All of us need an opportunity such as this every so often. You and I have it with Rosh Hashannah and Yom Kippur. Our Reform movement has it with the Biennial. What we learn in Baltimore will help us in the future. What we discover there will certainly aid us in the process of constantly striving to make Anshe Emeth the exciting and meaningful place that we believe it to be.

WORSHIP SERVICES - NOVEMBER 1991

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 1 – In the days of the Bible, Abraham saw himself as a resident alien in Hebron. Rabbi Paskoff will discuss the current “land for peace” discussions in light of the Biblical understanding of our place on the land.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 8 – Rabbi Miller will report on the Biennial Convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations to be held in Baltimore. Nearly 4000 delegates representing 840 Reform Congregations will gather to discuss the challenges and issues before the Reform Movement in the 1990's. Our temple will have a delegation of officers and trustees attending and representing us in the deliberations.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 15 – We welcome Rev. John DeVelder, director of the Department of Pastoral Care at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick. Rev. DeVelder has been a leading advocate of liberal religious thought in the New Brunswick area. He has brought the religious community together for a number of ecumenical purposes, including religious dialogue, the AIDS crisis, pastoral care, and interdenominational debate. Rev. DeVelder speaks to us as this year's Ishmael Sklarew Memorial Lecturer. We welcome him to our congregation and to our pulpit.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 22 – As part of the JFTY New Member Weekend, our senior youth group will be leading the entire congregation in worship this evening. The thoughts, creativity, and enthusiasm of our young people never fail to provide us with inspiration.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 29 – We welcome home our college students. A number of them have been invited to speak with us about Jewish life as they view it from the unique perspective of the college campus.

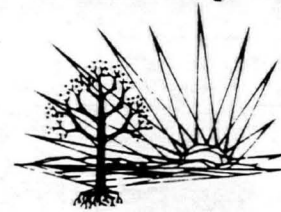

Ori Soltes, director of the B'nai B'rith Klutznick Museum in Washington, D.C. and professor of Jewish Studies, has a long record of academic achievement in the areas of Jewish art, linguistics, philology, archaeology, classics and studies in diaspora Jews.

Dr. Soltes speaks twenty-one languages including classical Chinese, Russian, Sanskrit, Spanish and Greek. His published work includes professional papers on Jewish art, Jewish thought, Sephardic Jewry, Russo-Soviet Anti-Semitism in addition to video film projects.

Dr. Soltes has a BA from Haverford College in Philosophy and Classics, A MA from Princeton in Classics, and a PhD from Johns Hopkins University. He has taught at the Cleveland College of Jewish Studies, the Johns Hopkins University, Princeton University and has served as curator and lecturer at the Hebrew Union College Skirball Museum as well as other museums. He is the consulting editor of Simon & Shuster's *New Hebrew-English/English-Hebrew Dictionary*.

His extensive academic interests and scholarship give Dr. Soltes unique expertise on the topic of Sephardim in the quincentenary year of Columbus' voyage from Spain to America.

7:45 p.m.—There is Meaning in the Fables

The world of the midrash represents one of the most creative periods of Jewish literature. The third and fourth century was a time in which the rabbis found a unique way to transmit the fears, concerns, joys, and dreams of the people. The Midrashim often became famous fables adopted by other cultures. Rabbi Miller will explore the meaning of some of the fables and how they answer the dilemmas and questions of our lives.

9:00 p.m.— Jewish-American Poets: Past and Present

Enid Dame, professor of English at Rutgers University and Lehman College, will lead this study of the development of Jewish-American poetry (that is, poetry written by American Jews, in English, that draws upon their own backgrounds, culture, and history). In this course, we will read and discuss works by, among others: the 19th century poets Penina Moise and Emma Lazarus; the 20th century poets Charles Rexnikoff, Karl Shapiro, Allen Ginsberg, Muriel Rukeyser, David Ignatow, and Ruth Whitman. We will also look at some of the contemporary Jewish mystical and feminist poets.



"SUNDAY IN THE LIBRARY"

Our new Temple library has been opened. It is beautifully furnished, and new books are being purchased. As part of our expanding program, we will be having three Sunday mornings in the library where we will share in special book reviews led by Rabbi Miller and Cantor Coopersmith. These programs will begin at 11:00 and conclude at 12:15. Coffee will (of course) be served.

THE FIRST SUNDAY: NOVEMBER 17TH

Rabbi Miller will review *Deborah, Golda & Me* by Letty Cotlin Pogrebin. This new book is a Jewish feminist's story of her alienation from Judaism and her return to our rich tradition. Rabbi Miller will explore some of the themes outlined in the book and how they impact upon us as contemporary Reform Jews, male and female.



RABBI'S TORAH STUDY GROUP

Rabbi Miller has begun his 14th year of the weekly discussion of parashat ha-shavuah, exploring the rich meanings and applications of the Torah portion to our lives. The class meets in the Temple's Conference Room whenever Hebrew School is in session; it is followed by a Kiddush. Learn Torah in this pleasant and informal atmosphere. No experience necessary!

PROFESSOR ALAN DERSHOWITZ

distinguished lawyer, Harvard Professor, and author

Sunday, December 8 at 10:30 a.m.

Professor Alan Dershowitz has been described by *Newsweek* as "the nation's most peripatetic civil-liberties lawyers and one of its most distinguished defenders of individual rights."

Professor Dershowitz' most recent book, *Chutzpah*, was published recently. *Taking Liberties: A Decade of Hard Cases, Bad Laws and Bum Raps*, was published in 1988 and is now available in paperback. *Reversal of Fortune: Inside the Von Bulow Case* was released in 1986 by Random House and made into a movie. An earlier book, *The Best Defense*, was a national best-seller.

Professor Dershowitz' clients have included Anatoly Shcharansky, Claus von Bulow, Jonathan Pollard, John Delorean, Patricia Hearst, Rabbi Meir Kahane, F. Lee Bailey, William Kunstler, and many other celebrities. He has been a consultant to several presidential commissions and has testified before congressional committees on numerous occasions.

Alan Dershowitz was born in Brooklyn and graduated from Yeshiva University High School and Brooklyn College. At Yale Law School, he was first in his class and editor-in-chief of the *Yale Law Journal*. After clerking for Chief Judge David Bazelon and Justice Arthur Goldberg, he was appointed to the Harvard Law faculty at age 25 and became a full professor at age 28, the youngest in the school's history. Since that time, he has taught courses and lectured throughout the country and around the world.

OFFICER'S MESSAGE . . .

NOVEMBER 1991

My thanks to Jordon Brown for inviting the officers to write a column in the Bulletin. As treasurer of Anshe Emeth, my usual monthly column consists of the budget and financial report and is only read by the board – so I would like to write about the Tzedakah committee which I co-chair with Deborah Cherniss.

A few weeks ago, a new television show, "Brooklyn Bridge," premiered on CBS. The show depicts a Jewish family living in Brooklyn during the 1950's. (Why is a show about Jews televised on Friday night?) Watching the tape of this show brought back a flood of childhood memories. Although not in Brooklyn, my mom, brother and I lived with my grandparents in the Washington Heights section of Manhattan. Like the boy on the show, I had three idols: my grandparents and Gil Hodges. Everyone knows about Gil Hodges – more people should know about my Grandpa Lou and my Grandma Nettie.

My Tzedakah lessons came early. Homelessness is not a recent phenomenon. Over forty years ago, my grandparents were part of an unofficial network, a network which fed and clothed people. I remember men coming to the door of our third floor apartment – homeless men, men without jobs who had fallen on hard times. They were always fed a meal, sometimes given a little extra food to take with them, and more often than not a jacket or sweater which my grandmother had been given by one of our neighbors. We were far from well off, but both Grandpa and Grandma always had something for those in need. My grandfather's lodge, "The Free Sons of Israel," helped newly arrived Jews from Europe with both money and jobs. A lifelong Democrat, a lifelong Zionist, grandpa lived his convictions. His words were that everybody must live the promise of America, that everyone must live the promise of Israel.

As we begin to do our work through the Tzedakah committee, we see that the more we do the more needs to be done. Our projects in the community, our projects in Israel show us how many people do not live the promise. Help us make some of the promises come true; our committee invites you to join us in our work.

TZEDAKAH COMMITTEE CLOTHING DRIVE "From Mothballs to Mitzvahs"

The Tzedakah Committee's first clothing collection begins on November 2. As you clean out your closets this season, please remember those in our community who do not have closets to clean or clothing choices to make.

We are working on two projects:

The first is our **WINTER OUTERWEAR DRIVE**, which will help bring warmth and comfort to those who cannot afford to buy coats, gloves or hats.

We are also initiating our Re-cycled Career Clothes Project, **CLOTHED WITH CARE**. This on-going activity will meet a special need. There are many men and women in our community who are looking for work. Ironically, they can't afford the clothing needed to make a positive impression on job interviews. "Clothed with Care" will help remedy this problem.

To get both projects underway, we will be collecting the following items: winter coats/jackets/sweaters for men, women and children; gloves/mittens/scarves/hats for men, women and children; professional/workplace clothing for men and women, including sports coats, blazers, slacks, shirts, ties, suits, skirts, blouses and dresses.

To make this drive a success, we ask that you follow a few simple guidelines:

1. Please bring all clothing donations to **Room 101** on one of the dates designated below. There will be labelled clothing racks and barrels. **ALL CLOTHING MUST BE ON HANGERS!** We cannot accept garbage bags filled with clothes. Scarves, mittens, hats and gloves may be placed directly into the barrels.
2. Clothing must be **EXCELLENTLY MAINTAINED**. in the same condition you would feel suitable for you or your family to wear. Donations of **NEW NEVER WORN ITEMS** also are gratefully accepted!

For those of you would like a receipt for tax purposes, there will be forms available. (To save time, you can bring a list of items and use it to fill in the checklist on the form.) This form will be validated and returned to you for your records. We will not assign a monetary value for your donation, but will give you a copy of the IRS Fair Market Value guidelines so that you can determine this yourself.

The Caring Community Program SHELTER PROJECT

The days are getting shorter . . .

The nights are getting colder . . .

In a few short weeks the Ozanam Men's Shelter will be filled to capacity. When their forty beds are filled, men will be turned away. Fortunately for them, our Temple along with six churches will provide a warm, safe place to spend the night for up to fifteen men.

We have committed to the weeks of:

December 23-29, February 10-16, and March 2-8.

Volunteers are needed to help in several ways:

- 1- To collect washcloths, bath towels, and hotel-sized soaps (Please bring these to the Temple office.)
- 2 -To volunteer to do a few loads of laundry (any day – pick up in the morning and return the next day)
- 3 – On Monday mornings to help drive the cots and supplies to the next shelter location.
- 4 – Four to six volunteers are needed to spend the night at the Temple.* (Bring a friend!)

A training session will be held in December.

*Typical Volunteer Scenario:

Person referred to the Temple shelter will arrive between 8-9 p.m. One volunteer will meet them at the outside door (Keller Hall). Two volunteers sign them in and receive any valuables to be locked away for the night. Two volunteers will help the men find beds and the restroom. The last volunteer will stay in the office by the telephone. The men generally went directly to sleep. After 9:00 p.m., some men might be referred by telephone from the Ozanam Shelter if there is space. During the night, the volunteers will take turns sleeping. At 6:30, the men are awakened, and everyone leaves at 7:00 a.m.
