A reminder that at this time of year, especially with the cold, food pantries and shelters are overtaxed, so any donations you can make to support them are much appreciated, and I also commend to your attention Mazon, the Jewish organization that seeks to alleviate hunger.

## Rabbi's Message

I have written about Tu Be'Shevat, the New Year for the Trees, in prior years. I don't want to repeat myself, so let me just urge you to attend the Seder the evening of February 3<sup>rd</sup> in Harrisonburg. It is a wonderful ritual celebrating trees and their produce, the land of Israel, Kabbalistic thought and teachings, environmentalism and our connection to the land and the earth as a whole, and Torah, as well as our gratitude to G-d for creation and all its' bounty. Be there or be square – `nuff said.

Looking towards next month, I want to say a few words about Purim ahead of time. The holiday of Purim falls in the month of March. Purim is seen as a fun holidays, often thought of as being for children – like Halloween, a time of dress-up, make-believe, silliness, loud noisemakers, parades, songs and skits, and tasty treats. And, to be sure, it is. But at the same time, Purim is a very serious holiday. It is not accidental that the rabbis would write about the day of atonements by re-parsing their name – calling them not Yom Kippurim (Day of Atonements), but Yom Ki Purim, Day LIKE Purim. What would it mean to say that the most solemn day, a day of complete fasting and focusing entirely on the spiritual, is like the day of Purim, a time of mirth and tricks and treats?

Looking past the things that catch the attention of children, Purim is a story that demonstrates a much deeper and often darker aspect. It shows us power, and the abuse and corruption of it; the demeaning and objectification of others, the arousal and nurturance of bigotry, xenophobia, and jealousy; the consuming fire of lust and greed. It shows us a time when what is good is hidden and G-d seems absent, until the individual acts as G-d would have them do. It overturns the social order, showing that despite appearances the 'powerful' are not, that true power resides in the individual – even if they appear powerless; that good can triumph over evil, but only if good people act, even at the threat or cost of losing their lives.

The story of Purim is set in a Persian satrapy, but there is nothing about it that could not occur today, in a hundred places – and this begs the question of whether it is in fact being acted out now somewhere, or in several somewhere; and perhaps at times even here in our own land. I am coming to believe that there is no people, no nation, that is completely guiltless in these matters. The story is remarkable in that it calls on us to reach within ourselves and find the strength, the courage, and the moral fiber to do what is right, no matter how powerless we may feel, no matter how hard it may be, no matter what the society in which we live may say. It is a call to action, to fulfill the commandment enunciated in the phrase, **Tzedkek, Tirdof! Justice! Justice SHALL you pursue**.

May we all be blessed to feel that call, to muster the urgency and strength to respond to it, to find it within our power to answer it and to act, and to see those acts come to fruition speedily in our own days so that the world will be at one, and all our children will know abundant blessings, and everyone will rest beneath their fig trees and vines and know peace. And let us say, Amen.
