BROTHERHOODS, SISTERHOODS SUPPORT COMBINED CAMPAIGN

New York:—The National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, comprised of 450 chapters, and the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods, consisting of more than 200 brotherhoods and men's clubs, pledged all-out support of the Combined Campaign for \$1,875,000 on behalf of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.

Said Mrs. Louis A. Rosett, NFTS President, in a message to Chapter Presidents, "I urge you and your members to give this tremendously significant effort every assistance. The advancement of Liberal Judaism depends on the success of the Combined Campaign. No cause in Jewish life should be dearer to our hearts, nor more deserving of our energy."

Stating that the Combined Campaign strikes at the core of the basic national needs in furthering Liberal Judaism, J. Herbert Kaufman, NFTB President, called on the brotherhoods and men's clubs to lend every assistance to the Campaign. "For our sake", he said, "but of even greater importance, for the sake of our children, we must help to supply the wherewithal to assure a brighter future for the coming generation by wholehearted and generous support to the Combined Campaign for our national institution."

The topic of his radio discourse, which is heard nationally over the American Broadcasting Company network from 10:00 to 10:30 A.M. Eastern Standard Time, will be "Passover and Easter: What They Have in Common." In the evening he will lecture at the Jewish Community Center of Quincy, Mass.

ANSWERS

1. Moses de Leon, the commonly accepted author of the Zohar, wrote that "the earth revolves like a ball . . . when it is day on one-half of the globe, night reigns over the other half . . ."
2. "Jacobs' staff," a sea quadrant, invented by Levi ben Gerson; a perpetual almanac and astronomical tables, devised by Abraham Zacuto; and, the astrolabe, a measuring instrument, to whose development Abraham Ibn Ezra, Jacob ben Machir and Jacob Carsoni, among others, contributed.
3. He is said to have been of Spanish Jewish descent, born of converted Jews; his writings contain biblical references and style; he was protected by Marranos; letters to his son assertedly start with two Hebrew letters, a traditional Jewish custom.
4. There are authorities that have formulated strong arguments pro and con; nevertheless his Jewish origin is still clouded by uncertainty.
5. Isaac Abarbanel and Luis Santangel, a Marrano, the latter having used his influence to arrange for Columbus an interview with Queen Isabella and advanced the funds for the voyage.
6. Queen Isabella did not pawn her jewels, as allegedly reported, to finance the expedition, but money was loaned by Marranos and also obtained from the Jewish property that was confiscated by King Ferdinand in the expulsion of the Jews from Spain.
7. On August 2 (Tishah B'Ab, 1942, the Jews left Spain and on the following day Columbus set sail.
8. Marco, a surgeon; Bernal de Tortosa, the ship's doctor; Luis de Torres, the interpreter; Rodrigo Sanchez; Gabriel Sanchez; and Alfonso de la Calle.
9. The Ten Lost Tribes of Israel.
10. Yes.
11. No. Spain enacted laws prohibiting the settlement of Jews.
12. In 1570 the Inquisition was officially established in Mexico City to handle cases of heresy in Spanish colonial possessions north of the equator. For those south of the equator, the Inquisition was set up in Lima, Peru.
13. As early as 1548 the Portuguese Inquisition banished a goodly number of Marranos to Brazil.
14. Recife, Brazil.
15. The unsuccessful attempt to establish a Jewish colony in Curacao following the banishment of Jews from Brazil in 1654.

UNION ISSUES 17 BOOKS FOR RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS

Seventeen books have been issued by the Commission on Jewish Education of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations for use in religious schools and another four are expected off the presses early in 1950, it was reported this week by Rabbi Solomon B. Freehof, Commission Chairman. Dr. Emanuel Gamoran is Executive Director.

The books utilized the newest techniques of pedagogy and were designed to appeal to students at all levels of religious education. They included: "The Bible Legend Book", a collection of Bible stories for teen agers by Lillian S. Freehof; "The Little Hebrew Schoolhouse", by Dr. Abraham N. Franzblau, a unique self-teaching device for studying beginner's Hebrew; "The Story of Reform Judaism" for teen agers by Rabbi Sylvan D. Schwartzman; "Fill-in-Fun" by Lydia Kaplan, puzzles on Jewish holidays and festivals for children; "Judaism — A Way of Life", by Samuel S. Cohon, a book for adults and young adults; and several plays and other books on Jewish religious, cultural and historical subjects.

Through comprehensive teacher training courses, experimental workshops and publishing new material for religious schools, the Commission is constantly striving to raise the level of Jewish education and develop new lines of activity around religious festivals and cultural themes, the report stated.
