#### "DEMOCRACY IN JUDAISM"

By Prof. Jacob R. Marcus of the Hebrew Union College Philosophy and Way of Life

The term 'democracy', has assumed a new meaning. When we speak of democracy today, we no longer think of it as just a form and method of government, but rather as a political philosophy and way of life. The term has become a synonym for Americanism at its best. However, to this day American democracy is still a dream, not a reality-equality of all men is far from achieved. This dream can become a reality if people but will it. "The effort to make the new democracy inherently American is the task of the Jew in America today." The Jew is eminently fitted for this task.

#### Furtherance of Humanity

Judaism, like Americanism, has as its last common goal the furtherance of a common humanity. "Being a Jew is not the goal toward which we aspire; it is only the path to tread, the path that leads to final recognition of man's common fellowship." This goal cannot be reached without furthering economic democracy. In our industrial era, economic power is the ultimate power that must be controlled for the benefit of all. Without economic justice there cannot be social peace.

#### Fight for Freedom

We Jews, who have always believed more in the rights of man than in the rights of property, must align ourselves with the liberal forces in their fight for economic emancipation of all peoples. While in this struggle to extend democratic principles we will encounter bitter hostility and be attacked by those who want to preserve the status quo, "the fight for freedom and the ever new democracy of the ever succeeding generation is for him his perennial opportunity."

#### THE TRAGEDY OF ASSIMILATION

"What I understand by assimilation is loss of identity. It is this kind of assimilation, with the terrible consequences indicated, that I dread most—even more than pogroms.

"It is a tragedy to see a great, ancient people, distinguished for its loyalty to its religion, and its devotion to its sacred Law, losing thousands every day by the mere process of attrition. It is a tragedy to see a language held sacred by all the world, in which Holy Writ was composed, which served as the depository of Israel's greatest and best thoughts, doomed to oblivion. It is a tragedy to see the descendants of those who revealed religion to the world, and who developed the greatest religious literature in existence, so little familiar with real Jewish thought that they have no other interpretation to offer of Israel's Scriptures, Israel's religion, and Israel's ideals and aspirations and hopes. than those suggested by their natural opponents. slavishly following opinions, copying their phrases, and repeating their catchwords. I am not accusing anybody. I am only stating facts. We are helpless spectators of the Jewish soul wasting away before our very eyes.

"Now, the rebirth of Israel's national consciousness and the revival of Judaism are inseparable. When Israel found itself it found its God. When Israel lost itself, or began to work at its self-effacement, it was sure to deny its God. The selection of Israel, the indestructibility of God's covenant with Israel, the immortality of Israel as a nation, and the final restoration of Israel to Palestine, where the nation will live a holy life, on holy ground, with all the widereaching consequences of the conversion of humanity, and the establishment of the Kingdom of God on earth-all these are the common ideals and the common ideas that permeate the whole of Jewish literature extending over four thousand years."

#### THE IMPERATIVES WE FACE

"At no previous time in recorded history have we been so close to complete disaster, or so near to the 'Promised Land,' as at this present hour. 'We' means the human race, it means everyone; every man, woman and child on the face of the earth. For, now mankind is bound together in a cast circle of paralyzing fear and breathless hope—fear of a final, all-destroying war—hope for an enduring and creative age of peace.

"Not only the atomic bomb, but every other invention of modern science has contributed in bringing about this situation. Their power is so great that, once we have unleashed it, nothing we know about can stop it. We have used our moral freedom and our free intelligence to probe and to unlock the inmost creeds of our material environment. We have assumed the rights and the responsibilities of supermen. Yet, we are not certain of our ability to act even as decent common men. We have seized control of the world in which we were created to live. We fear, that by our own acts we shall destroy this world and all the creatures in it.

"This is not a new dilemma; but it is man's ancient dilemma sharpened to impale our ever-mounting pride. Mankind has always lived in the presence of death and of life; has always had to choose. The choice until today was, however, mitigated by man's dependence upon nature. Now that man has taken command of nature he no longer has such support. Man has only himself to depend on—only himself and that moralrational quality in himself which, he believes, has its counterpart and its guarantee in a rational-moral universe beyond nature and beyond natural law.

'It is upon that rational-moral quality, therefore, that the future of this earth has finally come to rest. If it fails us we are lost. If it upholds us we are saved. Whether it fails us or upholds us

#### A CHRISTIAN ON JEWISH LEADERSHIP

"Many leaders of the Jewish community placed themselves as Jews in the world in terms of finance and business, living in a world of illusion which they had created for themselves. Even as these years have passed, many of the financial leaders of Jewry, as they are chosen in terms of power, wealth, influence in the community, still live in what I consider a world of illusion scarcely related to reality.

"This type of Jewish leader has, it seems to me, a cold, unrealistic and much too narrow conception of Judaism. I got the general impressions that the less people know of Judaism, the more confident they are of their interpretation of it. To stand up and argue seriously that Judaism is merely a religion, is to ignore the history of Judaism and to misunderstand and construct its meaning out of all proportion to realities. It seems to me that most Jews have no conception of the breadth and scope of the variety and the depth and the meaning of Judaism through the ages. They would take this fine, rich tapestry and reduce it to some sort of drab, plain, mechanical drawing which fades into their particular conception or particular prejudice, or any other need, caused by fear or by something else.

"Jewish leaders of this sort were Jewishly illiterate, because most of them no longer were interested. Some were actively engaged in trying to forget what little they had learned. They no longer read—they just weren't interested.

"And so my plea would be that what American Jewry needs more than its Christian-Jewish relations, more than powerful organizations, is a rebirth and rededication to Jewishness."

is a matter between ourselves. God himself cannot decide this. The decision is wholly our own.

"What, then, must be actually decided? We must decide in the United States to place and keep the control and development of atomic energy in the hands of a civilian commission. We must decide in the United States to share at once the 'secret' of atomic energy production with the peoples of the entire world. We must decide to preserve the unity of the United Nations at any cost. We must cultivate and deepen cordial relations with all nations and governments insofar as this lies within our power.

"We must apply the insights and teachings of religion, the experience of history, the knowledge of social philosophy, the ethical convictions of moral understanding, the gifts of imagination, the traditions of justice and democracy, the skills of political leadership and high diplomacy—as well as the developments of science—to the daily tasks, taken together, constitute the entire earthly achievement of contemporary man."
