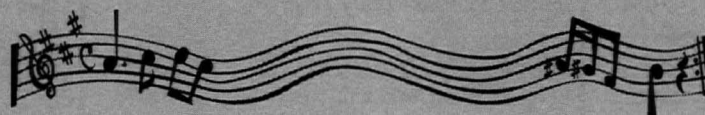

Cantor Aronson has filled our sanctuary with creative and innovative music, and will continue to do so with a service in his honor on November 21. This service will introduce music into our Shabbat worship experience that we will enjoy for years to come. A CD of this music is available in the Temple office, free of charge, to all congregants who wish to familiarize themselves with the music before the service. We are also fortunate to have with us Merri Arien, Musical Director of Synagogue 2000 and a staff member of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. Merri is a master teacher and she, along with our special band, will be teaching the new music on Thursday evening, November 20.

In honor of Cantor Aronson's milestone anniversary, the Temple community is invited to participate in the "Change for Change" program. As you know, small cans with the "Change for Change" logo were distributed to the congregation on Yom Kippur morning, as well as to all our religious school students. Cantor Aronson has forged a relationship during his sabbatical with two schools in southern Israel. It came to his attention that due to the decrease in tourism and the generally poor economy in Israel, many Israelis are suffering. Children are sent to school without lunch because their families simply can't afford it. The plight of our Israeli brothers and sisters touched Cantor Aronson greatly. He wishes for all monies donated in his honor to "Change for Change" be sent to these schools in Israel.

Please pick up a "Change for Change" can if you have not already done so, and fill it with your loose change each day. If you'd like, you may send a check to Temple, made out to Change for Change, and your gift will be forwarded to these two schools.

Join us in song and celebration to honor and rejoice with Cantor Aronson and his family on November 21st. Cantor Aronson has touched so many of our lives with his glorious voice — let's join him in reaching out to Israeli children who desperately need our help.

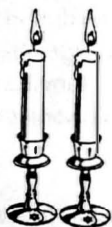


Extend a Welcoming Hand: Be a New Member Sponsor

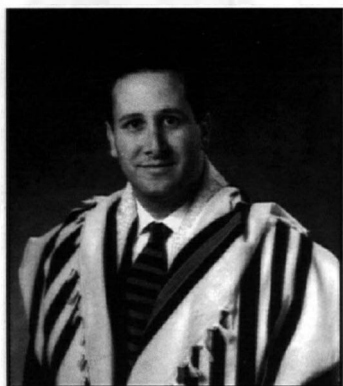

From the Rabbi's Study

Dear Friends,

What a joy it was to see our entire Temple family together to pray over these past High Holy Days. There was an energy that I personally have

never experienced in just that way, and I am truly appreciative of it. As many of you have shared with me (and I agree), the new Afternoon Service created by Cantor Aronson and a remarkable team of Temple members was even more powerful than I ever expected it would be. Amazing things are happening here at TSTI and I truly feel privileged to be part of them.

For me, the High Holy Days' most powerful moments are often connected to the beauty and strength of our Cantor's voice. Cantor Ted Aronson has shared his talent, his passion and his creativity with our congregation for over 36 years. This year in fact, marks the beginning of his third Chai year, and that in itself is a remarkable achievement.

I hope that our entire Temple family will be together on November 21 to celebrate our Cantor's ongoing commitment and dedication to our synagogue. In keeping with who our Cantor is as a human being, as a Jew and as a member of

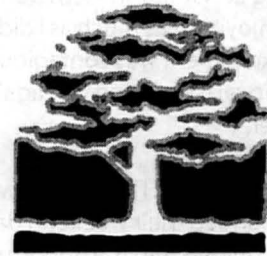

Brandishing hammers, utility knives and rulers, sixteen TSTI volunteers helped in the construction of two houses on Sunday, September 14, as part of Habitat for Humanity's worldwide "Building on Faith" Week. The group worked on the 47th and 48th houses built by Habitat-Newark since 1989, an effort that has helped revitalize the economically depressed Central Ward, which is now undergoing a renaissance.

"We hung sheetrock in two houses, a demonstration of carpentry skills for some of us and a learning experience for others," explained Barbara Laub, one of the TSTI coordinators. "It was very satisfying knowing that we were helping to build decent housing for hard-working people who would otherwise have little opportunity to own a home, while also helping to improve our neighboring community. And it was great working alongside a group of really terrific people and getting to know them better!"

Margaret Prentice, Habitat-Newark's coordinator for religious groups was equally enthusiastic. "It was really fun being with people showing that 'first time' excitement in volunteering at Habitat. In fact, I don't recall ever enjoying it as much as I did... Your excitement was contagious! We look forward to seeing you again in November."

After a very scientific research study in which I surveyed hundreds of people of all ages and tabulated the results, I can state without a doubt that an overwhelming number of people still expect and enjoy a cake for their birthday celebration. Okay, maybe the study really only included 30 children in our KinderRichment classes and most of the 35 teachers on staff, but 'cake' was almost always the answer to the question, "What do you like to eat at a birthday party?" There was the occasional 'ice cream' response and one vote for pasta. For me, the results were not exactly surprising. What was surprising, however, was that most people go to the bakery for birthday cakes.

Growing up in my house, buying a birthday cake was never an option. My mom always baked our cakes. I remember a round carousel cake with red and white straws holding up the carousel ceiling and animal crackers circling the cake. There was a Martian made with styrofoam balls covered in tin foil sitting on a rocket ship-shaped cake. As I got older, my mom made me apple dumplings, a pistachio cake and an ice cream cake. Whatever I came up with, mom would take the time to buy the ingredients, haul out the mixer, measure, sift, and clean up. And I would be right next to her, helping with every step. I ate the raw batter off of the beaters, I ate a few chocolate chips that conveniently missed the bowl, and I helped to put on the finishing touches. I stayed very quiet for the half hour or so that the cake was baking because my mother told me that the cake would 'fall' if I talked loudly or jumped around. It was many years after having my own children that mom confessed that the cake wouldn't have fallen, she just wanted a few minutes' peace.

So it is no wonder that I bake all my children's cakes. I made Jamie a Minnie Mouse cake using black licorice whips for the details. I made a dinosaur

for Alex complete with tiny chocolate football candies as eggs and a huge stalk of broccoli as a tree. I made a stove complete with tiny pots and pans. I even made a tiny fried egg by 'smooshing' down a marshmallow and placing a yellow M&M in the center. And my children were always beside me every step of the way. Jamie fixed Minnie's eyebrows because I made Minnie look angry. Alex peeled the foil off of the football candies. They each licked the batter off a beater.

And now the tradition has been passed on to my children. Alex has baked birthday cakes for my husband Larry and me. Jamie now bakes 'theme' cakes for her friends. The last one I remember was a swimming pool with blue Jello 'water' and little Teddy Grahams swimming around with Chuckles Rings as swim tubes.

The tradition is not just about the cake; it's taking the time to teach the next generation how to entertain their friends and how to entertain their family for the holidays. My nieces can't bake because their mom doesn't. They'll never make a brisket, because their mom doesn't. They'll never make their own matzo balls because their mom doesn't. Ok, my matzo balls are sometimes sinkers, but so were my grandma's. I didn't love her any less nor starve if they were a bit on the hard side.

In an age of machines that are supposed to make our lives easier to give us more free time, why is it that we don't have time to teach our children how to give of their time and of themselves. Of course making the time to cook from scratch and work full time is hard. But to quote a line from the movie 'A League of Their Own': "It's the *hard* that makes it good." Yes, making the whole meal is exhausting; making a cake with a child is a mess. But I'd rather spend half an hour and have a child sit near me while we learn to crack eggs and measure the flour than spend five minutes driving to the bakery. You can't even tell from the outside what's inside a bakery cake — at least I know that love is inside mine.
