

### **Rabbi's Message**

Dear friends,

There is a Hanukkah gift which you may not have opened yet. It is the gift of the Hanukkah story and the challenge and questions it leaves us with.

The story of the Maccabees tells us of the commitment of our people to hold on to our Jewish practices, values and beliefs. When the Maccabees rededicated the Temple in Jerusalem they rededicated themselves and their fellow Jews to the covenant between God and our people. Holding on to that covenant, living a faithful Jewish life in spite of the obstacles and challenges put in our way, is the core message of Hanukkah. Every night, when we light the Hannukkiah, we look at the little flames and know that they are a reminder of our ancestors' commitment to live a Jewish life.

That reminder is our most important Hanukkah gift. We live in a society where freedom of religion is a given right. But this does not mean that we do not face challenges to living as Jews. What are the challenges that you face? What obstacles might prevent you from celebrating shabbat, learning more about Judaism, attending services, supporting Israel and working for justice and peace. Ask yourself whether those obstacles are found in our society, our individual lifestyle, or your own heart.

The Maccabees fought for freedom of religion. Every year we affirm their struggle and celebrate the outcome. We value the freedom to live as Jews. How do you use that freedom? How do you teach your children to value and use that freedom?

These questions are our Hanukkah gifts. I hope you will take them with you into this winter season to unwrap, ponder and respond to.

### **NEW POLICY FOR TEMPLE EVENTS**

#### Photography and Videography Policy

The Board of Trustees has adopted this new policy. As Temple members, we know that you would not think of taking pictures during a public service. We ask your cooperation in helping to remind guests for life cycle events who are not familiar with our customs.

### Policy

The Board of Trustees of Temple Sholom recognizes that families with life cycle events (baby naming or bar/bat mitzvah) during public worship services want to preserve the day's activities for posterity.

To preserve the sanctity of the event, we have developed this policy to outline the appropriate ways that photography and videography may be used in the sanctuary.

Families might want to include the following notice in the service handouts to be shared with the family's guests so that our expectations are clear and the sanctity of the day is preserved:

We appreciate your cooperation in not taking photographs (flash or otherwise) during the service. This will ensure that there are no distractions to service, the participants, or the congregation. *Thank you!* 

### Other guidelines we ask you to follow:

• You are welcome to take photographs either well prior to or following the service. These "staged" photographs can include the Rabbi and/or the Torah as appropriate.

• There will be no photographs taken during the service, whether flash or not.

• If you wish to make a video of the service, you may do so by locating the video camera in a fixed position in the rear of the sanctuary, not to be moved during the service. The rabbi will have final approval of the location of the camera. The operator of the video camera is not to move about the sanctuary nor make any noise (including noise from the camera) during the service. Your cooperation will ensure that neither the participants on the bima or the congregants are distracted from their attention to the service.

If there are any questions about this policy, they may be directed to the chair of the Worship Committee or the President of the congregation.

Aliyah. "Going up" to read from the Torah.



Part II - Historically, only people who could actually read from the Torah received an alivah; the first person called to read from the Torah would say the opening blessing andthe last person called would say the concluding one. As Jewish literacy decreased, however, the reading of the Torah was assigned to a professional, a ba'al korei (literally, "a master of reading") who specialized in the task, at which point there was nothing left for the people receiving an alivah to do except look on while the ba'al korei did his job. In order to maintain the democratic nature of the Torah reading, the blessings were reassigned so that the people called to the Torah said them both, one before and one after the reading for which they had been called. 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
