

THE TRAGEDY OF OUR TIME WHERE TO DRAW THE LINE

The human tragedy of Bosnia continues to unfold before our eyes and here we sit again in the west and watch. The killing, the raping, the ethnic cleansing, all echoes of another time, still haunt our sense of well-being and upset our equilibrium. The media images display the inevitable plumes of smoke, weeping women, men in arms with cigarettes dangling from chisled gaping jaws. Hills on fire, cars aflame, governments meeting to halt the slaughter and to debate; seemingly endless debate on where to draw the lines.





Our national debate has arrived at the question of whether or not to send in our troops to police the world. Who amongst us wants to put our young men and women in harm's way to save warring factions from each other, especially if the combatants have been at odds for hundreds of years? We are once again assured that this will not be another Vietnam, as if to speak that name is to utter some awful primordial curse. It is no curse, only our national dispair, and for many, a personal tragedy. But the torture and killing of innocents still does not sit well with us. What to think? What to do?

I believe it is time to step in militarily and risk, yes risk, again for peace. If armies wish to clash, let them. Neither we nor the world should stop them. But we, yes we, you and I, still have an ancient moral obligation to prevent the slaughter of innocents.

Who will stop the killing of children? Who will halt the ethnic cleansing? Who will protect the powerless if not a super power not populated by super egos, but by decent human beings who will draw no lines for decency. No, Bosnia must not become another Vietnam but we must stand up to inhumanity wherever in the world it appears.

I encourage our president to act swiftly and rally our nation and the world. His message must be to end the tragedy of our time again reverberating in south central Europe and draw the line not at national boundaries but at what is unacceptable human behavior.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

We came, we saw, we ate! The recent Confirmation trip to New York City was an enriching and "broadening" experience. From Congregation Emanu-El to the Eldridge Street Synagogue, from the World Trade Center Observation Deck to the Lower East Side, from Sammy's Roumanian to Ratner's, we did it all. All eighteen 10th graders, led by Rabbi Bleefeld and accompanied by Merrie Bleefeld, Karen Elson, and Bonnie Rubenstein, spent four days seeing Jewish New York as it is today, as well as learning through echoes of the past how it used to be. Students visited a scribe at work, attended Shabbat morning services at a Spanish-Portuguese synagogue, and shopped in a Jewish bakery and at Essex Street Pickles. The group also saw the Temple of Dendor at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, attended Phantom of the Opera, walked across the Brooklyn Bridge, took an evening carriage ride through Central Park, and toured the U.N., NBC, the Statue of Liberty, and Ellis Island. Of course, there were lots of opportunities for shopping, too, from Fifth Avenue to Canal Street.

This exciting trip gives students the opportunity to see their Jewish selves from another perspective, to encounter the largest Jewish community outside Israel, and to bond with one another in ways that are not possible inside classroom walls. It's an experience they'll be able to draw upon for years to come.
