Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

Thank you for the privilege of serving as your rabbi in the coming months.

The busy flurry of fall holidays has ended, and now we are immersed in the activities of a new year. Religious School is in session with the youngsters engaged in their studies of holidays, Jewish heroes, and Hebrew. In the Torah, we have once again begun the story of our people.

While the text we read remains the same, we do not. We are not the people we were but one short year ago. Our experiences of the past year have caused us to grow and change. And the renewal of ourselves as people, the promises and goals we set for ourselves in the annual "examination of our souls" during the Days of Awe, remain in fresh ink on the new page.

Unlike the quick succession of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah, the two months leading to the beginning of Chanukah are a "quiet time" on our calendar. It is a perfect opportunity to engage ourselves in that quest for renewal. Jewish Book Month begins on Thursday, November 20. There has never been a better time to find that "perfect" Jewish book. Whatever you enjoy—be it fiction, art, cooking, biography, history, holidays, beliefs and theology, our traditional Jewish texts—beautiful new books as well as older ones are available. Take the occasion of Jewish Book Month to find something new to enjoy for yourself, a loved one, or friend.

Our tradition teaches that one should be quick to engage in doing *mitzvot*. It is not too soon to be looking ahead to Chanukah. For several years, the North American Conference on Ethiopian Jewry (NACOEJ) has sponsored a project that enables us to share our celebration with those in need. The truth is that the Ethiopian Jews in Israel need our help to reach their potential. The "Eighth Night of Chanukah" program enables NACOEJ to provide nutritious lunches for an Ethiopian Jewish child in Israel. NACOEJ offers an after-school program for these youngsters to help them catch up to their Israeli-born classmates. But to take advantage of the ability to learn requires nutritious and high-energy food. What NACOEJ asks is that for the last night of Chanukah your gift to a child, friend, or even to yourself be the special gift of *tzedakah* in that individual's name. For \$18, one of the Ethiopian youngsters will enjoy lunches for two weeks, and the

individual in America whom you honor receives a personalized Certificate of Appreciation plus a photo of some of the children in Israel being helped. It also makes a wonderful gift for the person who has everything he or she needs or wants. For the past few years, I have given this present to my father for Chanukah. You can find additional information in this bulletin.

If you prefer to engage in *g'milut chasadim*, acts of loving kindness, closer to home, there are always needs within the community. Food pantries need much food for the cold winter as well as people to help them process the donations that peak in the Thanksgiving-to-Christmas season. Soup kitchens need help to prepare and serve hot meals. There is a need for warm clothing, especially coats, and holiday gifts for youngsters. Or you could volunteer your services on Christmas to enable someone who would normally work on Christmas Day to be home to celebrate with his or her family.

We shall be having Shabbat morning services at 10:00 a.m. on November 15 and December 6. I invite you to step back from your busy day-to-day activities and join us for a brief service, some Torah, and some time spent with fellow congregants.

In the days ahead I look forward to getting to know each one of you.

There is so much that goes into successful High Holidays, and I have taken a lot of space to thank only some of the people involved. There was literally no one who said no when they were asked to help — and that, indeed, as our Torah portion says: *every one in Israel, men, women and children worked together*

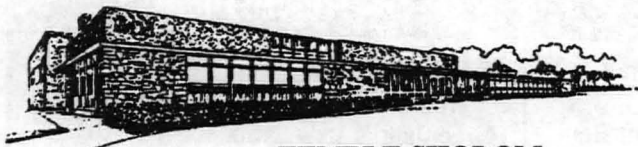

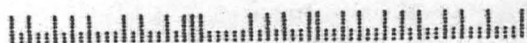
