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RABBI BRICKNER ATTENDS CONFERENCES

Rabbi Brickner attended the conference of the United Jewish Appeal in Atlantic City this week and this weekend he is representing Cleveland at the sessions of the Council of Jewish Welfare Federations and Welfare Funds. He is delivering the sermon this Friday night at the Chizzuk Emunah Congregation in Baltimore.

MRS. BRAVERMAN HONORED BY TRUSTEES AND FACULTY

Mrs. Sigmund Braverman, Educational Director, was the guest of honor of the annual faculty Chanukah party on January 2nd. Tribute was paid to her for the two decades during which she has served in an executive capacity in the Religious School. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, Eugene M. Klein, chairman of the Religious School Committee, presented Mrs. Braverman with a gift. Following a special pageant in her honor, she received from the faculty a Certificate of Devotion. Rabbi Brickner expressed his appreciation, as did Otto J. Zinner, president of the Congregation.

In her response, Mrs. Braverman paid tribute to Nathan Brilliant with whom she was associated for many years in the direction of the school, and to Judge Maurice Bernon, former president of the congregation, who actively supported the school program as chairman of the Religious School Committee. Both Judge Bernon and Mr. Brilliant were present at the affair.

At the same event, Lillian Sugarman, was tendered a gift and praise for her years of service on the Religious School faculty.

RELIEF SEEN NEAR FOR DP'S Recovery of All in Europe Is Likely in Three Years if Help Continues, Warburg Says

An optimistic report that, if the progress achieved during 1948 is maintained, the "essential recovery" of all displaced and needy Jews remaining in Europe can be assured within three more years was made by Edward M. M. Warburg, chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee.

The committee, which is the major American private agency helping distressed Jews abroad, outside of Israel, spent \$70,901,000 during 1948 in behalf of 750,000 Jews in twenty countries. The 1,300,000 Jews in western Europe gained their greatest progress in any year since the end of the war, Mr. Warburg said.

"Achievements of 1948 outstripped the most optimistic hopes for the future of European Jews," the chairman said. "With the continued support of the American Jewish community, through the United Jewish Appeal, the essential recovery of the Jews of Europe can be assured within three years."

Outstanding success of the year was in moving distressed Jews out of Europe to better places for them. During the year, 100,000 European Jews found new homes in Israel, while 20,000 were absorbed in the United States, Latin America and other countries. The Joint Distribution Committee provided food, clothing, medical care and transportation for the "great majority" of these emigrants Mr. Warburg said.

By the end of 1949, Mr. Warburg said he hoped the "great bulk" of Jews in displaced persons' camps in Germany, Austria and Italy would have been resettled in permanent homes elsewhere, and the DP camps closed. More than 5,000 persons a month are leaving the camps now, he said.

During 1949, the agency intends to move 20,000 Jews a month out of DP camps and other inhospitable places, Mr. Warburg said. The committee is now evacuating 2,000 Yemenite Jews from Aden to Israel by air, for example, he said, as well as arranging transportation to Palestine for 9,000 Jews in Shanghai.

In addition to arranging emigration, the Joint Distribution Committee restored to full or partial self-support 140,000 Jews who had been on relief rolls. The committee operated 250 producers' and loan cooperatives, 190 vocational training centers and 370 agricul-

CELEBRATED CANTOR COMING TO CLEVELAND

Miklos Gafni, concentration camp survivor who has been acclaimed as one of the world's finest tenors, will appear in concert here Monday, January 17, it was announced by Isadore Schoen, of the Jewish World. The 25-year old cantor will present a program of traditional and popular Jewish music; proceeds will go to the rehabilitation of Jewish children in Europe. Place of the concert is the Temple on the Heights, Mayfield road, near Lee road. The program is scheduled to begin at 8:30 p. m.

ISRAEL REPAYS UNION'S MILLION

A loan of \$1,000,000 to the new Jewish State of Israel has been repaid, President David Dubinsky of the International Ladies' Garment Workers, AFL, announced this week.

The union not only made the loan from its treasury but also donated \$220,000 to Histadrut, Israeli labor and co-op organization, and \$150,000 to the United Jewish Appeal in voluntary contributions from union members.

A \$1,000,000 check for the loan was delivered recently to Dubinsky by Dr. Israel Goldstein and Gottlieb Hammer. The loan was made five months ago after an appeal by Mrs. Goldie Myerson, member of the Israeli provisional council.

A CALL AND A CHALLENGE

I have a question and a challenge for American Zionists who think of themselves as liberals.

The question: Do any of the Zionist parties in the United States really reflect your point of view with regard to the direction which you believe the State of Israel ought to take?

The challenge: Let's get together and fashion a party of our own and thus give to the Jewish republic the ideological support which it needs in the United States and in World Zionist affairs.

This call is based upon a number of premises, which I invite you to examine:

1. Zionism as a movement is not liquidated, despite the happy establishment of the Jewish state. First of all, the government is still in its infancy. Secondly, that government badly needs the buttressing which friendly champions in chutz la-aretz can provide.

2. The State of Israel is the instrument for the fulfillment of prophetic Judaism. In that unfolding drama every Jew has a role and a stake. It is absurd to say that non-Israeli Jews need no longer be concerned with the character of the Yishuv. The cry of "dual allegiances", whether raised by ohabei Yisroel or sonay Yisroel is, of course, irrelevant and misleading. Once and for all, let it be clearly understood that chutz la-aretz Zionism does not contemplate interference in the internal affairs of the Jewish state nor does it discolor the brightness of one's American patriotism. But there can be no doubt that American Jews have a deep-seated interest in the ethical-sociological development of the Jewish state, and, furthermore, have the right of exerting whatever non-political influence possible upon the spiritual and philosophical course which it adopts. For are not American Jews affected by what goes and what will go on in Israel? Should the government, chalilah, turn fascismward or communismward, would we not here feel the repercussions of such divagations from the pristine ideology of the Zionist dream? That dream, which traces back to the preaching of the prophets, is some thing which all Jews everywhere have in common.

Hence, our relationship with the yishuv must ever be a close one. They are but another branch of our family, and we are one another's spiritual keepers.

3. None of the existing Zionist groups offers ideological shelter to the American Zionist who favors a liberal orientation. The Z. O. A. despite the public lip service of its leaders and its yeh-yeh policy toward the Pittsburgh Platform of 1918 is the bulwark of general Zionism. And general Zionism is generally conservative, and must remain so, hitched as it is to the Confederation of General Zionists. Its counterpart in Israel is one of the most minuscule political parties within the Jewish state, a party which is in open opposition to the Mapai. If one is dissatisfied with the political flavor of the Z. O. A., where is one to go? Some of my friends, notably Rabbi James Heller, have tried to solve this quandary by going into Labor Zionism. But the L. Z. O. A. (the Poalei Zion) has a unequivocally socialist platform, and here too the liberal who is not committed to outright socialism is not at home. For the Zionist, then, who is eager to support the laborite views of the Histadruth and the Mapai who thinks that Ben Gurion, Shertok, et al have the correct key to Israel's welfare, but is not ready to subscribe to a socialist doctrine, the dilemma is a real one. Nor does the Committee of Progressive Zionism offer a sanctuary for the liberal who is left of the Z. O. A. but right of the L. Z. O. A. For the C. P. Z. is doomed to wage a Sisyphean struggle within the ranks of the Z. O. A. It is futile to expect victory in that struggle not only because of the rightist complexion of the personalities that dominate that organization, but because it is hitched to the conservative Confederation of General Zionists.

4. Hence, the only recourse that remains for those Zionists whose political orientation can be said to be comparable to the American New Dealers is the establishment of an entirely new party, and the promulgation of a platform in harmony with their own views. This

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party should commit itself to the support of the Mapai and the Histadrut. Such a platform would support the proposed constitutional accent on Prophetic Judaism, plus a party that would seek to implement its principles on the basis of encouraging both free enterprise and collective enterprise, and work out the way between liberty and economic security, which is the challenge that Democracy faces everywhere—in the U.S.A. as well as in Israel. Such an American Zionist party would find its alignment with the labor groups in the World Zionist Organization and should be a source of strength to the present political leadership in Israel. Even as Henry Wallace jarred Harry Truman leftward when he refused to be absorbed or silenced by the regular Democrats and waged an independent campaign of his own, so shall we, outside of the Z. O. A. establish our own councils, speak our own views, and thus exert also a liberalizing influence upon Americans and World Zionism.

In issuing this call, I am certain that I articulate the feelings of many others who are tired of wandering about in the alien corn of existing Zionist groups. If my hunch is correct, let us who share the sentiments herein stated, come together. Let us convoke a meeting, establish an organization, sell shkalim and make our ideology something to be reckoned with in the World Zionist Congress.

tural training centers throughout the Continent in connection with this program, Mr. Warburg reported.

The greatest success in this program was scored in Italy, France, Bulgaria and Poland. As this program gained, the need for direct relief declined, so that cash relief clients were reduced from 98,000 in 1947 to 56,000 last year, and food relief recipients decreased from 410,000 to 320,000 in the year.

It seems that Premier David Ben-Gurion met an old friend on the street one day and asked what he was doing. "Nothing," answered the friend, "nothing at all." "Why, that's preposterous!" said the Premier. "A man as able as you—to be idle. You should be in the government. Name a job and it's yours." "Well," said the friend, "I could use a cabinet post." "Oh, I'm afraid that would be difficult," said Ben-Gurion. "You see, all the posts are filled. Shertok is Foreign Minister. Zisler is Minister of Agriculture. Kaplan is Minister of Finance, and so it goes." "All right," said the friend, "so make me Minister of Air." "But there's no such post," exclaimed the Premier. "What would a Minister of Air do without any aircraft?" The friend gave him a long, shrewd look and shrugged his shoulders. "So," he said, "what is Kaplan doing?"

It was not so long ago when our Irish friends "kidded" us about "the Jewish navy." They thought—and we believed them—that it was an impossibility. Now we have the navy—and also an air force. THIS IS THE HOUSE OF LIVING JUDAISM

WHAT: PHYSICALLY . . . a Center of Liberal Judaism from which will stem vital printed and verbal material significant to the furtherance of a Reform religious, personal and communal life, in America and the world over.
SPIRITUALLY . . . a Center to inspire and command the admiration of Jews and non-Jews alike. A Center to identify the Liberal Jewish movement through conference facilities, exhibits of Judaica and other evidence of its varied program.

WHEN: As soon as the necessary funds have been raised and conditions are favorable, construction will begin.

WHY: The Union of American Hebrew Congregations, and its affiliates, including the National Federations, respectively, of Temple Sisterhoods, Brotherhoods and Youth, imperatively need a Center of their own to carry out the significant and wide-spread program of service to Liberal Judaism in America and the world over.

HOW: Through funds raised by Sisterhood members and their friends—and by projects sponsored by Sisterhood units affiliated with the N.F.T.S. Individual and Special Gifts are welcome in the following categories: Patrons—\$100 or more; Sponsors—\$50 or more; Donors—\$25 or more; Contributors—\$10 or more.

For each contribution, the names of the donor and the person honored or memorialized will be inscribed on an Honor Roll which will permanently bound and displayed in The House of Living Judaism.

If the UNION and its affiliates are to continue their vital services they need and merit their own HOUSE OF LIVING JUDAISM as an American and World Center of Liberal Judaism.

A JEWISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL RESOLVES

"Recognizing that as Israel keeps the Sabbath, the Sabbath keeps Israel, the Executive Committee of the Rockville Centre Jewish Community Council calls upon its constituent organizations to avoid scheduling functions other than Religious Services on Friday nights. We further request that all Jewish families and individuals abstain from holding or participating in personal social engagements Friday Night."
