The third annual Jewish Arts Festival to be presented by the Jewish Community Council, at Severance Hall, on Wednesday, February 26th, is arousing considerable interest if the early demand for seats may be considered an index. The Arts Festival dramatic-music production, written by David Licht, internationally known Yiddish dramatist, besides including many local professional singers and dancers, has music scores by Erwin Jospe. Theodore Bloomfield, apprentice conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra, will lead the special Festival Orchestra. Oscar Shumsky, concert violinist, will play an arrangement by Cleveland, Elliot Morgenstern.

The full and varied program, easily the most ambitious of the Arts Festival productions, promises to be the best and most exciting.

MANY SPECIAL EVENTS MARK ALUMNI'S 35th YEAR

bons and Ruins—A Report From Central Europe," and tell in his own colorful style of his unprecedented six-month tour by jeep. Alumni members are urged to bring their families for this event, when we will be hosts to the congregation.

Annual Youth Service, in which Alumni members participate, comes Friday, March 21st. A guest speaker will deliver the sermon, and the service will be followed by an Oneg Shabbat for members of the Alumni Association.

A forum on a timely topic, followed by a dance, is scheduled for Sunday, March 30th.

Biggest Alumni affair in 35 years will be the anniversary dinner-dance at Hotel Carter, Saturday, April 26th. Special committees have been planning this evening for many weeks, and it will be something no Alumnus will want to miss—whether he belongs now, or 10 years ago, or 35 years ago.

Sunday, June 1st, brings the annual meeting and dance, scheduled for the Chapel and Alumni Hall.

COMBATING ANTI-SEMITISM

A symposium on what the National Jewish Defense Agencies are doing to combat Anti-Semitism and promote inter-group understanding will be heard at a luncheon meeting of the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations of Greater Cleveland, at the Hotel Carter, Wednesday, February 19th at noon. The speakers who will deal with the subject "Building One Nation", are: Rabbi Arthur J. S. Rosenbaum, Director of Interfaith Activities of the American Jewish Committee; Shad Polier, Chairman of Advisory Committees of American Jewish Congress; Richard E. Gutstadt, National Director, Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith; and Marjorie Merlin, Assistant Field Director of Jewish Labor Committee.

Chairman of the meeting will be Mr. Max Simon, Chairman of Community Relations Committee of the Jewish Community Council.

FEPC BILL SUBMITTED TO OHIO LEGISLATURE

A proposed bill submitted to the Ohio Legislature would make it unlawful:

"1. For an employer, by himself or his agent, because of the race, color, religious creed, national origin, or ancestry of any individual, to refuse to hire or employ or to bar or to discharge from employment such individual or to discriminate against such individual in compensation, upgrading, promoting, or in terms, conditions or privileges of employment.

2. For a labor organization, because of the race, color, religious creed, national origin, or ancestry of any individual to exclude from full membership rights or to expel from its membership such individual or to discriminate in any way against any of its members or against any employer or any individual employed by an employer.

3. For any employer or employment agency to print or circulate or cause to be printed or circulated any statement, advertisement or publication, or to use any form of application for employment or to make any inquiry or record in connection with employment, which expresses, directly or indirectly, any limitation, specification or discrimination as to race, color, religious creed, national origin or ancestry or any intent to make any such limitation, specification or discrimination, or to discriminate in any way on the ground or race, color, religious creed, national origin or ancestry, or to establish, announce or follow a policy of denying, or limiting through a quota system or otherwise, employment or membership opportunities of any group because of the race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry of such group.

4. For any person, employer, labor organization or employment agency to discharge, expel or otherwise discriminate against any person because he has opposed any practices forbidden under this chapter or because he has filed a complaint. . . .

5. For any person, whether or not an employer, employment agency, labor organization or employee, to aid, abet, incite, compel or coerce the doing of any of the acts forbidden under this Act or to attempt to do so, or to obstruct or prevent any person from complying with the provisions of this Act or any order issued thereunder.

6. For any individual seeking employment to publish or cause to be published any advertisement which speci-

fies or in any manner indicates his race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry, or expresses a limitation or preference as to the race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry of any prospective employer.

Casey, official representative of Bishop Ready of Columbus and of the Catholic Hierarchy in Ohio; and Dr. Charles B. Wesley, President of Wilberforce University.

BRICKNER RAPS DP's

TREATMENT IN REICH

Berlin (UP)—Animals in a zoo have a higher standard of living than thousands of Jewish displaced persons crowded into icy barracks in camps in the British and American zones of Germany, Dr. Barnett R. Brickner, chief of American rabbis with the Army and Navy, said today.

The Cleveland rabbi described living conditions of the DP's as "wretched."

After visiting many camps and talking with hundreds of inmates, Brickner's conclusions were that "they get too much food to die on and too little to live on."

He said Berlin officials of the American Joint Distribution Committee estimated that about 200,000 Jews live in German and Austrian camps.

In many of them, he related, two and three families were living in a single room "without privacy even for their 'love-making' while DP's were shivering in unheated quarters in almost every camp.

Telling of the monotonous diet—"the same, day after day"—Brickner said an average meal consists of black bread, potatoes and peas. He said there was plenty of oatmeal available, but that the DP's didn't know how to prepare it and even if they could, they had neither milk nor sugar to make it edible.

Jewish DP's have two desires, he said: To get to Palestine and to get to work. But, he said, they refuse to work at anything that will aid the German economy.

Citing an incentive plan being developed for them by welfare agencies, Brickner declared, "they feel that they want to earn their keep—the handout days are over."—From The Cleveland Press.

The Kedem Palestine Line, a Palestine merchant fleet, has been formed with a capital of \$1,000,000.

Because of the overwhelming response to Jewish Music Week last year, it will be extended into a "Jewish Musical Festival" lasting one month from February 7th to March 6th.

Jewish leaders in Warsaw have recovered 100,000 volumes of Jewish religious works and modern Yiddish literature stored by the Nazis during the occupation in three churches in Poznan.

The Catholic War Veterans appealed with telegrams to President Truman for the admission of 300,000 European DP's to the United States.

Pierre Dreyfus, son of Alfred Dreyfus of the famous L'Affaire Dreyfus, died in a New York bound plane which crashed near the Shannon Airport, Ireland.

The first known Bar Mitzvah in more than five years took place on February 1st in Frankfort, Germany. The celebrant was Stephen Bernstein, son of Rabbi Philip Bernstein.

The Eire Government has donated one million one-pound tins of kosher meat to the Jews in Europe's DP camps.

Milton Berle is to do a benefit performance for the Los Angeles Jewish Sanitarium in order to raise funds for the creation of a Medical Center.

Formerly of Germany, the famous Jewish publishing house, the Schocken firm, has come to the United States and is making its debut with such books as "In Time and Eternity" by Nahum Glatzer.

The Location Service of the American Jewish Congress found almost 20,000 missing relatives in Europe during 1946.

The largest percentage of Jews who have returned to any country in Europe have returned to Rumania. Thirty thousand Jewish refugees have entered from Poland and a hundred thousand Jews have come from countries to which they were deported.

Phil Green, gentile, masqueraded as a Jew for eight weeks, so he could write an article on how Jews feel about hatred. The result was "Gentleman's Agreement" now running in the Cosmopolitan. The book will become a movie.

The New York Ladies' Auxiliary, Jewish War Veterans, is sponsoring a \$200,000 glass-enclosed swimming pool project, to be erected on the grounds of the Bronx Veterans Hospital as a memorial to four Army Chaplains who lost their lives when the transport, Dorchester, was sunk off Greenland early in 1943. The four represented the Catholic, Jewish and Protestant faiths.
