



Tacoma Sister Cities 2015 Film Festival presents the Israeli film: *Igor & the Cranes' Journey*

The Tacoma Sister City Film Festival has moved! The Tacoma-Kiryat Motzkin, Israel Sister City Committee is presenting *Igor & the Cranes' Journey* in the Tahoma Room of Commencement Hall at the University of Puget Sound. Plan on bringing family, friends and neighbors to this not-to-bemissed Israeli movie event.

Engagingly made and rather old-fashioned in tone, *Igor & the Cranes' Journey* is the tender tale of a young boy—moved away from his home to a strange new country—who equates his journey to that of the young cranes he and his ornithologist father watch over.

Eleven-year-old Igor (Itai Shcherback) and his ornithologist father Peter (Tomasz Sobczak) witness the birth of a crane in the wilds of Russia, and Igor—who christens the young hatchling Karl—vows to watch over him. The migration of cranes from Eastern Europe to nesting grounds in Africa is a perilous journey, with more than half of the young cranes not surviving their first voyage. Now Igor learns that his mother and he are making *Aliyah* to Israel, and Igor faces his own flight to the unknown. The boy has difficulty adjusting to a new life, a new culture and language. Unhappy at school, he turns to drawing pictures of his beloved cranes, and his drawings catch the eye of classmate Vered (Clil Arbel), who befriends him.

Babe Lehrer knew her community

It is with great sadness we have said goodbye to one of our longstanding members, Babe Lehrer. Her accomplishments extended beyond the doors of our temple

and into the Tacoma community, where she left behind many memories of her achievements. I first got to know Babe through the greater Tacoma community, and the work she did at Tacoma Community College and at the Broadway Center. I was there when the Goddess of

Commerce, a modern take on the statute of a woman that used to stand atop the Chamber of Commerce building, was erected on August 31, 2011 at the corner of St. Helen's & 6th wanted to recognize that Babe was Ave. Babe Lehrer was instrumental in having sculptor Marilyn Mahoney's work located at this location.

For those of you who knew Babe intimately through Temple Beth El, you have a picture of her I will never have. I became a member of Temple Beth El in 2006 when I moved to Tacoma. I see her name at our temple and appreciate that she has been a strong part of what has been our

history as Jews in Tacoma. I am glad I see what she has done in our community as a woman and as a Jew to make a positive difference. I just able to impact both her Jewish community and her Tacoma community. Thank you, Babe, for leaving behind many reminders of the things you cared about. I hope that the many people you have touched in this community will find a way to continue to carry on your passion for our temple and its connection to the larger community.

Just a little less than a year ago, I found myself sitting in the home office of Babe Lehrer with the purpose of hearing her story behind the "We Honor a Hero" bronze statue on the corner of N 12th and I Streets in

Tacoma so that I could write an article for the Lowell PTA newsletter. As a PTA mom at Lowell Elementary and resident of the neighborhood, I had been touched over and over again Tacoma shortly after the incident). by the statue of a young crossing guard holding the hand of a younger student trying to help him escape flying bricks from the April 13, 1949 earthquake.

I came to find out that the crossing guard, Marvin Klegman, was a member of Temple Beth Israel (which would eventually become Temple Beth El) and that the Lehrer and the Klegman families had been very close. nephew Marty Lyon to design the So when eleven-year-old Marvin Klegman was fatally wounded from falling bricks as he bravely and

selflessly saved his schoolmate, Kelcy Allen, the Jewish community was shocked and saddened. Marvin's death was one of only two statewide during the 7.1 magnitude earthquake that rattled the Northwest.

In March 2001, Babe read in the Tacoma News Tribune that Kelcy Allen, a Kirkland resident and Tacoma native, had visited Tacoma to research the 1949 earthquake where he had been saved by a crossing guard whose name he did not even know (since his family had moved out of Babe's reaction was, "We need to do something to honor Marvin Klegman." Kelcy Allen had been wondering for over fifty years how to show his gratitude for the boy who saved his life at the cost of his own.

In less than a year, Babe raised \$164,000, which was enough to hire renowned sculptor Larry Anderson to create a memorial, and enlist her landscaping around the sculpture on the grounds of Lowell Elementary. There was even enough left over to

create an endowment for the Lowell PTA! Every year, Lowell PTA celebrates Marvin Klegman Day and the children practice acts of kindness.

With Babe's recent passing, I am inspired by her commitment to service and community. She volunteered to raise large amounts of funds for a multitude of organizations in her "retirement years." Everyone in the fundraising community knew they could depend on Babe to achieve the impossible and she never disappointed them. I only got to know Babe recently, but during the hour or so she shared with me about her life, she made me feel as if I had known her for years. I know her passion and devotion to projects that make a difference will continue to inspire others. I cannot help but think of Babe when I read the following quote by Albert Pike, "What we have done for ourselves alone dies with us; what we have done for others and the world remains and is immortal." Thank you, Babe!
