#### PROGRESS BEING MADE IN CIVIL RIGHTS

(From a Statement issued by the Commission on Justice and Peace of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.)

In the field of American education, students at both the University of Texas and the University of Missouri expressed themselves by poll in favor of attendance by Negro students. A similar census among faculty members teaching in eleven Southern state universities indicated that in seven of these schools a substantial majority of professors and teachers favor the elimination of racial barriers among their students. In 1949 also, for the first time. three Southern colleges admitted Negroes to their respective summer sessions, and both Harvard and Brown Universities appointed the first Negro members of their faculties.

In the wider arena of public life, equal progress can be noted. The Minnesota and Connecticut National Guard are now open for the first time to enlistment by Negroes on an equal and unsegregated basis. The federal government has announced that financial subsidies for public housing will no longer be approved for projects discriminating against Negroes. The first colored physician to serve in the American Medical Association's house of delegates in the entire 103-year history of that body has been appointed. Nor should we fail to note with pride how Temple Sinai of New Orleans, led by one of our own colleagues set an example of exalted religious living in opening its auditorium to one of the rare peaceful unsegregated public meetings in the city's history.

For Jews such progress as this reinforces our faith that the blessed democracy of America remains our world's most fertile soil for the healthy growth of that human love which emanates from a God of love. But progress in the past must never become an excuse (Continued on Page 6)

#### BOOKS CAN BE JOLLY GOOD FUN They Can Keep a Reader in a Happy Mood on Many a Trying Day, Rabbi Observes

Books, for no reason at all, carry with them an aura of intense seriousness. And, readers of books in subways, on busses, or on trains are suspected of being "high-brows," gloomy people whose foreheads seem to bulge rather ominously. But, really, it isn't so at all. Books can also be fun, rollicking good fun, that can keep a reader in a happy mood on many a trying day. And, if read to the family, can prove to be lots of jolly good fun for them also.

Of course, there are the usual funbooks which represent Jews in all kinds of situations and give a taste of sharp Jewish wit and humor. One thinks immediately of such volumes as Let Laughter Ring by S. Felix Mendelsohn, The Book of Jewish Humor by Rufus Learsi, and the delightful volumes in Yiddish but printed in the Roman alphabet, Royte Pomerantsen and L'Chayim by Immanuel Olsvanger.

#### For That Desert Island

Two books that prove an endless source of delight are *The Wise Men* of *Helm* and their Merry Tales by Solomon Simon and *A Treasury of Jewish Folklore* by Nathan Ausubel. If ever a Jewish reader is stranded on a desert island and has a chance to call for a book to keep his spirits cheerful, he could not do better than order these funsters pronto.

Recently a whole flock of smiling books have settled down on our literary lawns and before flying from our ken let's look at them once more: The Education of Hyman Kaplan by Leonard R. Ross; The King of Schnorrers by Israel Zangwill, and Go Fight City Hall by Ethel Rosenberg.
