Recognizing that the strength and vigor of Jewish community life is closely related to harmonious family life, the Jewish Family Service Association sponsored Jewish Family Week from April 1 to April 8. The first week of Nissan (April) was chosen because it precedes the traditional family celebration of Passover.

Because of their common goal of happy Jewish family life, many Jewish organizations are cooperating with the agency in observance of Jewish Family Week.

### **OUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT PASSOVER**

MJP. I certainly didn't feel like coming into work today.

SMS. Why not? MJP. Spring fever.

SMS. That reminds me. Passover is

Q. What does Passover have to do with Spring?

A. That's what Passover was originally, the welcoming of Spring.

O. I thought it was the celebration of the deliverance from slavery in Egypt.

A. Yes, that's what Passover became. But its earliest form was an agricultural celebration of Spring's arrival.

Q. But does the name of the holiday indicate that?

A. The Hebrew name for the holiday is Pesach, which, literally, means to frisk about like a lamb. That is how we feel even today when Spring

Q. But Passover has other meanings, doesn't it?

A. Yes, the second chapter in the history of Passover connects it with the deliverance from Egypt. And the word refers to the fact that the Angel of Death "passed over" the Jewish homes. You can read about that in the Bible where the Tenth Plague is described.

Q. What is the purpose of the Seder?

A. The Seder is the home celebration of Passover where the story of the liberation is told.

Q. Does Seder mean supper?

A. No. The word "seder" means "the order of service."

Q. And what does Haggadah mean?

A. It means "the story."

Q. That's the holiday when Matzoh is eaten instead of bread, isn't it?

A. Yes. The Matzoh commemorates the unleavened bread which the Israelites baked in a hurry before their departure from Egypt.

Q. How did a spring festival get mixed up with a holiday of liberation?

A. Passover came to be regarded as the

springtime of Jewish history. Just as nature is liberated from winter, so on this holiday the Israelites emerged from slavery.

Q. When did these events take place?

A. About 3500 years ago.

Q. There are special foods served at the Seder, aren't there? What do they signify?

A. Well the "moror" or bitter herbs are a reminder of the bitterness of

slavery.

Q. What about the parsley?

A. That's the touch of spring. there's the shank bone.

Q. What's that for? A. That symbolizes the lamb which was used as a Passover sacrifice in the days of the Temple.

Q. What does the hard boiled egg signi-

A. The egg is a symbol of new life and it recalls the renewal of freedom for the former slaves. The use of the egg is continued in the Christian Easter observance.

Q. There is some relationship between Easter and Passover, isn't there?

A. Yes. Both were originally Spring festivals and the time of Easter is connected with the time of Passover, since the Christian holiday is reckoned by the Last Supper which is supposed to have been a Seder.

Q. What about the other foods used

at the Seder?

A. You can find the meanings for all of them, Marguerite, in any Haggadah.

Q. When does Passover begin this year? A. On the evening of Wednesday, April

13th.

Q. How long does it last?

A. The Bible stipulates seven days; later it became an eight-day holiday outside of Palestine; and Reform Judaism has reverted back to a seven-day observance.

# HAVE YOU DONE JUSTLY BY THE MOTHER INSTITUTION IN ISRAEL?

From time to time it is my unhappy duty to listen to the complaints of older folks who feel that they are being neglected by their children. On rare occasions the complaint is that the children, having grown prosperous, have even failed to share their prosperity by making the old folks a little more comfortable. You can well understand that there are few tasks amidst the variety that come to me in my calling that are more repugnant than this of having to remind sons and daughters of their obligations to their parents.

In a less personal, though no less poignant way; the Synagogue — the mother institution in Israel—makes the same complaint. She sees her daughter institutions—the charities, the welfare funds, the defense organizations—richly, sometimes lavishly maintained, while she is fed on strict economy rations. These daughter institutions take capital reserves, unemployment insurance, sickness benefits, severance pays, retirement funds, in their stride.

The Synagogue still, for the most part, finds itself outside the circle of these modern safeguards against catastrophe. I have heard of instances where certain individuals have given \$25,000 to the Combined Jewish Appeal and \$100 to their Synagogue.

Even if the Synagogue were only the source and inspiration of the good works of our society, it would on sentimental grounds alone deserve better treatment from our people. But the fact is that the Synagogue is still the central indentifying agency for the Jewish people.

I am convinced that it is just thoughtlessness that accounts for this neglect. Once one thinks about it, one must admit that the Synagogue must maintain itself as the most meaningful and vital institution in Jewish life. Ask yourself, in all sincerity, if you have done justly by your Synagogue—the source of your spiritual being, the seal and sanction of your dignity, the guardian of your hopes.
