the Prime Minister is not quite explicit on the meaning of his threats. Does he mean that because of the act of a few individual Jews, he would turn against all Jews? Or does he mean that because of the act of a couple of Zionists who turned terrorists, he would turn against all Zionists? Or does he mean that he's looking for an excuse to add to the long delays that already have marked efforts to reach a settlement of the Palestine problem? I don't know, but even though he's vague in this area, I think the Prime Minister's record entitles him to the benefit of the doubt and that he's just swinging a big stick to keep the lid on things.

In any event the Prime Minister is explicit in his condemnation of the crime that has been committed, and few, if any, will argue with him on that.

What isn't explicit is the background. One doesn't have to be a partisan either for or against the idea of a Jewish homeland or for or against British policy in Palestine to wonder what policies, what delays, what frustrations brought this result. Just what is it that leads to x despair so black and bitter and hopeless that it leads even so small a minority as the Palestinian terrorists to the extremity of taking human life, knowing that their own lives almost certainly will be forfeit too?

What is there in the handling of the Palestinian question that leaves even one or two men to believe that only by assassinations can their cause for a homeland be brought dramatically before the world? What made these men so desperate?

The answer must be found somewhere in the history of the failure to reach a solution to the Palestine problem since it was placed in Britain's lap as a mandate after the last war. The roots of terrorism-and the cure-are tied up with such things as the facts about the Balfour Declaration, and its generalities about establishing a homeland; with the restrictions of the White Paper; with the closing of the doors of Palestine as a refuge for hunted men; with such things as the turning away of a boatload of people to founder at sea for lack of entry papers; with the whole handling of relationships, both good and bad. between Arabs and Jews; with the question of creating a Jewish army in which Palestinians might fight, as they clamored to do, against the fascists; with the need for re-examining and making decisions on the industrial and agricultural potentials of the country in the light of modern technology; with the need for differences on a human reconciling rather than on a political, basis.

The one thing we do know beyond the fact that Moyne is dead is that desperate acts like his assassination are not bred in a vacuum.
