# Why ARZA Membership is Especially Important NOW

• ARZA is the founder and patron of the Israel Religious Action Center, which fights for religious rights for Reform Jews, new immigrants and all Israelis. The Center's offices in Jerusalem include a legal department, a legal advocacy center for new immigrants, a bureau dealing with alternative religious services and public complaints, a public education and media department and a policy makers information service. The Center makes an important contribution towards promoting the ideals and values inspired by Reform Judaism.

IRAC is the leading organization in Israel dealing with matters of religion and State and is at the cutting edge of promoting changes that further the causes of civil and religious rights and democracy.

• ARZA is the creator of Operation Equality, a campaign to gain legal recognition of Reform marriages in Israel through a national public relations and education campaign. This campaign will support those in Israel promoting a civil-marriage bill that will be introduced in the Israeli Knesset. This historic legislation will grant non-Orthodox rabbis the right to officiate at weddings in Israel for the first time in the history of the state.

• **ARZA** sponsors annual missions of Knesset members and other Israeli policy makers to the United States where they learn about the vitality of the Reform movement. In addition, they explore the American Jewish community with special emphasis on religious pluralism.

• ARZA sponsors an annual mission of Reform rabbis to the Middle East, where they explore the ongoing peace process in the region and meet with Arab and Israeli policy makers. Rights for Reform Jews in Israel and issues of religious pluralism are of primary concern on this important mission.

• **ARZA** supports Reform education initiatives being pursued by the Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism. Among these initiatives are curriculum writing, schools, synagogue and community center programming.

• ARZA supports Reform kibbutzim, Lotan and Yahel, as well as Har

Halutz, the Reform free enterprise settlement in Northern Israel.

• **ARZA** represents the American Reform movement in the World Zionist Congress. The congress is a critical international forum for the discussion of religious rights and equitable funding for Reform institutions in Israel.

NASO

Torah: Numbers 4:21-7 Haftorah: Judges 13:2-25

Naso continues the numbering of the Levitical families and details their transport duties. Most important, this portion contains the simple and threefold petition in Numbers 6:24-26 known as the "Priestly Blessing."

### Shabbat June 7-8

### BEHAALOTECHA

Torah: Numbers 8:1-12:16 Haftorah: Zechariah 2:14-4:7

This portion is known for its description of our most favorite symbol of Judaism – the menorah.

### Shabbat June 14-15

### SHELACH

Torah: Numbers 13:1-15:41 Haftorah: Joshua 2:1-24

This portion relates the story of the 12 spies and their repost. The incident is a turning-point in the lives of all those born in slavery. In addition we read of the command to wear tzitzit.

### Shabbat June 21-22

### KORACH

Torah: Numbers 16:1-18 Haftorah: I Samuel 11:14-12:22

We read in detail "the great mutiny" against Moses led by Korach, Dathen and Abiram.

### Shabbat June 28-29

CHUKAT-BALAK

Torah: Numbers 19:1-25:9 Haftorah: Micah 5:6-6:8

While we read of the deaths of both Miriam and Aaron, this double portion concentrates on the story of Balak, King of Moab and the soothsayer Balaam.

# The Pre-School At Temple Emanuel


The Pre-School at Temple Emanuel proudly announces the addition of a Transitional Kindergarten to it's 1996-97 programming. Dedicated to developmentally appropriate education for children ages 2-6, a Transitional Kindergarten is seen as a natural progression for those children who are age appropriate for Kindergarten but who need an extra year of development to optimize their success in public school. There is never a sense of failure, nor a need to repeat a grade already experienced. This highly motivating and enriching curriculum for the Transitional Kindergarten provides mental stimulation and creativity as well as the luxury of time to journey (not race) through childhood. Transitional Kindergarten is neither another four year old program nor a kindergarten. There are no workbooks or worksheets but hands on exciting learning in a nurturing, caring, and concerned environment. The "graduates" of Transitional Kindergarten are super ready for the rigors of our South Jersey School districts.

In addition to the new Transitional Kindergarten, we are also adding to our 1996-97 programming a Temple Toddler Class. This class is offered for children 18-24 months accompanied by a parent. We eagerly look forward to welcoming our youngest population to the Pre-School.

# con-TEMPLE-ations

There are lots of reasons the experts, the recruiters, the friends, friends' parents give you for sending your child to overnight camp. It will expand their horizons, teach them independence, hone their socialization skills. What they don't tell you is what overnight camp really does. Simply, it's a training ground for parents who expect their children to go away to college. The golden triad of dashed parental expectations - don't expect an out-of-town reflection of your housekeeping (unless you reside in a frat house), don't expect gratitude and, most of all, don't expect mail.

It starts off quite innocently enough. A Camp Harlam representative comes to Temple Emanuel with a video, a shpiel and a bevy of Temple Emanuel Harlamites who glow when their beloved camp is mentioned. You find yourself awash in anticipation of a first sleepaway camp experience for your beloved first born. She, in turn, suggests that maybe you go to camp instead. But, not before putting a cement pond in the backyard where she and her other slacker friends can loll for a few months.

You tell her the names of the other children she knows who are going. She asks you, if they jump off a bridge, is she expected to as well. You sense the system is breaking down here. She decides, out of the blue, that she's going to try overnight camp. Here's where all your rules of consumerism fly out the window. You explain the predicament to the kind young woman who answers and give her the name of the errant camper. "Oh, she gets lots of mail," is the response. "You see, we're doing our part," you retort, perhaps a bit too quickly.

Well, summer is upon us once again and a significantly wiser mother is packing for a two month stint at overnight camp. The list includes a Camp Harlam sweatshirt, teeshirt and gymshorts, two dozen Temple Emanuel teeshirts and a fax machine. You can't blame a parent for trying.
