# From the Rabbi's Study

One of the things I have learned during the past thirteen years here at TSTI is that congregations are always "works in progress". Because synagogues are living, growing, entities, there is never a time (nor should there be a time) when we are not constantly reevaluating, tweaking and reinventing what we do and how we do it.

For this reason, over the past few years we have taken small, but meaningful steps to make our synagogue ever-more accessible to our entire Temple family. During the first phase of our on-going renovation, we added an elevator and ramps so that the entire facility would be open and welcoming to all, regardless of physical limitations. When we renovated the sanctuary a few years later, we added a ramp to the bimah, so that it too might welcome everyone. I am proud of the changes we have made, but I am aware that "accessibility" is not achieved by

architecture alone. It is a philosophy that is central to who we are as a community!

It is for this reason that we hold our annual High Holy Day Appeal. The appeal is driven by our commitment to ensure that TSTI is accessible to all. A successful annual campaign allows us to ensure that anyone and everyone who wants to be part of Temple life is able to become part of TSTI and to participate in the full range of programs and activities regardless of finances. Your participation in the campaign is greatly appreciated and helps shape our commitment as a Temple family.

This past summer we installed a new call-in system that makes worship and life-cycle events accessible to anyone who has a telephone. People who are unable to leave their homes due to health or other limitations can now listen to services as they occur, from the comfort of their own home. Through the generosity and vision of our Josh Littman Video Library, this new technology further enhances our

ability to help everyone maintain their involvement in Temple life.

Finally, during the past few years we have seen a trend in which long-time temple members have retired to adult communities in South Jersey. How truly blessed are we that they have maintained their membership and support of our congregation despite the increased distance. In the next few months we will begin to hold Shabbat services in a variety of locations — bringing Temple to those who no longer live in the towns surrounding South Orange and, I pray, furthering our commitment to make TSTI a congregation that is open and available to everyone who chooses to make this their spiritual home.

I am truly honored to be part of a congregation that makes openness and accessibility, central to our communal mission. As our Temple continues to evolve, I look forward to finding new and innovative ways to make your temple accessible and meaningful to you.

### Scholar-in-Residence

## Dr. Alan Cooper

Friday, November 19 to Sunday, November 21

Dr. Alan Cooper holds a dual appointment as Professor of Bible at both the Jewish Theological Seminary and Union Theological Seminary in New York City.

Dr. Cooper will examine, What's So Heroic About Our Biblical Hero(ine)s. The weekend will include three learning opportunities on Abraham and Sarah, Rebecca and Jacob, and Moses and Aaron. In traditional Jewish interpretation, the patriarchs and matriarchs usually are portrayed as ideal role models. Modern commentators tend to see them as more rounded and flawed characters. We will discuss how we can reconcile the representation of the ancestors as ideal types with the apparent moral realism of the stories themselves?

After a few days of rain from various tropical storms and hurricanes during the beginning of our Preschool year the children were finally able to play outdoors. On one glorious, cloudless, unusually warm day preschoolers were very happily playing outside in our two playgrounds. Children were swinging from monkey bars, sliding down slides, climbing on rope ladders and digging in the sandboxes. Some were collecting chestnuts and fallen leaves, others twirling in circles and still others on the tire swing. It was the kind of day that you just don't want to miss any part of by staying indoors.

I thought back to when I was a child and the types of play equipment at my neighborhood playground. There was a wooden merry-go-round, seesaws, and swings that looked like horses, all of which have since been removed for one reason or another, probably because of stricter safety laws. I'm sure that had lawsuits been more prevalent in my younger years, I never would have fallen under the merry-go-round as I lost my footing trying to jump on. I never would have flipped off backwards from the seesaw when my older brother and his friend far outweighed me on their side. And I never would have gotten my long black hair caught in the chains of the horsy swing. No one made a big deal of these minor mishaps. I got a kiss on the boo-boo and a Band-Aid, but I digress.

Playgrounds in New Jersey that fall under the state licensing mandates of the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) as we do, have recently been directed to update and improve the safety of playground equipment by the year 2007. We are fortunate that the majority of our equipment is up to code, but much needs to be replaced due to age and to expanded use by our ever-growing preschool population.

Our Preschool board has held many successful fundraising events to raise the money necessary to not only replace some pieces of outdated equipment, but also to expand and improve the existing playscape. A price quote of \$21,000 given to us 3 years ago has now tripled, not just because of increased labor and materials costs. but also due to the fact that the playground equipment is now 3 years older.

Our newest fundraiser is 'Shop Sharey', a one-night, one-stop holiday shopping experience. For the small price of admission you may have some wine, cheese, dessert and coffee while you browse among the many vendors selling artistic items for the home, children's gifts, jewelry, stationery, clothing, make-up, handbags and gift baskets, to name a few. The Temple Gift Shop is also open as is our annual Book Fair. I invite you to mark your calendars and join us in support of our preschool playground-rebuilding fund. We hope you will encourage your

friends in the community to join you on the evening of Thursday, November 11 for some snacking, shopping and socializing.





# Project SHIN Nurse

As November rolls around, so do cold and flu prevention considerations.

With the shortage of flu shots, it is **most important** for all of us to take advantage of the precautions that we can take as individuals, at any age. First and foremost is **HAND WASHING**, especially before you eat, after toileting, and before and after you have spent time with friends, family and coworkers. Covering your mouth and or nose with a tissue or handkerchief if you cough or sneeze and then washing your hands offers added protection.

Second, eat nutritionally, get enough rest and drink fluids, fluids, fluids (unless you have a fluid restriction). Fluids are good any time, in the heat or in the cold to replenish fluids lost and keep from getting dehydrated from sun, head or stomach related flu symptoms and fever. Fluids also help to keep your skin and other organs healthy, moist and clear, especially important when taking medication. Furthermore, if you do get sick, the fluids will help flush your system and help protect against or decrease severity of most cold and flu related infections.

Last, but not least, is regular exercise, according to your ability. It helps to boost the immune system, improve heart and lung function and promote uplifting feelings.

The flu is a virus spread through the air. Care and time, not antibiotics, help. Unlike the more mild symptoms of a cold, flu symptoms come on suddenly. Other symptoms include a splitting headache, dry cough, muscle aches, exhaustion, and fever.

In years past, everyone was encouraged to get a flu shot but this year's vaccine shortage has complicated things. Please talk with your doctor about the benefits and risks of getting a flu shot and whether you qualify this year. Although flu shots are given into December and January, it is recommended to get it sooner than later. If you and your doctor conclude that getting a flu shot would be beneficial, there are a number of community resources available.

In addition to going to your doctor's office you may call your local pharmacy or supermarket, community health department, or local hospital for specific availability, times and location. Also check with the web site: www.findaflushct.com. Note that a small fee may be charged for the flu shot.


