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PRESIDENT'S Message

Houston in November is supposed to be warm, but I can almost always guarantee whenever I travel south a cold front is going to welcome me. So it was not a surprise when thirteen of us traveled to Texas for the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) Biennial the weather was unseasonably cold. But what a warm welcome we received!

Every two years, the URJ holds its convention in a different city. This year more than 5000 Jews gathered at the George Brown convention center in downtown Houston. I had always heard a lot about Biennials, but never had been able to attend one. Imagine celebrating Shabbat with that many people. It was an incredible experience, especially watching the teens and college aged kids join in the celebration - all future leaders of

Reform Judaism.

But what had a significant impact on me was our day trip to the Houston Head Start program. You may remember that Temple Emanuel "adopted" this Head Start program after Hurricane Katrina displaced families from Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. The Houston Public Schools absorbed 26,000 children into their system, with Head Start providing a program for 3, 4 and 5 year old children to prepare them for entry into school.

Through the generosity of you, our members, we were able to send a significant amount of money and gift cards that personally impacted at least 80 families. At a lunch that we attended at the Houston District School Headquarters we met many of the Katrina families your gifts had touched. The people were so thankful and we were so humbled. Believe me when I tell you that putting a face on the devastation that this hurricane left on these families could break your heart. At the same time the event was very uplifting. People were so grateful to have escaped with their lives and have their families intact. It made me think how lucky we are and reminded me to enjoy the small things in life.

As we enter the secular New Year, I would like to personally thank all of you who made some kind of contribution to the Katrina Relief Fund. Your gifts truly made a difference. As time eases our collective memories and Katrina leaves the news, please try to remember the people that are living day to day. I know I will never forget them.

CANTOR'S NOTES

"The music of worship does five things... It enhances the message of the words, evokes associations of the flow of time in the sacred calendar, bonds together the worshipping community, stirs our emotions, and helps us know the presence of God."

"The Art of Public Prayer" - Lawrence A. Hoffman

In my previous articles I discussed some aspects of the quote above. This month I want to focus on music's ability to bond together the worshipping community.

We all come to the synagogue for different reasons. Some come to be inspired by the words of our prayers or the sermon of the rabbi. Others come to be moved by the music, while others are here to simply be with other Jews or for life cycle events (b'nai mitzvah, yahtzeits, baby namings, etc.). Whichever reasons bring us together, once we are in the synagogue, we become one community. Although each one experiences the liturgy differently, we all receive the same information, hear the same song and sing the same melodies together. This creates very strong bonds among us. Singing together strengthens our connection to one another, our trust in one another and our love for one another. Any interaction with others brings us closer to them.

In the years when I performed opera, the cast always rehearsed the opera for a few months before the performances. No matter how large or small the cast of a particular production, strong bonds of friendship always occurred among the singers. As our life paths have taken most of us in different directions, I have not kept in touch with most of my opera friends. A couple of times I had the opportunity to meet some old colleagues and to my amazement and great pleasure that close bond and deep friendship was instantly reestablished!

So it is with our worship experience. When we sing together, we expose a little of our inner selves to other worshippers, becoming a sacred community united in our praise to God, raising our voice in song and filling our hearts with love of God and one another. Let us use this bond to attain a higher spirituality and to make our worship more meaningful!

On December 1, 2005 our children's choirs (Shirei Hayeladim and Sababa) performed Chanukah songs at the "Holiday Lighting Ceremony" at this Cherry Hill Township annual event. Children from Trinity Presbyterian Church also performed. A reception followed and a good time was had by all.

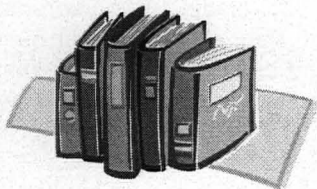

On February 26 and 27, join us as Rabbi Debbie Cohen facilitates a discussion of *A Literary Murder* by Batya Gur.

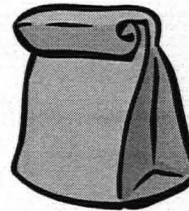

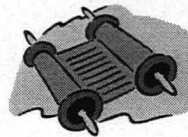

It is the beginning of a new year, a time when we review our lives. We measure the status quo against the yardstick of our hopes and dreams. We set goals for the coming year. It is a time for "refuah shleimah," the renewal of body, mind, and spirit. Perhaps as the new secular year begins, we should pray for a collective "refuah shleimah" when it comes to healing the ills that exist in our world. Judaism demands that we take our prayers one step farther by turning our thoughts into action.

As we each think about the adjustments that need to be made in our own lives, I would like us all to consider the life of a great American, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, whose birthday we celebrate on January 16th. He is remembered for teaching us all a valuable lesson about turning adversity into the fuel for the action of social change. His famous, "I Have a Dream..." speech in August of 1963, awakened countless Americans from their sleep of indifference and inspired them to take a stand against the sins of segregation and racism. This year our Temple Emanuel Youth Group (TEFTY) is doing just that! They are hosting the WIN-STY convention on January 13 - 15. This is the regional youth group's social action weekend. Over 100 members of Jewish, Reform youth groups from our region will spend the weekend doing volunteer work and socializing. They will be involved in many activities. This includes a casserole cooking project to benefit a local community service organization sponsored by Temple Emanuel's social action committee. Torah Portions of the Month

January 7 Vayigash Genesis 44:18 – 47:27

Vayigash tells of Joseph's reconciliation with himself, his brothers, and his father. It raises timeless questions about the human potential to change. The famine continues. When the Egyptians ran out of money with which to purchase bread, Joseph agrees to trade food for livestock. When the livestock was depleted, Joseph traded bread for land. In this way all the money, flocks, and land in Egypt came to be owned by Pharaoh.

January 14 Vayechi Genesis 47:28 – 50:26

Vayechi means "and he lived" and refers to Jacob having lived in Egypt for 17 years. Old and ill, Jacob senses that he is about to die and makes Joseph swear to bury him in Canaan, the place of his birth. The brothers send Joseph a message informing him that their father's final instructions were for Joseph to forgive his brothers. Joseph assures his siblings that they have nothing to fear. This portion and the book of Genesis end with Joseph's death at the age of 110.

January 21 Shemot Exodus 1:1 – 6:1

We begin reading the book of Exodus. A new Pharaoh comes to power who forces the Israelites to build cities for him and to work in his fields. Despite these hardships, the Israelite community continues to grow. The Pharaoh then orders all male babies born to Israelite women be drowned in the Nile River. A baby boy is put in a basket and found by Pharaoh's daughter who names him Moses.

January 28 Va'era Exodus 6:2 – 9:35

The story of the struggle to leave Egypt continues. God reviews the covenant made with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob and then tells Moses, "I have heard the cries of the Israelites and I will now fulfill my promise to them, to redeem them from slavery and bring them to the land that I promised their ancestors." God tells Moses that Moses will rule over Pharaoh, and Aaron will be Moses' prophet serving as his spokesperson. The first plagues descend on the Egyptians. The Nile is turned into blood and frogs invade the land, lice and swarms of insects invade Egypt. Pharaoh does not yield. The plagues of cattle disease, boils, and hail quickly follow.

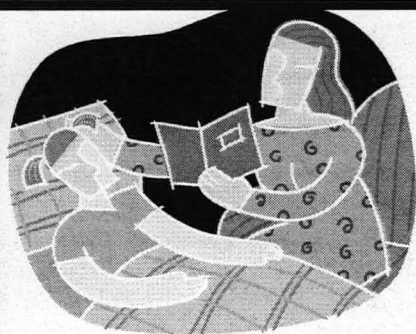

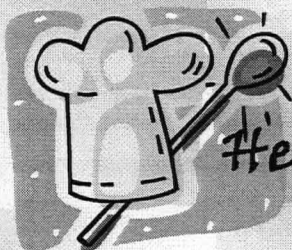

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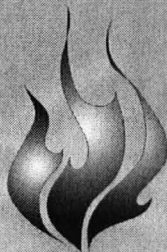
