OUT-OF-TOWN COLLEGES ACCEPT ONLY TWO-THIRDS OF JEWISH APPLICANTS, ADL SURVEY REPORTS

New York, March 16 (JTA)—Outof-town colleges and universities in the United States receive 11 percent of their applications from Jewish students and accord Jews seven percent of their places in freshman classes, a survey conducted by the Elmo Roper organization and financed by a grant from the Anti-Defamation League revealed today.

"The frequent charge made against the colleges that they discriminate against Jewish students seems to be proven, but only in part and perhaps not nearly to the extent which is frequently charged," the report said. While Jews "ultimately succeed in getting a chance at some kind of college education as often as Protestants do," the report points out, they must try more colleges in order to do it.

The report declared that "Jews are a definitely disadvantaged group when it comes to getting into college, but the situation is complex, and cannot be described in the simple terms of general, across-the-board, discrimination. A much larger proportion of Jewish high school seniors apply to college than Protestants or Catholics, and the Jewish applicants are heavily concentrated in the geographic area of greatest over-all application pressure, the northeast, the survey said, adding that the end result is that the "college accepts not only a smaller absolute number of Jewish applicants than non-Jewish, but also a smaller proportion of Jewish applications than non-Jewish."

MAKE RESERVATIONS NOW

MR. HORWITZ GOES TO TEL AVIV

An interview of Mr. Joseph B. Horwitz recently returned from a mission on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal.

- Q. Hello, Mr. Horwitz. I haven't seen you for a long time. Where have you been?
- A. Shalom, I've been in Tel Aviv.
- Q. What! What were you doing there?
- A. It was my honor to have been a member of a delegation of 54 Americans who visited Europe and Israel to learn the needs of the United Jewish Appeal and the methods whereby the Jewish relief agencies assist our brethren.
- Q. And did you find what you were seeking?
- A. I certainly did. In New York we met a group of DPs who had just been brought to the U. S. by the United Service for New Americans. You should have seen the relief and joy registered on the faces of these finally rescused from the DP camps of Europe.
- Q. How did you make the trip abroad?
 A. On a TWA constellation which flew us to Paris in 16 hours.
- Q. Was the flight eventful?
- A. It was smooth sailing but one thing that happened on the plane stirred me deeply.
- Q. What was that?
- A. One of our group was an Orthodox Rabbi. Near sunset he arose to recite the Mincha prayer. Spontaneously all of us put on our hats and joined him. Hearing the Kaddish recited in that moving airplane was electrifying.
- Q. How long were you in Paris and what did you see there?
- A. We were there about three days and we witnessed the magnificent way in which the Joint Distribution Committee uses our funds to rehabilitate the many refugees who have come to France. But the most exciting scenes in the drama of rehabilitation take place in Marseilles, our next stop.
- Q. What did you see there?

- A. In the ancient port city, the JDC and UPA have set up a most efficient system whereby DP's are processed for shipment to Israel. There doctors, sailors, social workers, quartermasters and a whole network of busy personnel look after thousands of Jews from Europe and Africa and provide them with shelter and with transportation to Israel.
- Q. Where was your next stop?
- A. Rome. There we learned that the JDC has already evacuated thousands of refugees with dispatch and with complete success.
- Q. And from Rome you flew to Israel?
- A. Yes. We landed at the Lydda airport.
- Q. And what was your reaction when you touched the soil of the Holy Land?
- A. Believe it or not, all of us broke down and wept.
- Q. And did you see much of Israel?
- A. Yes, we were taken to every part. We saw the cities, the argricultural settlements, and the Negev. And everywhere, we saw the thousands of immigrants who have poured into Israel. We spoke to them in broken Yiddish and English. I tell you that nothing that has been written about Israel is exaggerated. The establishment of the state, the generous absorption of the DPs, the quiet courage of the Israeli—all of these are miracles and all of them filled us with a feeling of joy and pride.
- Q. Did you meet any of the Israeli leaders?
- A. Yes. We were entertained by Dr. Weizmann at the Rehoboth Institute.

- Q. Whom else did you see?
- A. Eleazar Kaplan, the Minister of Finance.
- Q. What did he tell you?
- A. That Israel seeks American capital investment, especially for hotels, light manufacturing, and small industries. He said that were it not for the war and immigration needs, the budget could be balanced.
- Q. Does he invite American tourists?
- A. Yes. Tourists may not receive the most elegant accommodations, but they will be made comfortable and certainly they will enjoy a visit to the Holy Land.
- Q. Whom else did you see?
- A. We visited Goldie Meyerson and James MacDonald, the American ambassador. They were most cordial.
- Q. What was your impression of Tel Aviv?
- A. It is a "little America." It boasts of night clubs, juke boxes, American movies, and in general, is a hustling, bustling metropolis.
- Q. And did you see Jerusalem?
- A. Yes. Old Jerusalem, still under UN control, is very picturesque. But new Jerusalem is a beautiful modern city that gives an impression of dignity and real solidity.
- Q. What happens to the immigrants to Israel?
- A. They are processed according to their skills. With great efficiency, they are distributed to those jobs and localities where they will be most useful and satisfied. Over 20,000 a month are coming into Israel. We saw them in the settlements, in the colonies of the Negev, and in the cities. I was extremely proud of the excellent use to which our funds of the UIA are being put. I could go on and on to describe this richest and most fruitful experience of my whole life. Suffice it to say, that every dollar we contribute to the UJA this year will be an investment

- in the restoration of human hope and dignity.
- Q. Did you meet any Clevelanders during your mission?
- A. In Paris, I met Miss Laura Margoles, in charge of JDC operations in France; and in Rome, I saw another Clevelander, Louis Horwitz, JDC chief of Italy. And in Israel I met a number of young Clevelanders who have settled down there. Especially gratifying to my feeling of local pride was the praise I heard wherever I went for Rabbi Brickner, who several times journeyed abroad for UIA. From Dr. Prato, the chief rabbi of Rome, to Mr. MacDonald, the American ambassador in Israel, the name of Rabbi Brickner was an "open sesame" to all doors and hearts.
- Q. Did the UJA pay expenses?
- A. No. Each of us paid his own way but the spiritual return which I received from this journey is beyond calculation.
